C O N T R A C T

THIS CONTRACT, executed on the respective dates indicated below, is effective as of January 1, 2020, by and between the Department of the Attorney General, State of Hawaii, hereinafter called "Agency," by and through the Attorney General, and the Maui Police Department, whose business address is 55 Mahalani Street, Wailuku, Hawaii 96793 hereinafter called "Grantee."

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, Title I of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968, 34 U. S. C. §§ 10101 et seq., as amended (hereinafter "Act"), was enacted to make grants to states and units of local government, for use by the State or unit of local government to provide additional personnel, equipment, supplies, contractual support, training, technical assistance, and information systems for criminal justice, including for any one or more of the following programs:

- (1) Law enforcement programs.
- (2) Prosecution and court programs.

- (3) Prevention and education programs.
- (4) Corrections and community corrections programs.
- (5) Drug treatment and enforcement programs.
- (6) Planning, evaluation, and technology improvement programs.
- (7) Crime victim and witness programs (other than compensation).
- (8) Mental health programs and related law enforcement and corrections programs.

WHEREAS, the Governor has designated Agency to serve as Hawaii's office for administering the federal financial assistance available under the Act;

WHEREAS, Grantee, as an agency of the County of Maui, is qualified to receive funds available to Hawaii under the Act and its respective implementing regulations, contained in the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) State Solicitation, and the Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements in 2 C.F.R. Part 200, as adopted and supplemented by the Department of Justice in 2 C.F.R. Part 2800 (together, the "Part 200 Uniform Requirements"), and has applied to Agency for receipt of the same as a subgrantee;

WHEREAS, Agency has reviewed Grantee's application for funds, and is satisfied that all of the requirements of the Act and its respective implementing regulations have been satisfied and that Grantee is capable of using the requested federal funds appropriately;

WHEREAS, Grantee has demonstrated the capacity to provide the services, programs and activities described herein and is ready, willing and able to provide the required services, programs and activities;

NOW THEREFORE, Agency and Grantee for and in consideration of the covenants, conditions, agreements, and stipulations hereinafter expressed, do mutually agree as follows:

A. SCOPE OF SERVICES.

Grantee shall, in a proper and satisfactory manner, as determined by Agency, and in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Contract, use the funds received under this Contract for the purposes stated herein and in accordance with the "Application For Grant" (Parts I through IV including all certifications required under Section C) and the

Acceptance of JAG Special Conditions attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and by reference incorporated herein. It is understood that this Contract includes as a part hereof any rules, relevant directives or instructions issued by the United States or the Agency, including the provisions of the federal Office of Management and Budget's Uniform Guidance and the effective edition of the Department of Justice Programs' financial manual entitled "DOJ Grants Financial Guide."

B. TERM OF CONTRACT.

This Contract shall be in effect for the period from January 1, 2020 to and including December 31, 2020 unless this Contract is sooner terminated as hereinafter provided or unless this Contract is extended in accordance with Section L. of this Contract.

C. PERFORMANCE REQUIREMENTS AND CONDITIONS.

1. Grantee shall comply with the guidelines set forth in the Act and all applicable federal regulations and guidelines, including but not limited to guidance issued by the Bureau of Justice Assistance, Part 200 Uniform Requirements, and the effective edition of the "DOJ Grants Financial Guide."

2. Grantee shall comply with all the ordinances, codes, rules and regulations of the Federal, State

and local government which in any way affect its performance under this Contract.

3. Grantee shall provide for an independent audit of its activities on a periodic basis in accordance with Part 200 Uniform Requirements.

4. Prior to, or concurrently with the execution of this Contract, if so required by Agency, Grantee shall complete, execute and submit to Agency a Certification Regarding Drug-Free Workplace Requirements which meets the requirements of the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988 (Pub. L. 100-690, Title V, Subtitle D, U.S.C., Title 41, Chapter 10, §702), hereinafter referred to as the "Drug-Free Workplace Certification." A copy of the Drug-Free Workplace Certification shall be included in Part IV of the Application for Grant. Grantee covenants that the representations made in the Drug-Free Workplace Certification are true at the time this Contract is executed and will remain true throughout the entire term of this Contract and any extensions, and that Grantee shall fulfill all the requirements set forth therein. Grantee's execution and submission of a false Drug-Free Workplace Certification, or Grantee's violation of any or all of the requirements set forth therein shall entitle Agency to suspend one or more payments under this Contract, and/or terminate this Contract pursuant to the provisions of Section N of this Contract. Grantee warrants

that it is aware that such false certification or violation of the requirements contained in the Drug-Free Workplace Certification shall subject the State of Hawaii to government-wide suspension or debarment, or other sanctions which, in turn, shall result in the withdrawal of funds from Grantee and/or the unavailability of future funding for Grantee.

5. Prior to, or concurrently with the execution of this Contract, Grantee shall complete, execute and submit to Agency a Certification Regarding Debarment, Suspension, Ineligibility and Voluntary Exclusion, hereinafter referred to as the "Debarment Certification." A copy of the Debarment Certification shall be included in Part IV of the Application for Grant. Grantee covenants that the representations made in the Debarment Certification are true at the time this Contract is executed and will remain true throughout the entire term of the Contract and any extensions, and that Grantee shall fulfill any and all terms and conditions set forth therein.

6. Prior to, or concurrently with the execution of this Contract, Grantee shall complete, execute and submit to Agency a Certification of Non-Supplanting, hereinafter referred to as the "Non-Supplanting Certification." A copy of the Non-Supplanting Certification shall be included in Part IV of the Application for Grant. Grantee covenants that the representations made in the Non-Supplanting Certification are

true at the time this Contract is executed and will remain true throughout the entire term of the Contract and any extensions, and that Grantee shall fulfill any and all terms and conditions set forth therein.

7. Prior to, or concurrently with the execution of this Contract, if so required by Agency, Grantee shall complete, execute and submit to Agency a Certification Regarding Lobbying, hereinafter referred to as the "Lobbying Certification." and any subsequent disclosure forms required under Section 1352, Title 31 U. S. C. A copy of the Lobbying Certification shall be included in Part IV of the Application for Grant. Grantee covenants that the representations made in the Lobbying Certification are true at the time this Contract is executed and will remain true throughout the entire term of the Contract and any extensions, and that Grantee shall fulfill any and all terms and conditions set forth therein.

8. Grantee shall comply with the non-discrimination requirements of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 which prohibits discrimination in employment and in the delivery of services or benefits on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, or sex; Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 which prohibits discrimination in the delivery of services or benefits on the basis of race, color, or national origin; Section 504 of the

Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 which prohibit discrimination in employment and in the delivery of services or benefits based on disability; Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 which prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex in training or educational programs; the Age Discrimination Act of 1975 which prohibits discrimination in the delivery of services or benefits on the basis of age; the Department of Justice regulations implementing the above-referenced statutes at 28 C.F.R. Part 42, subpts. C, D, G, and I, 28 C.F.R. Part 35, and 28 C.F.R. Part 54; Exec. Order No. 13559, 28 C.F.R. Part 38 (equal protection of the laws for faith-based and other neighborhood organizations); Exec. Order No. 13166 and U.S. Department of Justice, Guidance to Federal Financial Assistance Recipients Regarding Title VI Prohibition Against National Origin Discrimination Affecting Limited English Proficient Persons; the Hawaii State Fair Employment Practices Act, Chapter 378, Hawaii Revised Statutes; and all other applicable federal and state laws, rules and regulations.

9. Grantee assures Agency that if it is required to formulate an Equal Employment Opportunity Program in accordance with 28 C.F.R. §§ 42.301 et seq. it will submit a certification to Agency that a current program is on file.

10. Grantee shall maintain accounting procedures and practices acceptable to Agency, and books, records, documents and other evidence which sufficiently, accurately and properly reflect all direct and indirect expenditures and all interest or other income earned as the result of funds provided pursuant to this Contract. Grantee shall ensure that its own books, records, and documents are available for inspection, reviews or audits at all reasonable times by Agency or the United States Department of Justice. In addition, Grantee shall prepare and submit to the Agency reports in such form and at such times as Agency or the Bureau of Justice Assistance may require. Grantee shall submit quarterly financial reports fifteen (15) calendar days after the end of each calendar quarter. Grantee shall submit monthly requests for funds and cash balance reports fifteen (15) calendar days after the end of each month. The final fiscal reports must be received by Agency within sixty (60) days after the date this Contract terminates or unless mandated earlier by Agency. Records and financial accounts shall be retained by the Grantee and shall be accessible to Agency and the United States Department of Justice for at least three years after Agency's grant with the Bureau of Justice Assistance is closed.

11. The final drawdown for funds must be received by Agency within thirty (30) days after the date this Contract terminates.

12. Any funds provided to Grantee under this Contract which are unencumbered on the date this Contract terminates shall be returned to Agency; all funds provided under this Contract which are encumbered but not disbursed within sixty (60) days after this Contract terminates shall be returned to Agency.

13. Grantee shall submit progress reports as required for the Act funds to Agency as stipulated under Part IV. of the Application for Grant, Attachments, Acceptance of JAG Special Conditions.

14. If so required by Agency, Grantee shall certify to Agency that any expendable or nonexpendable personal property purchased or acquired with funds received under this Contract will be used for criminal justice purposes before title in such property may vest in Grantee. Grantee shall submit a certification to Agency within thirty (30) days after the date this Contract terminates. If a certification is not provided by Grantee, title to any personal property purchased or acquired with funds received under this Contract shall vest in Agency and such personal property shall be delivered to the Agency in good

working order upon expiration or sooner termination of this Contract.

D. PERSONNEL.

1. Grantee shall secure at its own expense all personnel required to perform the services required under this Contract. All such personnel shall not be considered employees of, or have any contractual relationship with the State of Hawaii unless Grantee is otherwise an agency of the State.

2. Grantee shall ensure that none of the work or services to be provided under this Contract shall be subcontracted or assigned without the prior written approval of Agency.

E. SUBCONTRACTS.

Grantee may provide some or all of the services required under this Contract by subcontract provided that Grantee secures the prior written consent of Agency. In the event Grantee enters into a subcontract with a private organization to perform any of the services or activities required under this Contract, Grantee agrees that the period of each subcontract shall not exceed the term of this Contract, and funds to the private organization will not be released unless and until the requirements set forth in applicable state law and

implementing rules are complied with by the subcontractor. All subcontracts shall include provisions to ensure that Grantee is capable of satisfying the requirements of this Contract. All subcontracts shall be reduced to writing and shall include all provisions of this Contract required of Grantee.

F. SERVICES AS INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR.

1. In the performance of the services required under this Contract, Grantee shall be an independent contractor with the authority to control and direct the performance and details of the work and services required under this Contract; however, Agency shall have the right to inspect work in progress to determine whether, in Agency's opinion, the work is being performed by Grantee in accordance with the provisions of this Contract. All persons hired or used by Grantee shall be Grantee's agents and employees and Grantee shall be responsible for the accuracy, completeness, and adequacy of any and all work and services performed by its agents and employees. Furthermore, Grantee intentionally, voluntarily, and knowingly assumes the sole and entire liability if such liability is determined to exist, to its agents and employees or to third persons, for all loss, cost, damage or injury caused by Grantee's agents and employees in the course of their employment. The performance of work under this Contract alone shall not be construed as

employment with the State of Hawaii and shall not entitle Grantee's agents and employees to vacation, sick leave, retirement, or other benefits directly afforded state employees by statutes. Grantee shall be responsible for payment of all applicable federal, state, and county fees which may become due and owing by the Grantee by reason of the Contract, including but not limited to (i) income taxes, (ii) employment related fees, assessments and taxes and (iii) general excise taxes. The Grantee also is responsible for obtaining all licenses, permits and certificates that may be required in order to perform this Contract.

2. This section shall not be applicable if Grantee is an agency of the State of Hawaii.

G. COMPENSATION.

1. Subject to continuing availability of funds, Agency agrees to pay Grantee, for services satisfactorily performed under this Contract, a sum not to exceed sixty-three thousand, nine hundred eighty and 00/100 dollars (\$63,980.00) to be spent for the purposes of this Contract. This sum represents any and all compensation to be paid to Grantee for any and all services it provides, and for any and all travel costs, materials, supplies, equipment, overhead, taxes, and other

incidentals and operating expenses which it incurs or may incur in connection with this Contract.

2. It is covenanted and agreed by and between the parties hereto that, as to the portion of the obligation under this Contract to be payable out of federal funds, this Contract shall be construed to be an agreement to pay such portion to the Grantee only out of federal funds to be received from the federal government when the federal funds are so received and shall not be construed as a general agreement to pay such portion at all events out of any funds other than those which are received from the federal government.

H. METHOD OF PAYMENT.

1. All funds available for use under this Contract shall be subject to the allotment system as provided in Chapter 37, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

2. Payments to Grantee under this Contract shall be made in accordance with and subject to the following provisions:

a. Payments shall be made monthly upon receipt of Grantee's completed request for funds.

b. All payments shall be made in accordance with and subject to Chapter 40, Hawaii Revised Statutes, which specifies the accounting procedures and controls

applicable to payments out of the Treasury of the State of Hawaii.

c. If an amount of reported expenditures is preliminarily determined by Agency to be inappropriate and unallowable, Agency may deduct an equivalent amount from the next payable installment and may withhold payment of the amount of the moneys equivalent to the questioned expenditures until later resolution of the discrepancy by audit or other means. If, after payment of the last installment, investigation and examination reveal additional expenditures that are determined by Agency to be inappropriate and unallowable, Agency may require that an equivalent amount of moneys be refunded to Agency notwithstanding Agency's preliminary determination of appropriateness and allowability.

d. Failure to submit required reports by the applicable deadline will result in the withholding of payments until such time as the reports are received by Agency. Grantee shall continue to provide the services, programs and activities during the period that payments are being withheld.

I. INDEMNIFICATION.

1. It is strictly understood that the State of Hawaii shall in no way be held liable for any damages, cause of action or suits resulting from the acts, activities, or

omissions of Grantee. Grantee shall indemnify and save harmless the State of Hawaii, Agency, and their officers, agents, and employees from and against any and all liability, loss, actions, claims, suits, damages, costs or expenses, including all attorneys' fees, and all claims, suits, and demands therefor, arising out of or resulting from the acts or omissions of Grantee, its officers, employees, agents, or subcontractors occurring during or in connection with the performance of Grantee's services under this Contract, or arising out of or resulting from breach of this Contract by Grantee. Grantee shall defend the State of Hawaii, Agency, and their officers, agents, and employees against any such action or claim unless the action or claim involves an act or omission solely of Agency, its officers, agents, or employees.

2. This section shall not be applicable if Grantee is an agency of the State of Hawaii.

3. The County of Maui will indemnify the State of Hawaii, Agency, and their officers, agents, and employees to the extent permitted by law, and it is understood that payment is subject to approval by the county council/or city council, as the case may be.

J. CONFIDENTIAL MATERIAL.

Any information, data, report, record, summary, table, map, or study given to or prepared or assembled by Grantee under this Contract which is identified as proprietary or confidential information that Agency requests to be kept confidential shall be safeguarded by the Grantee and shall not be made available to any individual or organization other than any subcontractor to which the material may relate, without prior written approval of Agency. Grantee shall submit a completed Privacy Certification for review and approval prior to the expenditure of funds for the collection of identifiable research/statistical data. All information, data, or other material provided by the Grantee or the Agency shall be kept confidential only to the extent permitted by law. Grantee shall comply with the requirements of Chapters 487J, 487N and 487R, Hawaii Revised Statutes as applicable.

K. COPYRIGHT AND PATENT.

The Agency shall have complete ownership of all material, both finished and unfinished, which is developed, prepared, assembled, or conceived by the Grantee pursuant to this Contract, and all such material shall be considered "works made for hire." No summary, report, map, chart, graph, table, study or other documents or discovery, invention, or development produced in whole or in part with funds made available under

this Contract shall be the subject of an application for copyright or patent by or on behalf of Grantee, its officers, agents, or its employees, or its subcontractors without prior written authorization from Agency. To the extent that any material, summary, report, map, chart, graph, table, study, or other documents, or discovery, invention, or development under this Contract is not recognized as a "work made for hire" as a matter of law, Grantee hereby assigns to the Agency any and all copyrights in and to the material.

L. MODIFICATION OF CONTRACT.

Any modification or change in any term, provision, or condition of this Contract shall be made by written amendment signed by both the Grantee and the Attorney General; provided, however, that the Administrator of the Crime Prevention and Justice Assistance Division or the Administrator's designee (hereinafter, "CPJA Administrator") may, on the Agency's behalf and to the extent permitted by law, approve the following when requested by the Grantee: (a) changes to the budget categories set forth in Part III of Exhibit A, provided that there is no change to the total compensation under this Contract; and (b) extensions of the Grantee's Time of Performance, provided that there is no change to the total compensation under this Contract. Any such

requests by the Grantee shall be submitted in writing to the Agency no later than forty-five (45) days before the Contract would otherwise terminate and, if approved, shall be effective as of the date approved by the CPJA Administrator.

M. CONFLICT OF INTEREST.

Grantee represents that it presently has no interest and promises that it shall not acquire any interest, direct or indirect, that would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance of the services under this Contract.

N. TERMINATION OF CONTRACT.

1. If, for any cause, Grantee refuses or fails to satisfactorily fulfill in a timely or proper manner its obligations under this Contract or any extension thereof, or if Grantee breaches any of the promises, terms or conditions of this Contract and, having been given reasonable notice of and opportunity to cure any such default, fails to take satisfactory corrective action within the time specified by Agency, Agency shall have the right to terminate this Contract by giving written notice to Grantee of such termination ten (10) calendar days before the effective date of such termination. The Grantee shall continue performance of the Contract to the extent it is not terminated. Notwithstanding termination of the Contract,

and subject to any directions from the Agency, the Grantee shall take timely, reasonable, and necessary action to protect and preserve property in the possession of the Grantee in which the Agency has an interest.

2. Furthermore, Agency may terminate this Contract without statement of cause at any time by giving written notice to Grantee of such termination at least thirty (30) calendar days before the effective date of such termination.

3. In the event of termination of either type, all finished or unfinished documents, reports, summaries, lists, charts, graphs, maps, or other written material prepared by Grantee, under this Contract shall, at the option of Agency, become Agency's property and, together with all information, data, reports, records, maps, and other materials (if any) provided to Grantee by Agency, shall be delivered and surrendered to Agency on or before the effective date of termination.

4. Grantee shall be entitled to receive only such compensation as shall have been satisfactorily earned prior to the effective date of termination. Agency shall determine the amount of work satisfactorily completed and the amount of compensation satisfactorily earned. If the termination is for cause, any other provisions to the contrary notwithstanding,

Grantee shall not be relieved of liability to Agency for damages sustained by Agency because of any breach by Grantee of this Contract.

O. WAIVER.

The failure of the Agency to insist upon strict compliance with any term, provision, or condition of this Contract shall not constitute or be deemed to constitute a waiver or relinquishment of the Agency's right to enforce the same in accordance with this Contract. It is expressly understood and agreed that no waiver granted by Agency on account of any violation of any promise, term or condition of this Contract shall constitute or be construed in any manner as a waiver of the promise, term or condition or of the right to enforce the same as to any other or further violation.

P. DISPUTES; GOVERNING LAW; VENUE.

Any dispute concerning a matter of fact arising under this Contract or any subcontract, which is not disposed of by mutual agreement within fifteen (15) calendar days, shall be decided by the Attorney General, or the Attorney General's duly designated representative, who shall reduce the decision to writing and mail or otherwise furnish a copy of the decision to Grantee. The decision of such person shall be final and

conclusive. Pending final decision of such dispute, Grantee shall proceed diligently with the performance of this Contract in accordance with Agency's request. The validity of this Contract and any of its terms or provisions, as well as the rights and duties of the parties to this Contract, shall be governed by the laws of the State of Hawaii. Except as otherwise provided in this Section, any action to enforce this Contract or for breach of this Contract shall be brought only in a State court of competent jurisdiction in Honolulu, Hawaii.


Q. ADDITIONAL CONDITIONS.

PART II. DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT

A. THE PROBLEM

An exponential increase in the prevalence of personal technology such as smart phones, tablets, computers, social media, cloud-based services etc., is demanding the need to properly investigate these and other technologies as they often contain critical, perishable, and highly volatile evidence. While there has been an exponential increase of personal technology, there has not been a corresponding increase in the resources and training available to local law enforcement to properly conduct investigations in relation to those technologies.

Throughout Maui County, the State of Hawaii, and indeed the entire U.S. as a whole, law enforcement agencies lag behind the rest of society in the rise of technology. To deal with the problem, law enforcement agencies are scrambling to acquire specialized tools, training, and equipment as quickly as possible so that investigators are trained and equipped to deal with high tech crimes and technology-based evidence. However, the cost of obtaining the necessary tools, training, and equipment routinely exceeds the funding available to local law enforcement agencies, as is the case with Maui County and the Maui Police Department.

This is a continuation project to address the problem through funding to help the Maui Police Department: (1) obtain necessary specialized tools and equipment to increase the department's digital forensic capabilities as well as to provide the ability to self-sustain digital forensics abilities in the event of federal equipment being recalled and (2) provide funding for training and certification for current and new forensic examiners that is provided by industry recognized training and certification bodies.

The initial funding period provided some of the basic necessities of any digital forensics lab including basic examination tools and equipment. This continuation project builds upon that through the request of more advanced equipment to handle special situations. Specifically, it seeks to provide a machine designed to handle the intense processing demands of password cracking and other processor-heavy forensic tasks and then to then equip that machine with the tools appropriate to handling those tasks. The MPD lab currently lacks both the equipment and the tools used for password cracking and other types of forensic processing designed to defeat security and encryption. Encryption and passwords are not new security methods; however, usage has increased recently due to the media attention on privacy issues.

The second portion seeks to continue to provide funding to help offset costs of sending personnel to digital forensics training and certification courses that would otherwise be out of reach due to cost.

This project targets the entirety of Maui County, including our outer island population. All aspects of our county's population, from businesses to individuals are impacted by high tech crimes that involve digital evidence and the forensic recovery of that evidence, examples of which include identity theft, theft, intellectual property theft, and extortion. These crimes occur county-wide and affect citizens in all areas.

Presently, the Maui Police Department, like most other law enforcement agencies, faces a daunting task in dealing with high tech crimes. The workload of the Cybercrime Unit is immense and there is currently one detective assigned full time and one reserve Officer assigned part time to the Cybercrime Unit. The detective's workload includes digital forensics, internet investigations, assistance to other units and detectives with tech investigations, and administrative tasks. The reserve officer assists specifically with mobile device examinations, which make up the majority of the digital forensics work. The number of digital forensic examinations has increased over the past two years since the Cybercrime Unit was formed. For example, the Cybercrime Unit has averaged 100 digital forensic examination requests per year for the two years that this unit has been in existence. The majority are handled by one detective in addition to his other administrative tasks and non forensics case work.

This continuation of grant funding request aims to build upon the funding of the initial grant and continue to reduce turn around time on digital forensic examinations through the acquisition of additional forensic tools and training that would help improve workflow and provide for additional examination options and techniques. Previous turn around times of six (6) months have already started to drop to between four (4) and five (5) months and are expected to drop more as more grant-funded evidence management and forensic systems come online.

This continuation of grant funding also seeks to provide additional training to digital forensic examiners for MPD. The training is cost prohibitive, but vital. Grant funding to help offset the cost allows for quicker approvals for training and reduces the likelihood of denial. The training is essential to the criminal just process, specifically the proper examination and admission of evidence into court proceedings.

The project also seeks to continue to provide funding to help offset costs of sending first responders and detectives who come into contact with digital evidence and investigations prior to Cybercrime Unit involvement to introductory level and basic training events. Such training is necessary to reduce the likelihood of mishandled digital evidence. An example of such mishandling of evidence occurred within the Vice unit, when a cellular phone of a suspect was remotely wiped, while the suspect was in custody. In addition to this, phones are frequently submitted to the lab without proper network isolation, resulting in calls, messages, and other events occurring while in evidence storage of the police department. This has occurred over a dozen times in the past two years but has luckily not resulted in the destruction of evidence. The grant seeks to continue to partially remedy this situation by sending some of the department's detectives and personnel to training events which features digital evidence recovery. The initial grant funding provided to MPD has so far funded four (4) investigators to attend a cybercrime

training event. Since that training, all four (4) have improved the digital evidence recovery in their respective units.

MPD has worked over the past years diligently to establish and maintain a Cybercrime Unit and digital forensics capabilities. Initial grant funding has provided great assistance with that so far and this application for continued funding seeks to build upon those gains.

Resources:

There are presently no local resources available for this project. Locally budgeted funds are allocated in the fiscal year 2020 budget to cover recurring costs associated with forensic tool licensing that were purchased through the initial grant funding. Federal funding has also been allocated for different aspects of the projected, but those funds have not yet been released for use and there is no estimate as to when they will be released. The allocated federal funds are allocated for different expenses than what are included in this request.

B. GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

GOAL: To continue to improve digital forensic capabilities.

OBJECTIVE: To continue to reduce the turnaround time for digital forensics examinations from an average time of four (4) to five (5) months to an average time of two (2) to three (3) months.

OBJECTIVE: To increase forensic capacity from two (2) to three (3) concurrent examinations through acquisition of additional forensic tools and licenses

OBJECTIVE: To increase the knowledge, skills, and abilities of two digital forensic practitioners in the department through attendance of specialized training in digital forensics.

OBJECTIVE: To increase the knowledge, skills, and abilities of first responders and detectives in the area of digital evidence recovery through attendance at training events that cover basic principles of digital forensics and digital investigations. The project aims to provide training to eight (8) investigators through attendance at two (2) of the premier events that involve cyber, internet, computer, and digital forensics examinations and evidence handling.

C. PROJECT ACTIVITIES

Overall Strategy / Outlook and Anticipated Results:

To address the overall problem described in this grant, the Maui County Police Department will continue to take a two (2) pronged approach started through the initial

grant funding to address continued needs of equipment and training; namely the purchase of equipment and funding for training

The first prong will address the continuing need for additional digital forensics tools. Funding will be used to assist with purchases and initial licensing of tools for computer, mobile, and other digital forensics.

Specifically, there is a need for an advanced forensics machine capable of processing intensive activities such as password and encryption cracking, file verification and hashing of large amounts of data, and advanced graphical examinations and analysis. MPD currently does not possess a forensic workstation that is purpose-built to handle these types of tasks. This poses a problem as most general purpose forensic workstations are good for most of the general examinations and lab work, but fall short of the processing power necessary for the advanced tasks. The advanced forensics machine would provide the necessary processing power to dramatically reduce the time needed to complete these tasks. The main benefit of this machine would be that it would reduce the time needed to complete processor intensive tasks and allow the completion of tasks, such as encryption cracking, that are currently not attempted due to equipment limitations. By having this ability, the overall processing time will be reduced as the need to enlist help from outside agencies will be minimized. In addition, when not in use for advanced tasks, the machine could also function as an additional workstation to help the lab conduct three (3) concurrent investigations as stated in the objectives of the project

The second prong will continue to address the need for specialized training of digital forensic practitioners and basic training for detectives and first responders through the use of funding to offset some of the high costs associated with training including travel and registration fees.

Training:

The training goals remain the same from the initial grant funding awarded to this project. Namely, to continue to assist with funding of training for forensic examiners and first responders in the following training areas:

Basic and Advanced Cellular Phone Forensics and Analysis which is necessary to properly retrieve and analyze evidence from cellular phones. Cellular telephones are present at nearly every crime scene and often contain valuable digital evidence. Training in the field of mobile forensics is constantly necessary due to the rapid advances in the technology.

Basic and Advanced Computer Forensics and Analysis which is necessary to properly retrieve and analyze evidence from computers. This training would set the basis for personnel to obtain a computer forensics certification. Due to the prevalence of computers at many crime scenes or the use of computers to commit crimes and the rapidly evolving technology, training is constantly necessary in this area.

Basic procedures for handling and preparing digital evidence for non Cyber crime Unit investigators. This training would address the need to have personnel familiar with proper handling procedures when first contacting and recovering digital evidence to help ensure the integrity of the evidence while preserving it from potential damage and destruction.

Equipment Purchases:

The request for continued funding for forensics tools seeks to build upon the previous grant funding allocation to help offset the cost for the purchase of additional forensics tools and licenses.

Scheduling and Timeline:

This project is a multi-year endeavor. The initial approval of grant funds covered March 1, 2019 to December 31, 2019. This continuation request would cover from January 1, 2020 to December 31, 2020.

Purchases authorized under the continuation of grant funding would take place likely in the first and second quarters of 2020. Specifically, purchase of the advanced forensic machine would be targeted for January or February 2020 with validation taking place upon receipt and prior to being placed into service.

Training events covered by the continued funding are tentatively scheduled to take place in April, May, and October of 2020. Travel to/from the events would occur to ensure attendees arrive the day before and leave the day after each event. This project will provide funding to cover travel, subsistence, and registration.

- The first training event, the National Cyber Crime Conference is usually scheduled the last week of April and will be attended by four investigators that will be selected from the Juvenile Section and Criminal Investigation Division as these sections most frequently encounter digital investigations and evidence.
- The second training event, the International Association of Computer Investigative Specialists annual training event is scheduled for April 27 to May 8, 2020. This event will be attended by two (2) digital forensic examiners targeting the Basic Computer Forensic Examiner (BCFE) class, the Mobile Device Forensics (MDF) class, or the Windows Forensic Examiner class (WFE). Each of these classes affords the attendees an opportunity to attain certification through IACIS in the respective subject matter.
- The last class attended would be the Northwest Regional ICAC Conference in October of 2020. Four investigators specializing in internet-based sexual crimes would be selected for this event, which focuses on digital forensics, digital investigations, and collection of evidence related to internet child sexual crimes.

Impact:

This project is already seeing impacts in the following areas and with the requested continued funding; these impacts are expected to grow:

Continued increases the frequency, accessibility, and usefulness of digital evidence in criminal investigations.

Continued improvement in the abilities of investigators to detect, investigate, and prosecute crimes such as sex crimes that occur exclusively over the internet or dark web which would otherwise go undetected.

Continued improvements in the knowledge, skills, and abilities of digital forensic examiners within MPD.

D. PROJECT ORGANIZATION AND MANAGEMENT

The project manager will have the following proposed duties and responsibilities:

File requests for the purchase tools and services to be utilized for hi technology and digital forensic investigations.

Oversee and coordinate the installation and setup of purchased forensic tools to ensure that such forensic tools are installed and set up in a manner that is consistent with industry best practices or any applicable laws and regulations.

Coordinate the training of police personnel attending training using grant funds.

The project manager reports to the Captain of the Criminal Investigation Division and will be required to provide monthly status reports that includes details on the progress of this project, including details about purchases, case work, hours logged, and training conducted.

The fiscal officer will have the following proposed duties and responsibilities:

Purchase of forensic tools and services to be utilized for technology and cybercrime investigations.

Facilitate payments and travel arrangements for personnel attending training events.

Conduct periodic audits of budget worksheets associated with the project.

This fiscal officer reports to the Department Business Administrator, who conducts periodic audits and inspections of financial records.

E. PERSONNEL

No new positions are to be staffed as part of this project. All Cybercrime Unit personnel

and any new personnel who may come on board in the next year are all already employees of MPD.

F. BRIEF PERSONNEL BIOGRAPHIES

The project manager for this Cybercrime Unit Enhancement project is Detective Matthew Bigoss. Detective Bigoss is a fourteen (14) year Maui Police Department veteran who has served as a patrol officer, crime reduction unit (plain clothes) officer, vice narcotics investigator, patrol sergeant, and currently as a police detective. Starting during his time in the Crime Reduction Unit, Detective Bigoss has established himself as the Maui Police Department's resident expert on high tech crime investigations involving telecommunications, internet, social media, and digital communications technologies. He also now the only trained digital forensic examiner for the Maui Police Department. This experience has given him a unique perspective on the technology gap that exists between general society and law enforcement as well as the opportunity to try to close that gap.

G. PARTICIPATING AGENCIES

The only participating agency in this proposed initiative is the Maui Police Department.

H. PERFORMANCE INDICATORS/OUTCOME MEASURES

GOAL: To improve digital forensic and evidence capabilities.

To measure the performance/outcome in this area, the following data will be collected:

- Number of digital forensic examinations by month.
- Number of other digital evidence examinations and analyses per month.
- Length of time from initial seizure until completion of reports for all forensic examinations.
- The number of hours spent on examinations per month, with indications as to whether or not the hours are regular time or over time. reported on a monthly basis.
- Inventory of equipment purchased with grants funds.

Progress in this area will be measured and tracked through the Cybercrime unit's internal tracking system. The system is still being developed but will track certain key times such as intake, start of processing, completion of processing, and completion of reporting,

The number of man hours of training on a yearly basis that occurred through grant funded training events.

- Topic, provider, location, and number of hours, for each training course attended per investigator per month.
- A yearly summary of training hours and topics per investigator and any certifications received.

I. PROBABILITY TO IMPROVE THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM AND SUSTAINABILITY PLAN

This project seeks to improve the efficacy of digital evidence recovery, management, and reporting for criminal prosecutions occurring within the County of Maui through the use of new specialized tools and equipment as well as through increased training. The improved workflow and management of digital evidence and forensics will in turn allow for more usage of digital evidence in court which may lead to more convictions. Additional convictions will help keep repeat offenders off of the streets, improving quality of life for all citizens.

The main purpose of requesting this grant funding assistance is to provide the Maui Police Department with funds to establish an evidence management system, increase digital forensic capabilities, and to increase training. The cost estimated for this funding is \$63980.00. The applicant is committed to continuing funding after JAG funding can no longer be used. The applicant will seek funding necessary to continue the project and maintain equipment purchased as part of this project through annual budget requests and continued partnerships with other state and federal agencies.

Looking towards long term, MPD will transition costs from grant funding to funding through the annual operating budget of the police department, starting with Fiscal Year 2021.

\$24180.00 is being requested for the cost of travel and subsistence associated with sending personnel to three training events on the Mainland. Allowable travel rates are in accordance with MPD's travel policies and procedures and generally include:

- Roundtrip airfare (fares not to exceed rate cap as determined by Maui County Finance Department on a trip by trip basis)
- Per diem allowance rate per 24-hour day or fraction thereof = \$145/day for out of state travel Per diem breakdown for out of state travel includes \$60/day meals + \$85/day lodging allowance.
- Per diem per 24-hour day or fraction thereof of is budgeted at \$90 interstate travel.
- Excess lodging is allowable for amounts exceeding the basic per diem allowance for lodging costs. (Cost of excess lodging was not included in budgeted amounts and paid for by the County)
- Ground transportation shall be by way of public transportation at a reasonable daily rate. However, rental vehicle may be used if deemed more cost efficient.
- Miscellaneous costs, such as baggage fees, are reimbursable costs when employees travel for official purposes.

The first training, for two (2) personnel (Cyber Crime Unit Detective, Reserve Detective) is to Basic Computer Forensic Examiner (BCFE) training and certification offered through the International Association of Computer Investigative Specialists (IACIS). This training is one of the premier computer forensic training and certification programs in the world. It is offered once a year in Orlando, FL. MPD personnel would look to attend the training April 27-May 8, 2020.

The second training event is to send four (4) detectives and investigators from the Cyber Crime Unit, and other elements of MPD that routinely recover digital evidence or assist in cyber investigations to the National Cyber Crime Conference in Norwood, MA in April of 2020. This training focuses on cyber crime investigative techniques, digital forensics, and digital evidence recovery and management. The detectives going to this event are detectives who primarily recovery, seize, handle, and examine digital evidence.

The third training event is to send four (4) cybercrime and child sex crimes detectives to the Northwest Regional Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Conference in Seattle, WA in October of 2020. This event is one of the premiere training events dealing with digital evidence recovery, preservation, and prosecution techniques as it relates to computer crimes and crimes against children.

F. Equipment

\$30,200.00 is being requested for forensic tool purchases.

\$16,000.00 would be for a GPU PowerStation system from Digital Intelligence or a similar product. This is a purpose-built, password cracking and advanced forensics machine with enough processing power to run multiple password attacks, and advanced imaging and file verifications and hashing which are often processor and resource intensive processes. MPD currently has no password cracking or advanced forensic machines.

\$13,000.00 would be for MSAB Office. MSAB Office is a complete digital forensic tool suite that handles the processing of mobile devices, GPS devices, drones, vehicle infotainment systems, and other portable electronic devices. The purchase of this suite of tools would increase capacity for concurrent examinations and provide a solution for vehicles and drones that is currently lacking in the MPD lab.

\$1200.00 would be for the purchase of a password and encryption cracking tool which would be a purpose-designed forensic software tool for running password and encryption cracking attacks and harnessing the power of the advanced forensics machine requested above. MPD currently has no password cracking forensic tool.

G. Other Costs

\$6200.00 is being requested to cover the cost of registration for the IACIS BCFE training course for two investigators, (\$3100.00 each).

\$1600.00 is being requested to cover the cost of registration for four (4) investigators for the National Cyber Crime Conference (\$400.00 each).

\$1800.00 is being requested to cover the cost of three (3) rental vehicles, one to be used at each of the training events listed under the travel section.

Among other things, CPJAD may withhold award funds, disallow costs, or suspend or terminate the award. The Department of Justice and CPJAD also may take other legal action as appropriate.

Any materially false, fictitious, or fraudulent statement to the state and/or federal government related to this award (or concealment or omission of a material fact) may be the subject of criminal prosecution (including under 18 U.S.C. 1001 and/or 1621, and/or 34 U.S.C. 10271-10273), and also may lead to imposition of civil penalties and administrative remedies for false claims or otherwise (including under 31 U.S.C. 3729-3730 and 3801-3812).

Should any provision of a requirement of this award be held to be invalid or unenforceable by its terms, that provision shall first be applied with a limited construction so as to give it the maximum effect permitted by law. Should it be held, instead, that the provision is utterly invalid or unenforceable, such provision shall be deemed severable from this award.

2. Applicability of Part 200 Uniform Requirements

Grantee agrees to comply with the financial and administrative requirements set forth in 2 C.F.R. Part 200 and the current edition of the Department of Justice (DOJ) Grants Financial Guide.

Grantee understands and agrees that CPJAD may withhold award funds, or may impose other related requirements, if the Grantee does not satisfactorily and promptly address outstanding issues from audits required by the Part 200 Uniform Requirements (or by the

terms of this award), or other outstanding issues that arise in connection with audits, investigations, or reviews of CPJAD awards.

3. Reporting Requirements

Grantee shall comply with all reporting, data collection, and evaluation requirements, as prescribed by law and detailed by the BJA in program guidance for the Justice Assistance Grant Program.

Grantee shall complete BJA-required reports on-line using the Performance Measurement Tool (PMT). The on-line reporting system will require a username and password to log on. The BJA reporting periods and due dates are:

- January 1 - March 31 Due: April 15
- April 1 – June 30 Due: July 15
- July 1 - September 30 Due: October 15
- October 1 - December 31 Due: January 15

Any law enforcement agency receiving direct or sub-awarded JAG funding must submit quarterly accountability metrics data related to training that officers have received on the use of force, racial and ethnic bias, de-escalation of conflict, and constructive engagement with the public.

Grantee shall submit a Semi-Annual Progress Report to CPJAD every six (6) months following the calendar year. The progress report is to cover activities that the Grantee has completed during that reporting period.

The semi-annual reporting periods and due dates are:

- January 1 - June 30 Due: July 15
- July 1 - December 31 Due: January 15

A Final Progress Report is due 30 days after the project end date and should report cumulatively on the entire project period. The appropriate report form will be provided to each project by CPJAD (AG/CPJAD #20). The report shall contain information describing progress, accomplishments, activities, changes, and problems during the report period and any additional information specified by the CPJAD.

4. DOJ Regulations Pertaining to Civil Rights and Nondiscrimination

28 C.F.R. Part 38

Grantee, and any subgrantee at any tier, must comply with all applicable requirements of 28 C.F.R. Part 38, specifically including any applicable requirements regarding written

notice to program beneficiaries and prospective program beneficiaries. Part 38 of 28 C.F.R., a DOJ regulation, was amended effective May 4, 2016.

Among other things, 28 C.F.R. Part 38 includes rules that prohibit specific forms of discrimination on the basis of religion, a religious belief, a refusal to hold a religious belief, or refusal to attend or participate in a religious practice. 28 C.F.R. Part 54

Grantee, and any subrecipient (“subgrantee”) at any tier, must comply with all applicable requirements of 28 C.F.R. Part 54, which relates to nondiscrimination on the basis of sex in certain “education programs.”

5. “Lobbying” Restrictions

In general, as a matter of federal law, federal funds may not be used by the Grantee, or any subrecipient (“subgrantee”) at any tier, either directly or indirectly, to support or oppose the enactment, repeal, modification, or adoption of any law, regulation, or policy, at any level of government. 7. 41 U.S.C. 4712 (Including Prohibitions on Reprisal; Notice to Employees)





The prospective lower tier participant shall provide immediate written notice to the person to which this proposal is submitted if at any time the prospective lower tier participant learns that its certification was erroneous when submitted or has become erroneous by reason of changed circumstances.

4. The terms "covered transaction," "debarred," "suspended," "ineligible," "lower tier covered transaction," "participant," "person," "primary covered transaction," "principal," "proposes," and "voluntarily excluded," as used in this clause, have the meanings set out in the Definitions and Coverage sections of rules implementing Executive Order 12549.

5. The prospective lower tier participant agrees by submitting this proposal that, should the proposed covered transaction be entered into, it shall not knowingly enter into any lower tier covered transaction with a person who is debarred, suspended, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in this covered transaction, unless authorized by the department or agency with which this transaction originated.

6. The prospective lower tier participant further agrees by submitting this proposal that it will include the clause titled, "Certification Regarding Debarment, Suspension, Ineligibility and Voluntary Exclusion – Lower Tier Covered Transaction," without modification in all lower tier covered transactions and in all solicitations for lower tier covered transactions.

7. A participant in a covered transaction may rely upon a certification of a prospective participant in a lower tier covered transaction that it is not debarred, suspended, ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from the covered transaction, unless it knows that the certification is erroneous. A participant may decide the method and frequency by which it determines the eligibility of its principals. Each participant may check the Nonprocurement List.

8. Nothing contained in the foregoing shall be construed to require establishment of a system of reports in order to render in good faith the certification required by this clause. The knowledge and information of a participant is not required to exceed that which is normally possessed by a prudent person in the ordinary course of business dealings.

9. Except for transactions authorized under paragraph 5 of these instructions, if a participant in a covered transaction knowingly enters into a lower tier covered transaction with a person who is suspended, debarred, ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in this transaction, in addition to other remedies available to the Federal Government, the department or agency with which this transaction originated may pursue available remedies, including suspension and/or debarment.

CERTIFICATION OF NON-DISCRIMINATION COMPLAINT PROCEDURES

The U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs (OJP), Office for Civil Rights (OCR) has jurisdiction to investigate complaints of discrimination against recipients of funding from OJP (which includes component agencies such as the Bureau of Justice Assistance, the Office for Victims of Crime, and the National Institute of Justice), Office on Violence Against Women, and the COPS Office. OCR has indicated that recipients and subrecipients of federal funding should have non-discrimination complaint procedures. Therefore,

- (5) a procedure to notify the Department of the Attorney General of the findings of the investigation.
