Letter: Greetings,

The new developments proposed for Launiupoko will have significant impacts on the existing neighborhood, the nearby reefs and beach parks, and the already intolerable traffic on the West Side.

The first of 3 or 4 subdivisions is now before the Maui County Land Use Committee. It is being considered under a fast-track process that gives the County only 45 days to make a decision, exempts the developers from the usual requirements like an Environmental Impact Statement, and gives the public very limited opportunities for comment.

A hearing on the Makila Kai development is scheduled for Wednesday, May 31, at 1:30 PM at the County Council Chambers in Wailuku.

The area is Grade B (very good) ag land and is presently zoned by the State, County and Community for agricultural use. It is not the right place for high density development on the West Side. If approved, the zoning would be changed and the agricultural designation of this area would be lost forever.

We have signed this petition to urge the County to reject the Makila Kai proposal and require the developer to pursue approvals and permits through the normal planning process.

Honorable Committee Members,

Many issues were raised during testimony on Wednesday:

1. Water rights for local residents
2. Minimum stream flow standards not yet calculated
3. Water quality impacts on shorelines from septic systems (plenty of science to support this)
4. Indisputable traffic and a compromised highway that desperately needs to be moved before someone is killed (we don't want to increase traffic)
5. Safe retreat from fire
6. Low income housing that does little to secure affordable homes in perpetuity for local people

As far as the modification to the conditions on the permit regarding septic:

(c) Each individual wastewater system shall be constructed and operated strictly in accordance with all applicable laws and regulations including HAR 11-62-31 governing individual wastewater systems.

- the laws are inadequate to protect the water table and shoreline from septic systems

(d) Each such system shall be pumped on a regular basis and properly maintained.

- "on a regular basis and properly maintained" is ambiguous and unenforceable

(e) Wastewater system maintenance shall be enforceable by the homeowners' association

- I think we can agree that no homeowners association member is going to take the time to ask for proof of maintenance paperwork from all the residents and inspect their systems. Essentially it is up to the homeowner

to do what they think is right and for low income home owners, these expensive maintenance costs will be a low priority.

I truly hope that in deliberations today that these issues are thoroughly discussed so that the public understands why these are or are not legitimate concerns so that they have the utmost confidence that our elected officials have a good understanding of the issues and can provide sufficient discussion to justify their position. During the decision to urbanize Olowalu, there was very little discussion from councilmembers addressing the dozens of concerned citizens that gave the impression back door deals were being made with special interest groups.

I trust you will encourage your fellow councilmembers to fully vet these concerns in a public forum and justify their position.

Potable: the DLNR water department discussed the fact that Greg Brown's development will mean only 26% of water capacity is used up. this is based on additional 49 units, another 2 upcoming proposed projects suggest 210 more units, total potable water consumption for 259 additional units would be 137.43% of current capacity-thus we would have huge deficit of drinking water in Launiupoko.

Ag water is already a problem, we have frequent disconnections of Ag water, and farms in Launiupoko as well as local Hawaiians crops are already suffering. Thank you for considering these numbers.

Location. I support the creation of housing on Maui which is located near community facilities and important services. Makila Kai residents would be able to drive to Lahaina Town in five minutes or could eventually take the bus, since the project is located along the future Lahaina Bypass Highway.

Community design. Makila Kai is located in an area designated for rural growth by the Maui Island plan. Given this designation and the existing agricultural (large) lots outside the Rural Growth Boundary, Makila Kai's design (mauka agricultural lots, makai rural lots) provides a thoughtful compromise between what exists and what is allowed by the Maui Island Plan.

I would like to voice my opposition to the rezoning from ag to rural for the proposed Makila Kai development.

My husband and I own ag parcels in Makila Plantation I and have been working with NRCS over the past couple of years on a conservation plan and orchard installation on my lots. We already face existing supply and delivery issues with our non-potable and potable water systems in Launiupoko. Increased strain on our water systems with this proposed zoning change is a huge concern for me and I am considering not moving forward with my work with NRCS if ag land is rezoned for Makila Kai.

I encourage the committee to consider possible zoning changes in and around Lahaina town, near commerce, services and closer to the majority of jobs on the west side in the Ka'anapali and Kapalua resorts. I fear that even with the bypass between Olowalu and Hokiokio opening up, there will still be **major** traffic issues on the west side because the bypass is not slated to be expanded north of Keawe or south of Olowalu anytime soon. This could hurt the island's economy and it makes sense to fill in the areas closest to jobs and services first.

Fire evacuation (as well as water resources to fight a major fire) is also a big concern. We already have supply issues with the existing load on our water system.

My name is Steve Strombeck and I live at 24 South Lahoe Place (right across the street from the proposed project).

Every aspect of this project has been deliberately set up in a way to minimize scrutiny by state and county agencies:

1. The bare minimum (i.e., 51%) of the units are "affordable" to take advantage of possible fast-tracking.
2. The lot size for reclassification from State AG to Rural is just under 15 acres to avoid State LUC review.
3. The total number of lots is 49, just under the total number that would trigger heightened environmental review based on the number of septic tanks.

All of the indicators suggest that this is a market-rate project using the "affordable" cloak to bypass normal development channels.

When Mr. Greg Brown's testified before the Planning Committee on May 31, 2017, his true colors were finally revealed for all to see.

In his testimony, Mr. Brown went on and on about how much money he's spent on the land and that if the County did not approve his project he had an "exit strategy" to develop the land as 5 - 6 multi-million dollar AG lots. An "*exit-strategy*"? These are not the words and actions of an individual who is invested in the health of the community. This is the behavior of a man who is just in it for himself. After hearing all of the testimony from locals and descendants of the land, all he could say was "Give me what I want... or else..".

When you look at all of the deficiencies of the project raised in both written and live testimony to this Committee, coupled with the "what's in it for me" attitude of the developer, the Makila Kai project cannot be permitted to proceed. There are so many problems that are unanswered:

- a. There is no conclusion about where irrigation water will come from for the Project. Local resident already face water shortages and the State DLNR concluded that surface water is an issue. In order for the Project to be an agricultural project, water is needed for irrigation and the developer has not demonstrated that water is available for that purpose.
- b. Although Mr. Brown and Mr. Martin claim to be developing their projects independently, that does not mean that the County cannot require them to collectively study the impacts

of their proposed projects. With 200+ homes being developed in an area that close to the shore, there needs to be more scrutiny of the project.

- c. This is not an affordable housing project. 201H requires that the project be primarily or exclusively for affordable housing. Primarily or exclusively to me means the vast majority of units should be affordable (not 51%). The developer is gaming the system and this should not be permitted as it will create precedent for others to claim that all they need to do is provide 51% of the units as affordable to get their projects fast-tracked.
- d. The impact on the environment from the large number of septic systems has not been evaluated and could be catastrophic for the aquifers and coastal resources.
- e. The impact on traffic and life-safety has not been appropriately addressed.

This is not the type of project that is intended for 201H expedited review. I understand that there are urban infill projects waiting to be developed that would permit the workforce to live much closer to their places of employment. These type of high-density, urban infill projects are what the County needs to make an impact on the housing crisis facing Maui.

Please do not approve the Makila Kai project.
