## Aloha BF Chair Hokama,

Per our conversation and your approval in yesterday's meeting on agenda item BF-105 Misc, I am forwarding to you and the BF committee staff my questions on this item.

We must do our due diligence and have the information necessary to make a decision regarding yet another request for funding related to a storm event. There is simply not enough information being given for such a large request.

QUESTIONS COUNCILMEMBER ATAY WOULD LIKE ASKED AND ANSWERED REGARDING BF-105misc PERTAINING TO Emergency Funds v2:

- 1. Has the County applied for and been reimbursed (via FEMA funds) from the first request for Emergency Funds?
- 2. Has the County resolved the issue of doing "emergency work" without a permit, as the Wailuku River falls under FEMA jurisdiction and federal law to obtain FEMA reimbursement?
- 3. Where are the actual line item costs for this new Emergency fund request?
- 4. According to FEMA rules for reimbursement, straight time labor costs are eligible for reimbursement but overtime labor costs are not. The line items furnished with BF-105 identify "overtime" costs. Could labor have been done during normal work hours instead of asking staff to work on nights and weekends (as some county employees have stated)?
- 5. What were the business reasons and cost comparisons associated with the County opting for private pump trucks as opposed to County-owned pump trucks?
- 6. Were the required RFP and bidding process protocols executed fully for all project vendors?
- 7. Is there a complete list of businesses (and associated compensation) that have received funding connected to the storm?
- 8. Do we have an estimate of how many tons of debris, pohaku and other materials have been removed from the river up to today?
