Testimony of the Office of the Prosecuting Attorney, County of Kauai

TO THE HONORABLE YUKI LEI K. SUGIMURA, CHAIR, AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE:

The County of Kauai Office of the Prosecuting Attorney strongly supports the Proposed Bill, entitled "A BILL FOR AN ORDINANCE . . . TO PROHIBIT SMOKING IN VEHICLES WHEN PERSONS UNDER THE AGE OF EIGHTEEN ARE PRESENT," as described in County Communication No. 17-319. This office strongly supported a similar successful bill last year in the Kaua`i County Council and we ask you to join the County of Kaua`i in protecting the keiki of Hawaii from secondhand smoke.

Smoking in a confined area where a child is present subjects the child to secondhand smoke and its potential – and probable – health hazards. Science has shown that secondhand smoke in a car can be up to ten times more toxic than what the EPA considers unhealthy air quality, even when a window is down. Secondhand smoke is especially harmful to keiki because keiki generally breathe at a faster rate than adults and their lungs are still developing. Passing smoke-free cars into law will help decrease our children's exposure to secondhand smoke and educate parents and other adults about the dangers of smoking in a car when a minor is present.

This office respectfully asks that you recommend passage of the Bill proposed in County Communication No. 17-319 to help make Maui the third county in Hawai'i (joining the Big Island and Kaua'i) to eliminate smoking in cars when a minor is present. Thank you for the opportunity to present this supporting testimony.
