

- Certificate of Vendor Compliance (CVC) (3-months current)
- Certificate of Insurance (COI)
- Registration with Hawaii Attorney General Tax & Charities Division
- IRS Form 990 (most recent year)
- Annual Financial Statements (recent 2 years)
- Internal Revenue Service (IRS) Letter (verifying nonprofit tax exempt status)
- Articles of Incorporation
- By-laws (must include policies on nepotism and conflict of interest)
- Current Board Of Directors (contact info and meeting schedules)
- Fiscal Sponsorship Agreement *(Only for applications from a fiscal sponsor)*

- Application Forms and Checklist are available online on the County of Maui, Department of 'Ōiwi Resources webpage. Hard copies are available at our office. Applications open in September, award notifications November-December for grant period the following January-December.
- Applicants are invited to attend a webinar hosted by the Department of 'Ōiwi Resources each year prior to submitting applications. This presentation includes a general overview and opportunities for applicants to ask specific clarifying questions.
- Applicants are welcome to schedule a meeting with our OIWI Grant Coordinator for further clarification and/or one-on-one assistance. Meeting in-person does not provide an advantage or guarantee an award.



Applications and Awards



- Award amounts range from \$20,000 to \$50,000
- The amount of awards were increased in FY26 from 9 awards to 11 awards.
- 80% of applications in FY26 were new (not repeats from FY25).

'Ōiwi Grant Program FY2024-25 - Conflict of Interest Form

The Department of 'Ōiwi Resources defines a conflict of interest as “an individual’s personal interests—such as relationships, financial investments, or social affiliations—have the potential to influence or interfere with their professional judgment, decisions, or responsibilities.” **A grant reviewer must disclose any actual or potential conflict of interest** related to any and all organizations from which the department receives applications. This is a standard ethical practice to maintain the integrity, fairness, and transparency of the grant review process.

Conflicts of interest can include, but not limited to:

- Employment (current or past) with an applicant organization
- Personal or professional relationships with individuals involved in an application
- Financial interests in the applicant organization
- Serving as a board member, consultant, or volunteer for the applicant organization
- Any situation that could create a perception of bias or lack of impartiality

Once disclosed, the reviewer may be **recused from evaluating** that specific application or participating in related discussions during the grant review process.


TOTAL SCORE

- **81-100 Superior:** Applicant fully addresses all aspects of the review criteria, convincingly demonstrates that it will meet the department’s performance requirements and demonstrates no weaknesses.
- **61-80 Good:** Applicant fully addresses all aspects of the review criteria, convincingly demonstrates a likelihood of meeting the department’s requirements, and demonstrates only a few minor weaknesses.
- **41-60 Satisfactory:** Applicant addresses all aspects of the review criteria and demonstrates the ability to meet the department’s performance requirements. The Application contains weaknesses and/or a number of minor weaknesses.
- **21-40 Marginal:** Applicant addresses all aspects of the review criteria and demonstrates the ability to meet the department’s performance requirements. The Application contains significant weaknesses and/or a significant number of minor weaknesses.
- **4-20 Poor:** Applicant addresses some aspects of the review criteria and demonstrates some doubt in the likelihood of successfully meeting the department’s requirements. Significant weaknesses are demonstrated and clearly outweigh any strength presented.
- **0 Not Acceptable:** Applicant does not address all aspects of the review criteria and the information presented indicates a strong likelihood of failure to meet the department’s requirements.




- **FY25 Awardees are currently in Quarter Three**

- FY25 programs cover: restoration of ecological and cultural health in Moloka'i, watershed data collection in Waiehu, regenerative farming and cultural education in East Maui, growing and distributing historic heritage Hawaiian varieties of Kalo, kō, mai'a, 'awa, and 'uala countywide, native plant restoration and community connection in Mū'olea, community care for ancestral burial places in Waiehu, arts & 'āina field trips islandwide, increasing Hawaiian language proficiency in East Maui, and providing Hawaiian language skill development and mentorship in Wailuku.
