Pursuant to your correspondence dated March 29, 2025, the following are responses to your questions:

Overall

 As it relates to the discontinuation of the Office of Innovation & Sustainability: (Pages 526-527, Program Budget)

The Office of Innovation and Sustainability will be discontinued as the newly established departments for 'Ōiwi Resources and East Maui Water Authority take on key responsibilities. Additionally, increased alignment and collaboration with the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Environmental Management, particularly its Environmental Protection & Sustainability (EP&S) division, will further integrate sustainability efforts within the County's broader operational framework.

a. How will the continuity of the Goals and Objectives this Office has worked toward, including Goals #5 and #6 relating to climate action, sustainability, resiliency, and green transportation, be achieved in FY 2026? (GJ) (NUH)

Goals related to climate action, sustainability, and resiliency will be facilitated by the environmental liaison and the primary energy point of contact.

b. Identify the staff liaisons who will continue the mission of the Office and the key areas assigned to each. (GJ)

The Mayor's Office will designate a team member focused on environmental initiatives to enhance coordination and collaboration among key county departments and programs. Some of these positions are pending offers and a comprehensive contact list will be provided to the Councilmembers as soon as possible.

2. For Goal #1, item 1, the FY 2025 Second Quarter Budget Implementation Report estimates that the Office of Economic Development will initiate 27 events, conferences, and training to foster job creation within Maui County with new and expanding businesses. The report states that four events occurred. How does OED plan to increase assistance to new and expanding businesses? (Page 540, Program Budget) (NUH)

We plan to align our local workforce goals with the State by utilizing Federal funds to establish career/training pathways to empower the people of Maui County to be competitively skilled and resilient in the shifting economies. By upskilling individuals, we can support new and expanding businesses. Our efforts also work toward addressing core issues like the labor shortage, living wage, economic diversification, and jobs for the future.

Workforce will continue to support organizations and agencies that deliver training, certifications, and other upskilling assistance by maintaining the Eligible Training Provider list - https://labor.hawaii.gov/wdc/eligible-training-provider-list/.

The Maui American Job Center, located at the Service Center, is committed to connecting businesses and community members to support individual and organizational growth and capacity. Part of the free services through the Maui American Job Center is to provide access to career and hiring fairs. With that, the Workforce Development Team has partnered with the State DOE - Workforce Development Branch and Maui High School's post-high team to host the 2^{nd}

annual hiring fair on 04/11/25, where all the Maui County schools have been invited. The DOE is covering the cost of ground transportation and Moloka'i and Lana'i airfare so they're able to attend.

The purpose of the event is to provide opportunities for graduating seniors to secure full-time or part-time gainful employment that will provide a minimum starting wage of \$19.69/hour (annual income of \$39,385/year). This is the income necessary to support a single-person household with no children in Hawai'i as determine by the Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed (ALICE) calculation.

Receipts for the advancements live in the S drive and are submitted to Finance with the next invoice request. So no further reimbursement is given until the receipts for the advancement are justified.

Focusing on funding opportunities that align with the Mayor's priorities, such as housing, recovery and well-being, and cultural and natural resource protections. Checking federal, state and local grant portals for programs that support these areas and ensure the opportunities match the county's goals.

Previously, and still as part of the process, a department or entity may approach us with a project in mind, providing an outline, identifying potential funding sources or acting as the funding party themselves, and establishing partnerships for the project, allowing us to proceed from there. The next steps involve searching for opportunities, finding relevant options, summarizing key details, assessing feasibility, determining qualifiers, and applying accordingly.

- FY 24 REPI Mauka to Makai Partnership (FY 26 anticipated distribution): \$750,000 - \$1,000,000 (Granted)
- · EECBG: \$80,750 (voucher) applied. (Granted)
- FEMA Public Assistance: \$411,718.09 (amount has dropped from \$630,419) new amount has been accepted by FEMA team, ground level.
 *It should be noted that the uncertainty with Federal money could impact award totals.

Will Write

- EDA Build to Scale (with UH Maui): \$1,500,000 \$5,000,000 (pending federal cuts, collaboration)
- FY 26 REPI Cycle Grant: \$ 1,500,000 (applying, Spaceforce encouraged application to continue REPI Challenge award project)
- HSEO BPS <u>Position</u>: \$ 749,000 to \$1m (pending, freeze had been lifted, no further updates) a position that could function as an Energy Commissioner.

The creation / merging of a "grants team" will align effort and strategy for an even greater outcome.

About 80 percent of those who enter work training will join the workforce. The other 20 percent will continue their education and decide that they would want to do more training. Others decide to leave the Islands due to the rising cost of living.

b. The FY 2025 Second Quarter Budget Implementation Report states that 26 programs, workshops, and training opportunities were initiated for

job seekers and employers. Explain how OED plans to increase opportunities for job seekers and employers.

We have increased outreach by working with Hawaii State Libraries in the County of Maui, as well as schools and community resource fairs. Working with our partners in networking events to work efficiently to obtain the necessary employees to support our local businesses. Plans to increase these numbers using social media and in-person outreach and continue participating in community resource/job-seeking events.

7. Who is the Office's staff liaison for the Open Space, Natural Resources, Cultural Resources, and Scenic Views Preservation Fund? What are the Office's processes and procedures for the use of the fund? (Page 569, Program Budget) (GJ)

The Open Space program is supported by a dedicated team of three members, each playing a key role in advancing the County's conservation and preservation goals. Their responsibilities include overseeing the contractual acquisition process, allocating and managing grants, and coordinating collaborative efforts with partners. A central focus of their work is ensuring that all stewardship activities are carried out through a culturally grounded and environmentally responsible lens. As stated above, some of these positions are pending offers and a comprehensive contact list will be provided to the Councilmembers as soon as possible.

8. When did the office stop paying the salary of the former OED Director? When will a new director be appointed?

January 31, 2025

The Office of Economic Development ceased paying the salary of the former OED Director upon the official end of their employment. A new director is expected to be appointed within the last quarter of the current fiscal year as part of the ongoing restructuring plan to align the program with key economic drivers that reflect the identity and needs of Maui County.

9. What specific actions are being taken to reduce the County's liability on County-owned land that are not managed or properly maintained, including those directly owned, provided through an executive order, and leased? (TP)

Reducing liability on county-owned property requires a proactive and structured approach to land management. This should include a comprehensive land

management plan, an implementation partner, and sustained financial resources to ensure proper assessment, security, cultural stewardship, and ongoing maintenance.

- Assessment & Risk Analysis Conducting regular evaluations of countyowned properties to identify potential liabilities, maintenance needs, cultural significance, and best-use scenarios.
- Implementation Partner(s) Engaging specialized organizations with the expertise to manage land stewardship, incorporating cultural practitioners and community stewards to ensure responsible and place-based management.
- Sustained Financial Resources Allocating dedicated funding for ongoing property maintenance, security, cultural preservation, and compliance with safety regulations.

By integrating these components, the county can proactively mitigate risks, enhance property oversight, and align land use with community, cultural, and environmental priorities. A structured approach will help ensure long-term sustainability and responsible management of public assets.

Salaries (Category "A")

 The P-26337 Administrative Assistant II position is receiving a \$5,556 salary increase due to a step movement but the position lists the same step for FYs 2025 and 2026. Explain the discrepancy. (Page 15-3, Budget Details) (TP)

This position for FY 26 should be SR-22H.

Given the success of the kuhina events in 2024, the mayor's Public Affairs Director will partner once again with Festivals of Aloha, Inc. for the commemoration. Activities will be determined in conjunction with the grantee and community partners over the next few months.

No, the RFP will be issued by July of 2025. Work cannot begin until information is received from JCI in October 2025.

Measurement & Verification is a part of our agreement with JCI and is separate from the audit.

d. Why is the audit occurring now? (TP)

The audit will review the amount of energy savings by JCI and provide a comparison for the data submitted by JCI to provide an independent confirmation of the energy savings.

 e. If JCI's projected energy savings are not realized, what is the County's recourse? (TP)

Under the contract with JCI if the energy savings are not realized, JCI must pay the County the difference between the actual savings and the contracted amount. Once the independent audit is received, if there is a discrepancy, the County will begin discussions with JCI to resolve the issue and request payment, if needed.

The countywide grants management software will include initial setup, training, and annual costs, with an ongoing annual subscription fee.

The system has not yet been selected but will be chosen based on its integration capabilities, scalability, user-friendly interface, and ongoing support and training. The Administration will issue an RFP prior to selecting a system.

Implementation will begin with the Office of Economic Development (OED) and expand countywide as needed. The system will be maintained collaboratively by the county IT department and the vendor.

Resilience hubs in West Maui were identified as a priority following the wildfires; however, implementation has faced challenges due to partner agencies managing competing priorities and being stretched across multiple recovery efforts. Additionally, some of the allocated funding was redirected to address immediate wildfire-related expenses.

To streamline and refocus OED's grant-making efforts, several grants that did not clearly align with OED's mission were reassigned to other departments or transferred to the Mayor's Administration Program.

Clean & Safe Wailuku is budgeted under the Department of Management. The Wailuku program is a contract, while the Paia program is a grant, which is why they are currently under different departments.

Based on community feedback and word of mouth, Pā'ia residents have expressed appreciation and satisfaction with the Pā'ia Clean & Safe Program. The program is positively received and seen as a valuable contribution to the well-being and upkeep of the community.

Hawai'i Broadband funds are designated for community engagement activities across the county's three islands.

The State of Hawai'i Cesspool Conversion Pilot Project was originally intended to be funded as a "pass-through" grant to the counties, supporting efforts to convert cesspools to septic systems. In response, the County of Maui convened a working group to collaborate with the State Department of Health and assist in shaping the conversion process.

The next step in the initiative is to develop a formal application and vetting process for prospective applicants, ensuring an equitable and effective approach to implementing these critical upgrades.

10. Provide the film and video production industry strategic plan for which \$200,000 was appropriated in FY 2025. (Page 543, Program Budget) (NUH)

The Maui Film Office is currently operated as a program of MEDB, with funding provided by the County of Maui. While the Film Office has outlined a clear programmatic plan, the Office of Economic Development (OED) has not yet received or developed a comprehensive strategic plan for the overall direction and long-term goals of the initiative.

11. Maui Economic Opportunity, Inc. shut down the National Displaced Workforce Grant program on February 24, 2025. In FY 2025, the Council approved \$2,000,000 in grant funding for the Maui Displaced Workforce Development Program. Was a contract executed and were funds disbursed? (Page 15-37, Budget Details) (NUH)

This is G-6380, Maui Economic Opportunity: It was executed January 8, 2025 but no funds were disbursed to date. They have until September 2025 to use funds.

Beyond its economic impact, the event actively supports the community by partnering with local nonprofits—compensating them for volunteer hours—organizing community clean-ups, and promoting local small businesses, reinforcing its role as both a sports and community-focused initiative.

This initiative is not tourism-as-usual. It reflects a conscious pivot toward low-impact, high-value engagement that centers local values, economic resilience, and cultural stewardship.

Funding Structure & Leverage:

MWEA and the broader Maui County Visitor Industry Partners (MCVIP) coalition understand and respect the concerns voiced by several Councilmembers regarding over-tourism. This event is designed to do the opposite. It targets a visitor demographic that is:

Purpose-driven (attending a wedding or summit, not vacationing broadly)

Short-term in length of stay (3–5 days)

High in spending and low in environmental impact

Engaged in cultural experiences and local businesses

These guests don't overwhelm infrastructure—they activate venues, chefs, musicians, florists, and the cultural arts economy in a coordinated and celebratory way.

All marketing and messaging associated with this project will:

1. Be approved by Maui County's Tourism Round Table

2. Follow the County's established grant funding protocols

3. Ensure state or third-party funds are not imposed without local review This governance model honors Hawaiian culture—ensuring that how Maui is seen, experienced, and shared globally is first shaped by those who live here.

The grant category has remained grants and disbursements for cultural, arts and tourism. The culture, arts, and tourism grants are intended to support specific grants and initiatives in these categories, while visitor industry grants are intended for funding for grants that more broadly impact the visitor industry. If the Committee would prefer to have all tourism and visitor industry grants in one category, the Administration is open to that discussion.

The County of Maui is a recognized brand and tourism has a significant impact on generating tax and business revenue. Despite its impact, it must be managed with deep respect for our island residents and communities.

Grants are guided by both community input and the directives of our elected officials, reflecting a balance between local needs and broader strategic goals. At the State level, DBEDT (Department of Business, Economic Development & Tourism) provides tourism data and planning frequencies, which inform the efforts of HTA (Hawai'i Tourism Authority) and CNHA (Council for Native

Hawaiian Advancement). These entities manage federal tourism-related funds that are distributed to counties to support community-based initiatives. Within the Office of Economic Development (OED), a Business and Tourism Specialist works closely with both state and county policymakers, supporting initiatives that align with community values and sustainable tourism practices. One of the key projects currently underway is the HTA/CNHA 'Umeke Initiative, including the Destination Management Action Plan (DMAP). This effort guides the County's marketing and visitor management strategies, implemented in partnership with the Maui Visitors Bureau and other industry organizations, ensuring that tourism supports—not overwhelms—our community.

b. What are the goals for the use of this fund? (GJ)

Goals of grant funds are dictated by the Office of the Mayor and the Office of Economic Development, and will align with the priorities listed above.

 Provide a list of the FY 2025 grantees and explain how the funds were expended. (TP)

In FY 2025, the funds were conditioned for a grant to Holani Hana, Inc. for the continuation of the Hawai'i Tourism Authority pilot programs to manage East Maui visitor traffic congestion. The application for these funds is still in process.

Conditional language for Feral Animal Control was added to the budget by the Council beginning in Fiscal Year 2021 under the Department of Housing and Human Concerns, Animal Enforcement Program. They remained in DHHC in FY 2022. In FY 2023, they were moved to the Office of the Mayor, Economic Development Program, Grants and disbursements for water and environmental resource protection and conservation as individual line items. The funds in Human Concerns will fund service related programs. It should be noted that approximately \$1 million of this funding is intended for the safe parking program.

b. Which Office of the Mayor staff is tasked with addressing houselessrelated issues? Would additional resources assist in addressing these issues in a timely manner? (SS)

The Mayor's Office Houseless Liaison plays a vital role in identifying challenges within the community and understanding the barriers individuals face in accessing services related to houselessness. When needed, the liaison team supports other County departments by helping address these issues directly or by fostering connections with key stakeholders to enhance coordination and response efforts.

c. What types of houseless solutions will be funded? (GJ) (SS)

Regarding houselessness solutions, \$300,000 has been allocated to support site cleanups and to provide storage for personal belongings collected during these efforts. This approach aims to maintain public spaces while ensuring that individuals experiencing houselessness are treated with dignity and their property is handled responsibly.

d. The recent ECOnorthwest study prepared for the Department of Human Concerns found that stakeholders did not have a common goal, nor a commitment to consensus. Are these funds intended to facilitate coordination and collaboration as recommended by the report? If not, how will the recommendations in the study be implemented? (TP)

Overview



- What: Resilience Hubs are community-serving facilities codesigned and co-developed with community members to support programs and services, coordinate communication, distribute resources, provide access to resilient power, and enhance quality of life
- Why: Resilience Hubs are intended to act as the heart of a neighborhood. They not only support community members everyday but also have the capacity and capability to coordinate, shelter and connect in the event of a disruption.
- Who: The people who gather, share, create, and lift one another up are the real heart of a Resilience Hub.
- How: Putting the Maui Resilience Hub network into practice follows a basic six-step process.







3 Operating Modes



	Provide training, services, and support that connect and sustain community members as they take care of families, develop and grow businesses, and interact with one another and the greater environment.
Blue Sky	Central point to design and implement strategies that address root causes of vulnerability and help the community thrive.
Normal Mode	Deliver preparedness messaging to the communities the Hub serves, and site leaders can work with trusted community leaders to disseminate information and facilitate stronger community ties before a disruption.
	When communities experience disruptions, a Resilience Hub can be the central point for gathering, assessing impact, sharing stories, assembling information, accessing resources, and spearheading response.
Stormy Sky Disruption Mode	Residents, businesses, and organizations will collectively manage the Hub including both internal and external communications. Maui has a wide number of support mechanisms through first responders, emergency management and related agencies. Resilience Hubs support and complement those organizations, helping to maximize efficiency.
	It's hard to predict how long it will take for the community to return to Normal conditions, so the Resilience Hub must continue to function as the place where the community comes together to serve one another.
Clearing Sky Recovery Mode	Provide tools, water, ice, information and communications support. For resilient communications, each Hub can remain a central point for gathering, sharing information, and accessing resources.
industry mode	Can also provide space for additional experts, aid organizations, volunteers, and support networks to gather and better understand and help meet community needs. In Maui County, neighbors help neighbors, and the Resilience Hub provides both a space and an operation to facilitate a return to everyday life.

Five Foundational Areas



1 Resilient Services & Programming

Offering additional services and programs that build relationships, promote community preparedness, and improve residents' health and well-being.

2 Resilient Communications

Ensuring the ability to communicate within and outside the service area year-around and especially during disruptions and throughout recovery.

3 Building & Landscapes

Strengthening the resilience of the facility to ensure that it meets operational goals in all conditions.

Power

Ensuring reliable backup power to the facility during a hazard while also improving the cost-effectiveness and sustainability of operations in all three operating modes.

5 Operations

Ensuring personnel and processes are in place to operate the facility in all three modes.

Six Phases of Development



Phase 1 Assess Vulnerability & Select Service Area

To understand vulnerability, Hub teams must understand what stressors or disruptions are present at their potential sites and whether the community inegatively impacted by exposure to them.

Phase 2 Set Teams, Partnerships and Goals

Residents and local community-based organizations should be partners, and preferably the leaders, from the very beginning of the process to develop and manage a Resilience Hub.

After identifying the Service Area and building a team of partners, it is important to collaborate with residents and community members to identify context specific goals for the project.

Phase 3 Identify & Evaluate Sites

With service areas identified, prospective partners aligned and goals established, the next step is to identify alle services and priorize which sites to pursue. This requires an assessment of each site and analysis of potential resilience-building solutions. Site Selection evaluates financial, resilience and sustainability criteria, and then sizes and configures solutions appropriate to each site.

Phase 4

Select Resilience Solutions

With service areas identified prospective partners aligned and goals established the next step is to identify alte services and phonitize which sites to pursue. This requires an assessment of each site and analysis of potential resilience-building solutions.

uncle a feasibility analysis is complete and the organization has moved forward with a decision to pursue the project. Resilience Hubpianners will convert the preliminary design into a fully engineered system. Procurement processes will vary with each organization's policies, a detailed discussion of which is outside of the scope here. The process will begin with finding the right team to take your preliminary designs and convert them into a buildable, fully-engineered and permitted project.

Phase 6

Activate Sites & Operate

Resilience Hub managers should have clear plans in place for activating the nub in the event of a disruption, and ongoing operation of the hub in all modes. At its core, the Resilience Hub serves as a central point to design and implement strategies that address root causes of vulnerability and help the community thrive.
