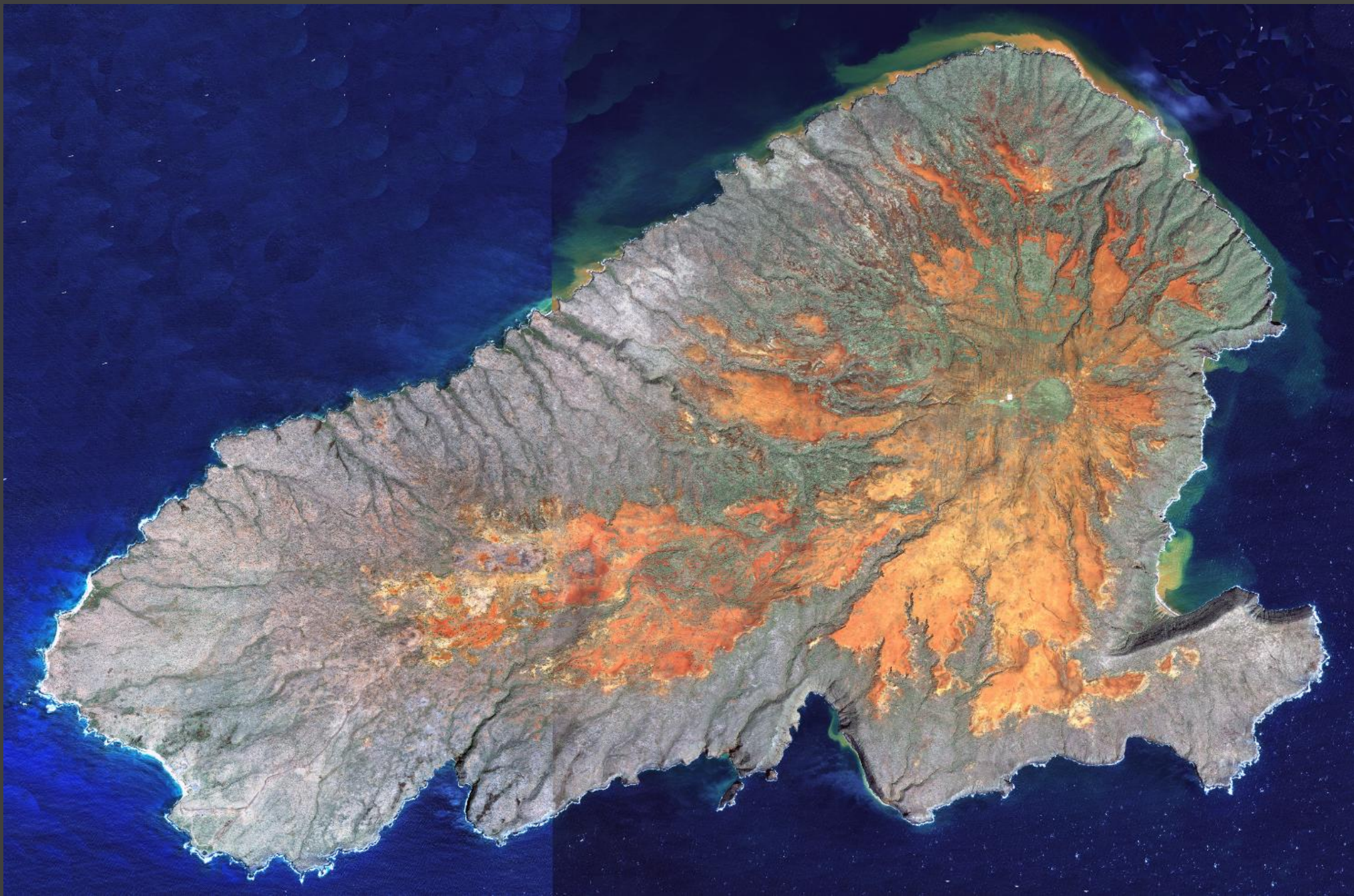


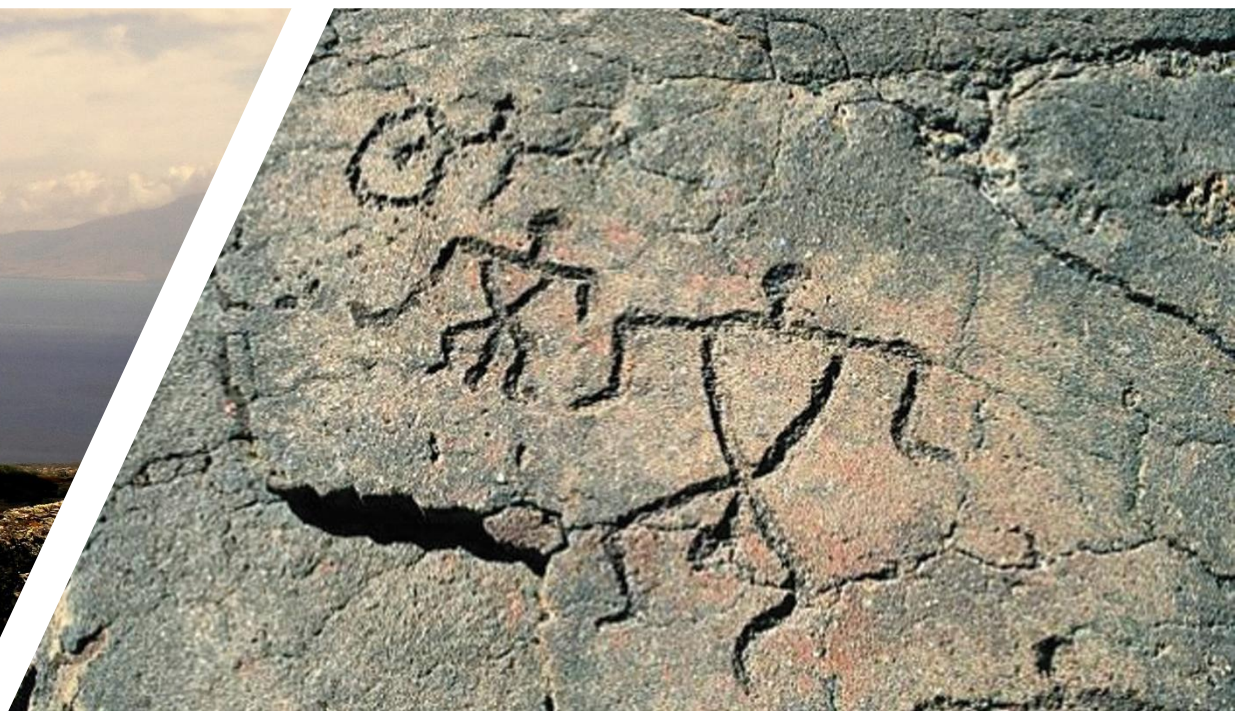
Kahoʻolawe Island Reserve Commission (KIRC)

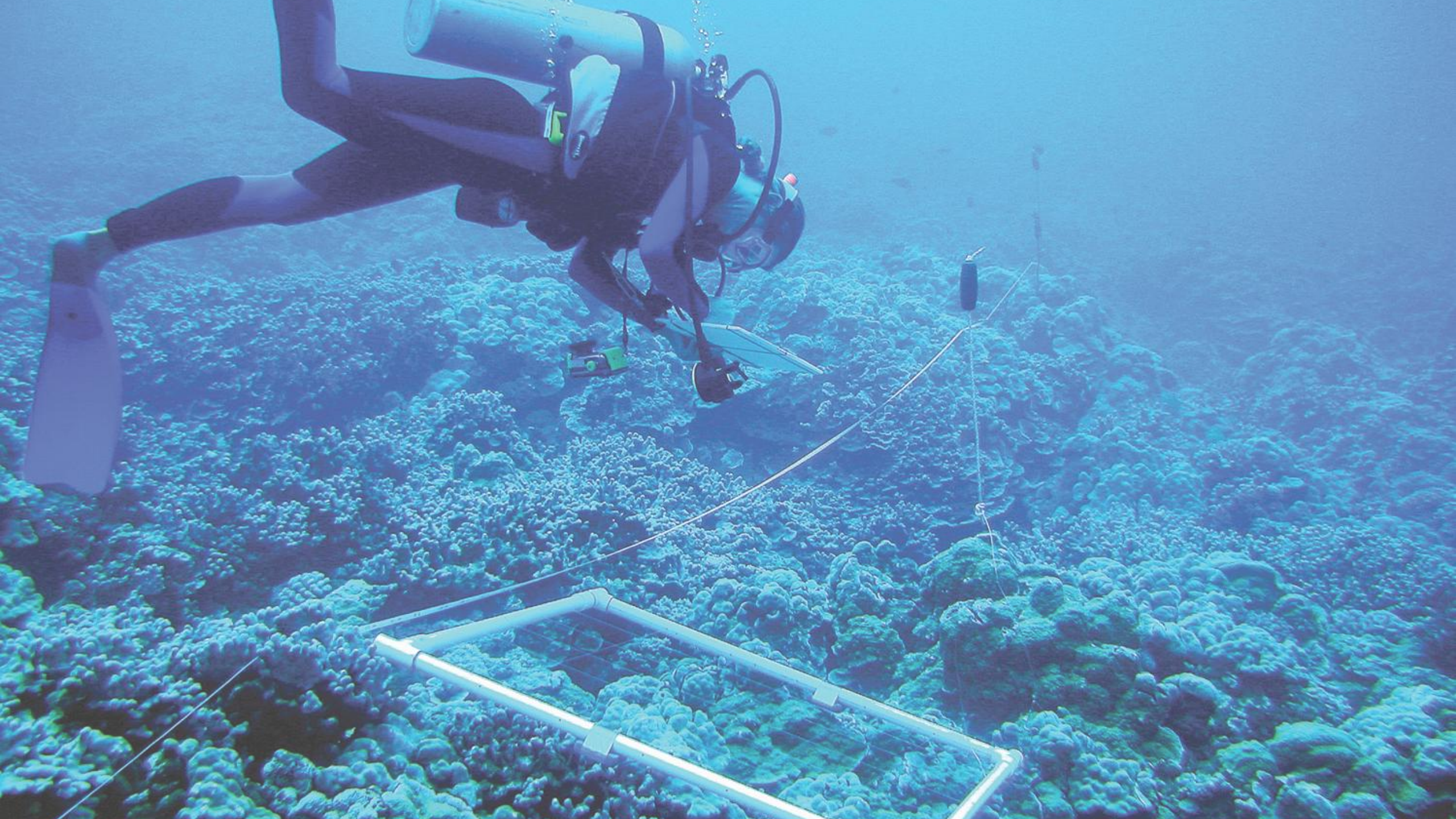

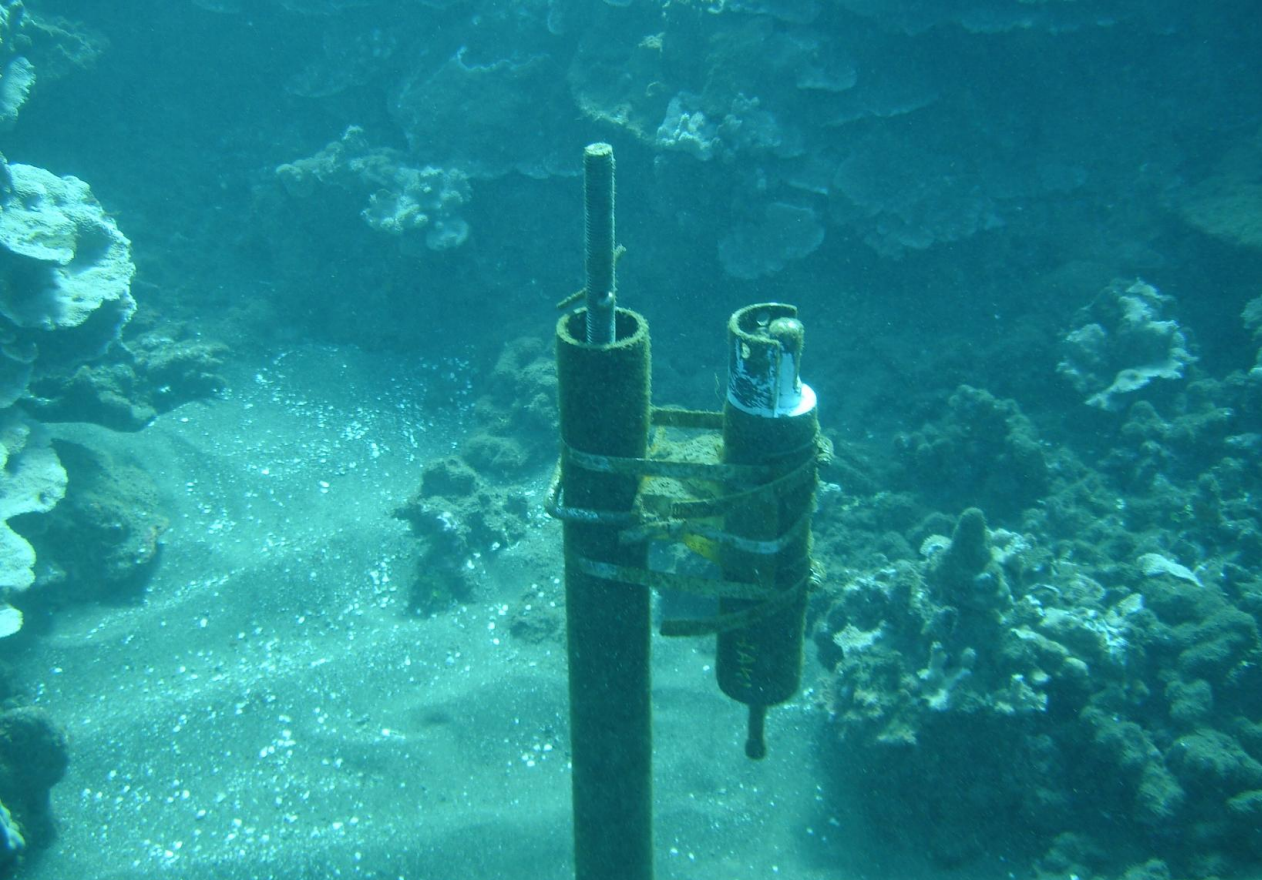








Monitoring Soil Erosion Pins and Infiltration Rates

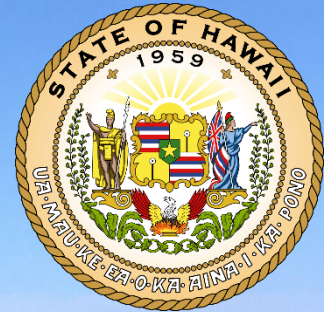
