

Overall Sentiment









RE: BIII 41 (2025) — A BILL FOR AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE OPERATING BUDGET FOR THE COUNTY OF MAUI FOR THE FISCAL YEAR JULY 1,2025, TO JUNE 30, 2026

Aloha Chair Sugimura, Vice Chair Kama and other members of the Committee,

The Grassroot Institute of Hawaii offers comments on Bill 41 (2025), the fiscal year 2026 operating budget.


We appreciate that the Council has decided to review the budget with the aim of fiscal responsibility. To assist the Council in its deliberations, we offer the following observations and recommendations.

>> County spending has almost tripled since fiscal 2016.

Maui County's budget has increased in nominal dollars by 287% since fiscal 2016, when actual expenditures totaled \$527 million. This year, Mayor Richard Bissen's budget proposes spending \$1.51 billion in operating and capital expenses.

Indexed for inflation, total county spending and general fund operating spending have both more than doubled since fiscal 2016, as Figure 1 on the following page shows.

This increase is concerning since it means that county taxpayers are either paying much more in taxes or that the county has taken on significantly more debt. As we discuss later, both are true.



>> General fund carryover savings represent 13% of the fiscal 2026 general fund operating budget

Carryover savings refers to the "unappropriated revenue and unencumbered balances of any appropriation in a fund at the end of the fiscal year. For budget purposes, this amount is included in the revenue estimates for the ensuing fiscal budget year."¹

If funds are appropriated but not spent, they remain in county coffers for the next fiscal year. But large amounts of carryover could mean that the county is unable to use the funding and is overcharging taxpayers.





Figure 3: General fund carryover savings as a percentage of general fund expenditures, fiscal 2016–2026

As Figures 2 and 3 show, this problem was especially salient for fiscal year 2023, when carryover from fiscal 2022 represented almost one-third of the general fund operating budget.

But in fiscal 2026, carryover savings will still total \$122.9 million.

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>> County debt has increased by more than \$100 million since fiscal 2016

Increasingly, the county has taken on debt to fund its capital and operating expenses. Data from the county's Annual Comprehensive Financial Reports indicate that, adjusted for inflation, the county debt burden has increased from \$425 million in fiscal 2016 to \$551 million in fiscal 2024 — the latest ACFR year available.




Figure 3: Debt service payments, fiscal 2016–2026

County debt service payments have also increased since fiscal 2016, by 158%, as shown in Figure 3.

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>> Property assessments and tax bills are increasing

In nominal terms, Maui County property owners paid more than twice as much in property taxes in fiscal 2025 as they did in fiscal 2016 — \$254 million then compared to \$585 million last year. Adjusted for inflation, total property taxes paid during the same period increased by more than 77%.

For the upcoming year, the mayor's budget proposes lowering the tax rates for owner-occupied properties, but overall property tax revenue would still increase to \$650 million — a \$116 million increase over last year.

These higher tax bills are primarily driven by higher assessed values — to some extent a reflection of Hawaii's housing shortage. But agriculture, commercial and industrial property valuations have increased as well.

The net taxable value of all Maui County properties in fiscal 2016 was \$36.2 billion; for fiscal 2026, it is \$84.1 billion.

Table 1 shows the increase in real property assessments by tax class from before the wildfires, comparing fiscal years 2024 and 2026.

Recommendations

>> Move money into the county's emergency fund and prepay liabilities

The mayor's proposed budget would place \$25 million into the emergency fund, up from \$20 million in fiscal 2025. Grassroot supports moving an extra \$25 million into this account.

Socking away this money for a future disaster would be prudent, and \$25 million would represent less than a quarter of the county's \$122.9 million in carryover savings from fiscal 2025.

There are many reasons for this. First, it is clear that the county is unable to expend all of the funds it appropriates each year. Second, there are many question marks at the federal level, and it would be wise for Maui to keep additional funding in reserve this year to hedge against economic downturns or federal cuts.

Grassroot also suggests that the county look for ways to prepay debts or other liabilities so that taxpayers will not be overly burdened by the higher levels of debt that the county has taken out in recent years.

>> Reduce property tax rates

Grassroot applauds Mayor Richard Bissen's proposed rate cuts for the owner-occupied property tax class. But even if the mayor's new rates and tiers for the class are adopted, the savings would amount to only about \$3 million, and taxes on the owner-occupied tax class would still surge by 28% over fiscal 2024 — since before the wildfires.

Grassroot suggests reducing property tax rates more broadly to lower general fund tax collections by \$17 million, which represents less than one-sixth of the estimated general fund carryover savings.

Homeowners should get a bigger break, but commercial and industrial properties should also realize some relief. After Hurricane Iniki struck Kauai in 1992, county lawmakers there slashed rates for those two classes by 50% for the 1995 fiscal year.² Table 2 shows Grassroot's suggested amendments to the proposed tax rates.
