Page 112, Second paragraph to the bottom

Our inserted paragraph:

In 2017, Moloka`i experienced a spike in suicides, particularly among Native Hawaiian men. The death rate due to suicides on Moloka`i in 2001-2005 was already over twice as high as the State's rate. The lack of mental health care providers contributes to the island's mental health burden, and there are inadequate resources available for residents with substance abuse problems.

DHHC's comments:

The Department has identified Ka Hale Pomaikai (KHP) as the only substance abuse treatment center on Molokai. The center provides outpatient services. The site address of the facility is 7533 Kamehameha V Highway, Ualapu'e-Kaunakakai, Hawaii 96748. KHP receives funding from the County of Maui, in addition to State and Federal funding.

In response to your inquiry on the department's recommendation regarding the committee's discussion of adding mental health issues as an action item on Table 9.5 Public Facilities and Services-Health and Social Services, the department recommends adding mental health issues to 9.5.05.

Response:

DHHC confirmed that the island has inadequate mental health care. The paragraph should remain in the Plan.
