Aloha Chair Rawlins-Fernandez & Committee,

I am pleased to hear updates on the issues surrounding precautionary procedures during this COVID alarm. I have concerns regarding the science behind the decisions made on the state level. It concerns me that \$37 million was spent on thermography and facial recognition when no true science has been shared by the Department of Health. In this, my concerns are exacerbated as I have learned that the State of Hawai'i auditor Les Condo has not been permitted to access emails between the Department of Health and said Governor David Ige. There must be a public hearing to disclose this correspondence in question that is sharply shaping the direction Hawai'i is taking as whole. It is important that this matter is addressed before any more large monies are spent.

Decisions must be made based on sound science and forensic evidence was identified about COVID in 1999. If you haven't already, I would encourage my Council members to watch the short investigative movie, that features Robert F. Kennedy that speaks to corona virus findings and provides a larger perspective of our present day situation. Understanding this background will afford a different and fair lens and the wise steps needed to move forward will materialize.

Two closing points I'd like to make, I would encourage that funds for food distribution consider including outreach to support organic farmers that might not be a member of Farm Bureau or Farm Union.

Lastly, I would to encourage the Office of Economic Development to produce courtesy correspondence as it relates to grantees when there are any changes to grants to any person, non-profit or business that may have applied for. While this may add to an already busy work schedule, it could ultimately save on legal fees that may be incurred due to compliance failure.
