SUBJECT: BILL 65 (2023), AMENDING THE TRAFFIC CODE BY EXPANDING THE VOLUNTEER PARKING ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM (WASSP-6)

The Water Authority, Social Services, and Parks Committee met on March 4, 2024, to discuss Bill 65 (2023), entitled "A BILL FOR AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE TRAFFIC CODE BY EXPANDING THE VOLUNTEER PARKING ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM."

During the meeting, the Committee discussed Senate Bill 2832, Session Laws of Hawaii 2024. SB2832 sought to expand the Chief of Police's discretion by allowing designated individuals to issue infractions for violations of any law prohibiting or restricting the stopping, standing, or parking of vehicles on highways and County property. The Committee agreed to defer Bill 65 until the State legislative session concluded and the outcome of SB2832 was known.

On June 21, 2024, Governor Green signed the companion bill, House Bill 2295 HD1 SD1, into law as Act 65. Please find a copy of Act 65 attached.

In preparation for the Committee's discussion of Bill 65 at an upcoming meeting, may I please request you review the attached proposed CD1 version of Bill 65. The proposed CD1 version contains revisions that were discussed during the March 4, 2024, Committee meeting. Please also provide comments or suggested revisions in writing, if any.

May I further request your response to the following:

- 1. Does the Department need to inform the State of Hawai'i Organization of Police Officers Union about this program? If so, please explain and state potential concerns.
- 2. Has the Department spoken to the Honolulu Police Department about their Volunteer Special Enforcement Officer Program? If so, please provide a summary of their program.
- 3. Does the Department expect more funding will be needed in the Fiscal Year 2025 budget to implement or manage this program? Would additional funding be required if the Department offered mileage reimbursements for volunteers?
- 4. If this program is implemented, would the Department conduct background checks on applicants? Please provide some preliminary criteria the Department would use to choose program volunteers.

# A BILL FOR AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE TRAFFIC CODE BY EXPANDING THE VOLUNTEER PARKING ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM

#### BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE COUNTY OF MAUI:

SECTION 1. This Ordinance's purpose is to enhance the County's ability to enforce parking laws in accordance with Act 65, Session Laws of Hawaii 2024, by expanding the Volunteer Disabled Parking Enforcement Pilot Program to allow the Chief of Police to designate volunteers to enforce all parking laws.

SECTION 2. Section 10.48.106, Maui County Code, is amended to read as follows:

# "10.48.106 - Volunteer [disabled] parking enforcement pilot program. A. Definitions. For the purposes of this section:

- [1.] "Department" means the department of police [; and].
- [2.] "Volunteer" means a person who is willing to provide services on behalf of the County without any compensation.

  B. Volunteer [disabled] parking enforcement pilot
- program.
- 1. There is established within the department, and under the supervision of the chief of police or the chief's designee, a program to utilize volunteers to assist the department in enforcing [the] County and State [disabled] parking laws.
- 2. The chief of police [is authorized to] <u>may</u> appoint part-time volunteers <u>from a community plan area</u> as special [disabled] parking officers to issue citations on public and private property to persons violating County or State [disabled] parking laws[.] <u>in the community plan area.</u> Any special [disabled] parking officer is authorized to issue citations if [such] <u>the</u> officer witnesses a violation of County or

State [disabled] parking laws or has probable cause to believe that a person has violated [such] parking laws.

- 3. The chief of police or the chief's designee [shall:] may:
  - a. Establish minimum qualifications for persons wishing to volunteer their services to become special [disabled] parking officers and application procedures for volunteers[;].
  - b. Provide a required training program for volunteers that [shall include, but not be limited to:] includes:
    - i. Knowledge of County and State [disabled] parking laws[;] the chief of police determines volunteers may enforce.
    - ii. Identifying violators and issuing citations[;].
    - iii. Use of communication and other necessary equipment[;].
    - iv. Procedures to follow in the event of confrontations with suspected violators[;].
    - v. Providing testimony in court to enforce citations[; and].
  - c. Appoint volunteers who have successfully completed the training program and who are qualified, as determined by the chief of police, to become special [disabled] parking officers.
- 4. Each special [disabled] parking officer [shall] must agree to:
  - a. Work a minimum number of hours per week, as determined by the chief of police or the chief's designee[;].
  - b. Serve at locations designated by the chief of police or the chief's designee[;].
  - c. Serve without any compensation, but [shall] be entitled to reimbursement for necessary expenses while in the discharge of [his or her] their duties and responsibilities, as allowed by the rules to implement this program.
- 5. The chief of police may refuse to appoint any volunteer whose qualifications are found to be unacceptable to the chief and may revoke the appointment of any volunteer whose performance is found to be unacceptable to the chief.
- 6. The chief of police [shall] <u>must</u> adopt rules to implement this program."

SECTION 3. Material to be repealed is bracketed. New material is

underscored. In printing this bill, the County Clerk need not include the

brackets, the bracketed material, or the underscoring.

SECTION 4. This Ordinance takes effect on approval.

## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE TRAFFIC CODE.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Section 291C-111, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

"(a) With respect to highways and property under their

- 4 respective jurisdictions, the director of transportation [is]
- 5 shall be authorized to and the counties by ordinance may
- 6 prohibit or restrict the stopping, standing, or parking of
- 7 vehicles where the stopping, standing, or parking is dangerous
- $oldsymbol{8}$  to those using the highway or where the stopping, standing, or
- 9 parking of vehicles would <u>unduly</u> interfere [<del>unduly</del>] with the
- 10 free movement of traffic; provided that the violation of any law
- 11 or any ordinance, regardless of whether established under this
- 12 or any other section, prohibiting or restricting the stopping,
- 13 standing, or parking of vehicles shall constitute a traffic
- 14 infraction. The counties may issue traffic infractions for
- 15 violations of any law prohibiting or restricting the stopping,
- 16 standing, or parking of vehicles on all highways and county
- 17 property. The counties shall not provide any other penalty,

- 1 civil or criminal, or any other charge, in the form of rental or
- 2 otherwise, in place of or in addition to the fine to be imposed
- 3 by the district court for any violation of any ordinance
- 4 prohibiting or restricting the stopping, standing, or parking of
- 5 vehicles.
- 6 This section shall not be construed as prohibiting the
- 7 authority of the director of transportation or the counties to
- 8 allow the stopping, standing, or parking of motor vehicles at a
- 9 "T-shaped" intersection on highways under their respective
- 10 jurisdictions; provided that [such] the stopping, standing, or
- 11 parking of motor vehicles is not dangerous to those using the
- 12 highway or where the stopping, standing, or parking of motor
- 13 vehicles would not unduly interfere with the free movement of
- 14 traffic.
- The appropriate police department or their designee, and
- 16 county or prosecuting attorney of the various counties shall

- 19 limited to the issuance of parking tickets. Any person
- 20 committing a violation of any law or ordinance, regardless of

- 2 shall be subject to a fine to be enforced and collected by the
- 3 district courts of this State and to be deposited into the state
- 4 general fund for state use."
- 5 SECTION 2. Section 291C-165, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 6 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
- 7 "(a) There shall be provided for use by authorized police
- 8 officers, or [county-employees designated by] designees of the
- 9 county chiefs of police, a form of summons or citation for use
- 10 in citing violators of those traffic laws that do not mandate
- 11 the physical arrest of violators. The form and content of the
- 12 summons or citation shall be as adopted or prescribed by the
- 13 administrative judge of the district courts and shall be printed
- 14 on a form commensurate with the form of other summonses or
- 15 citations used in modern methods of arrest, so designed to
- 16 include all necessary information to make the same valid within
- 17 the laws and regulations of the State."
- 18 SECTION 3. Section 291C-167, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 19 amended to read as follows:
- 20 "\$291C-167 Summons or citation on illegally parked
- 21 vehicle. Whenever any motor vehicle without a driver is found

- 1 parked or stopped in violation of any of the restrictions
- 2 contained in the state traffic laws, the officer or [designated
- 3 county-employee] designee finding the vehicle shall take its
- 4 registration number and may take any other information displayed
- 5 on the vehicle that may identify its registered owner and
- 6 [conspicuously] shall conspicuously affix to the vehicle a
- 7 citation, as described in section 291C-165, for the registered
- 8 owner of record to answer as provided in chapter 291D."
- 9 SECTION 4. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
- 10 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
- 11 begun before its effective date.
- 12 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 13 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 14 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
