Accompanied by Tournament newcomers Auburn and Xavier, the six returning programs have a combined 55-19 record in Maui, with the Blue Devils, Wildcats, Bulldogs and Illini boasting Maui Jim Maui Invitational championships. Arizona (2014), Duke (2011) and Illinois (2012) each return to Maui having claimed the Tournament title in their most recent appearance.



The Hoops Clinics presented by HMSA are free programs for the Maui, Oahu, and Island of Hawai'i residents. The clinics, a joint effort between Maui Jim Maui Invitational tournament partners, Chaminade University, and HMSA, help grow the game of basketball throughout the islands. Attendees learned the fundamentals of the sport from student-athletes, coaches and administrators.

BOYS AND GIRLS CLUBS YOUTH CLINICS

Local youth learned basketball fundamentals from Chaminade University men's and women's basketball student-athletes during this year's youth clinics. 3rd-8th graders had direct interaction with Chaminade players as they improved their dribbling, passing and shooting skills. Participants received souvenir T-shirts and basketballs. The clinics were held at the Honolulu Boys & Girls Club Spalding Clubhouse and Hale Pono Clubhouse in Ewa Beach, as well as Kealakehe High School and the Lahaina Civic Center Dream Courts.


TOURNAMENT TESTED



THREE DAYS IN MAUI CAN SET THE STAGE FOR A MEMORABLE SEASON









Talk to any North Carolina fan. They will tell you there are striking similarities between each of their last three national championships.

In each of their last three runs to the national championship (2004-05, 2008-09 and 2016-17), North Carolina started its season by winning the Wayne Duke championship trophy at the Lahaina Civic Center.

Coincidence? Maybe in the eyes of some. But recent history suggests that success in Maui often translates to positive results throughout the season.

Still in the glow of helping the Tar Heels to their sixth national title in program history, North Carolina head coach Roy Williams can't help but tie it all together.

"It's no coincidence we won the Maui Jim Maui Invitational in each of our three national-championship seasons," he said in the weeks following his team's championship win. "We've had experienced talent on those teams and the Maui tournament always has a strong field we can test ourselves against early in the season.

"Winning there leads to confidence, but playing in Maui and the players getting to spend time together in such a beautiful, fun place also has undoubtedly helped our team. Gaining that winning experience against other really good teams is something we can draw upon later in the year."

Years earlier, when UConn opened the 2010-11 season, they were projected to finish 10th in the Big East. Three days in Maui changed all that. Behind Tournament MVP Kemba Walker, UConn took home the Tournament title. Then after a 9-9 record in conference play, the Huskies returned to their Maui

form in postseason play, ending the year on an 11-game winning streak that resulted in a Big East Tournament and NCAA Championship.

"When we started the Big East Tournament, some fans of ours were yelling to us from behind the bench, "Maui in Manhattan," said UConn coach Jim Calhoun after winning the conference tournament. "For the championship game, they even had lei's around their neck. The start of our season was so fantastic with what we accomplished in Maui and we bookended it with last week's accomplishment in New York. They are two memories that will last a lifetime for me and for our players."


These programs, along with Michigan in 1988-89, make up the five teams that claimed championships in Maui to start the year and in the NCAA Tournament to conclude the college basketball season.

And even though only one team can take home the title in Maui, the challenges each will face over three days of Basketball in Paradise will go a long way in getting them ready for the season ahead.

In total, 19 teams that have played in Maui to start the year have reached the Final Four. Among those are the 1987-88 Kansas team led by All-American Danny Manning, and the 1997-98 Kentucky Wildcats coached by Tubby Smith, who went on to win an NCAA Championship.

Whether leaving the island as champions, or with a little extra motivation as battle-tested runners-up, what happens in this 2,400-seat gym could be the foundation for a season that ends in front of 66,000 at U.S. Bank Stadium April 8.



SEASON OUTLOOK

The Wildcats head into the 2018-19 season with a talented group of returners and mix of newcomers to replace five starters from a year ago, including the first overall pick in the NBA Draft in Deandre Ayton. Arizona will look to a core of returners in Dylan Smith, Brandon Randolph, Ira Lee, Emmanuel Akot and Alex Barcello to build on their experience heading into the year. Junior Chase Jeter, who sat out last season after transferring from Duke, will anchor the front line and bring more experience to the UA roster. Arizona added a pair of graduate transfers in guard Justin Coleman and forward Ryan Luther who will look to make an instant impact. A group of freshman of Devonaire Doutrive, Brandon Williams and Omar Thielemans will fortify the roster as newcomers alongside Coleman and Luther.

SEASON OUTLOOK

Fresh off their first Southeastern Conference title in nearly 20 years and first appearance in the NCAA Tournament since 2003, the Auburn Tigers are primed and ready to build off their recent success in 2018-19 with head coach Bruce Pearl leading the charge. Auburn returns its All-SEC backcourt in Bryce Brown and Jared Harper. Brown led the league with 3.2 3-pointers per game last season to go along with 15.9 points per contest, while Harper touted 5.4 assists per tilt with 13.2 points per game. The Tigers also welcome back one of the deepest frontcourts in the nation, highlighted by Chuma Okeke and Austin Wiley. Auburn touts a loaded non-conference schedule with games against Dayton, Murray State, NC State and Washington to go along with the Maui Invitational where it joins the deepest field in tournament history of Arizona, Duke, Gonzaga, Illinois, Iowa State, San Diego State and Xavier.



The more things in Durham change, the more they stay the same. Hall of Fame head coach Mike Krzyzewski, back for his 39th season at Duke, welcomes another vaunted freshman class, looking to replace the five leading scorers from a team that reached the Elite Eight a season ago. The young Blue Devils will look to extend the program's unblemished Maui Invitational record as they pursue Duke's sixth title on the island. Leading the way are juniors Javin DeLaurier and Marques Bolden, Duke's top returning rebounder and scorer, respectively. They're tasked with helping mold the nation's preeminent incoming class, which includes the No. 1 (R.J. Barrett), No. 2 (Zion Williamson), No. 3 (Cam Reddish) and No. 10 (Tre Jones) players, along with Joey Baker. Expectations are high at Duke. But with five national championships and 12 Final Fours, Coach K wouldn't have it any other way.

SEEING THE FUTURE

POTENTIAL STARS, CHAMPIONS ON DISPLAY IN PARADISE

With 34 years of history, the Maui Jim Maui Invitational has produced countless memorable moments: Adam Morrison's tournament-record 43 points in Gonzaga's triple-overtime victory over Michigan State in 2005, Kemba Walker's MVP performance in 2010 and Ball State's improbable run to the tournament final in 2001.

With an eight-team field comprised of player-of-the-year candidates, future NBA draft picks and national championship contenders, Fran Fraschilla says this year's edition of Basketball in Paradise is poised to deliver even more of these moments during the three days that tipoff the 2018-19 college basketball season.

"There's always going to be one or two or three performances that we look back on, both individual and team performances," said the long-time ESPN broadcaster. "Whether its Duke's R.J. Barrett, Xavier's Naji Marshall, Gonzaga's Rui Hachimura, or one of the many the other great players who are going to be in this tournament, there are going to be some incredible individual performances we'll remember long after these young men leave the island."

When Arizona, Auburn, Duke, Gonzaga, Illinois, Iowa State, San Diego State and Xavier converge on the Lahaina Civic Center during Thanksgiving Week, fans could be seeing eight teams that will end the season at the NCAA Tournament. "It's almost like an NCAA Regional but it's played in one of the most beautiful places on Earth," quipped Fraschilla.

To win this bracket, the game's top coaches will have to guide their respective teams through a challenging field. And after three days, they'll have a clear vision for how they'll need to navigate the season ahead.

"The main thing is that you come away finding out more about your team's strengths and weaknesses after three days of great competition than you would anywhere else," said Fraschilla, who was twice part of a coaching staff that competed in Maui. "There's a lot of highlights to this trip, but it's also a business trip in that all of these teams have an agenda for the rest of their season that includes going as far as possible in the NCAA Tournament."

Auburn, Duke and Gonzaga are consensus top-10 teams and have all the ingredients for a Final Four run, said Fraschilla. The Blue Devils, guided by Mike Krzyzewski, are a perfect 16-0 in Maui Jim Maui Invitational contests and have won five tournament titles. Duke welcomes the nation's top recruiting class, buoyed by incoming sensations R.J. Barrett, Cameron Reddish, Zion Williamson and Tre Jones. The Bulldogs, under the direction of Mark Few, are two years removed from a berth in the national championship game and also claimed the 2009 Maui title. Rui Hachimura, Killian Tillie, Zach Norvell and a host of returning veterans will establish the Bulldogs as championship hopefuls from the start of the season. Bruce Pearl will lead the Tigers to their first Maui appearance, but Pearl was also an assistant coach with the Iowa coaching staff that won the tournament title in 1987. Auburn welcomes back a host of talented stars, including Bryce Brown and Jared Harper, as well as Austin Wiley, who missed all of last season.

Three other teams in this year's field joined Auburn, Duke and Gonzaga in the NCAA tournament last year, as Arizona, San Diego State and Xavier each won conference regular season or tournament championships last year. The Aztecs return three starters from last year's squad and are positioned for another run to the NCAA tournament, according to Fraschilla. But some roster and coaching changes for the Wildcats and Musketeers will create some uncertainty to begin the season. Sean Miller, entering his 10th season with the Wildcats and boasting seven previous NCAA appearances with the program, replaces his entire starting lineup from a year ago with a talented incoming class of recruits. Meanwhile, Xavier will be under the direction of new head coach Travis Steele, a long-time assistant to Chris Mack, who left after the season to accept the Louisville head coaching role. After a decade with the program, Steele shows every indication of maintaining a high level of success for



a program that has made the NCAA tournament in 16 of the past 18 years.

Not to be overlooked, Iowa State and Illinois will enter the 2018-19 season with their sights set on returning to the postseason. Cyclone head coach Steve Prohm and Illini head coach Brad Underwood have established themselves as some of the game's best young coaches, each having won at least 70 percent of their games over their careers. Iowa State returns a talented crop of freshmen, including Lindell Wigginton, an All-Big 12 Honorable Mention performer last season. The Illini, meanwhile, are led by Trent Frazier, who ranked among the team leaders in points, minutes, assists and steals as a freshman last year. Illinois also welcomes a heralded recruiting class led by high school All-American Ayo Dosunmu. Underwood has shown recent success in Maui, having led Oklahoma State to a third-place finish in 2016.

With the talent that peppers each Maui-bound program, Fraschilla expects fans will see a number of future NBA All-Stars this year. Additionally, the Maui Jim Maui Invitational championship game will undoubtedly serve as an indicator for this season's cream of the crop.

"It certainly looks like Duke and Gonzaga on paper," Fraschilla replied when asked for his championship game prediction. "It would create an incredible atmosphere once again as we have seen every year at the Lahaina Civic Center. It would pit two teams that could very easily meet again next March or early April in Minneapolis at the Final Four.

"When both teams leave the island, as with the other six, they will have a much better feel about where their team's strengths or weaknesses lie than before they arrive in one of the most idyllic places in our country."

Although the primary focus of the trip is winning three games in three days, Fraschilla says the experience of playing in one of the most scenic places in the world presents a wonderful opportunity for each of these programs.

"Well first of all, the opportunity to play in the Maui Jim Maui Invitational is something that no matter where any of the players go the rest of their lives, it's a highlight of their college careers," he said. "To be able to say that they've played in Maui, in the Lahaina Civic Center, on ESPN, is something that I've seen in the past. As someone who has been part of two teams that played in Maui and as a broadcaster, it's a highlight of their careers. It's a place to play basketball in a tournament that is the premier basketball tournament in the country with incredible tradition. The experience of being at the Maui Jim Maui Invitational is a once in a lifetime experience,"

Expectations are high in Spokane for the 2018-19 Gonzaga men's basketball team. The Zags lost two starters from last season's 32-5 squad, but return several core pieces to a team looking for the program's fourth 30-win season in the past five seasons. GU has won 132 games over the past four seasons, the third-most in Division I history, and is the only program in the nation that has appeared in the last four Sweet 16s. The Bulldogs boast one of the country's best frontcourts with versatile and high-flying forwards Rui Hachimura, Killian Tillie and Brandon Clarke. The backcourt includes senior point guard Josh Perkins, who enters his final season with the Zags with 101 career victories. Zach Norvell Jr. became the team's Mr. Clutch as a freshman in 2017-18, and will be leaned on much of the same this season. With a deep bench and exciting newcomers, success should continue in Spokane.





SEASON OUTLOOK

Xavier lost its top 3 scorers and rebounders from last year's team that finished 29-6 overall and won the Big East Conference Regular Season Championship with a 15-3 record. But the Musketeers have some quality experience returning for first-year head coach Travis Steele, who was on the XU staff for 10 years before taking over. Junior guard Quentin Goodin is XU's top returning scorer with 8.7 ppg, and ranked third in assists in the Big East with 4.9 apg. Fellow junior Tyrique Jones is XU's top returning rebounder, and sophomore forward Naji Marshall was a unanimous selection to the 2018 Big East Conference All-Freshman Team. Returning sophomore guard Paul Scruggs averaged 16.8 minutes a game as a freshman. Steele has a talented five-member newcomer class, including three graduate transfers who are expected to play major roles this season, Xavier, a No. 1 seed in last year's NCAA Tournament, played in its fifth straight NCAA Tournament and its 12th in the last 13 years.



MEET THE COACHES



ON THE SIDELINES

SEAN MILLER, ARIZONA

Sean Miller enters his 10th year as head coach of the Arizona Wildcats. Over the course of that time, Miller has established Arizona as a national powerhouse, guiding the team to five regular season conference championships and three conference tournament titles. In 14 years as a head coach, Miller has accrued a 367-121 (.752) record, while attaining a 247-74 (.769) mark with



the Wildcats. Before arriving at Arizona, Miller served as head coach at Xavier, where he led the Musketeers to four NCAA tournaments, and also won three A-10 regular season championships and one conference tournament championship. Miller also served as the head coach of the USA men's Under-19 junior national team, coaching them to a perfect 7-0 record and a gold medal.

BRAD UNDERWOOD, ILLINOIS

Entering his second season at Illinois, Brad Underwood has won more than 73 percent of his games through his first five years as a Division I head coach. Year 1 saw an average of 75.8 points on the season, which marked the Illini's highest scoring average in 13 years. The team also recorded its best offensive rebounding rate in the last 10 years, while also posting the team's highest free throw



rate since 2008 and most free throws made since 2002. The team also raised the bar in the offseason by signing a national top-20 recruiting class.

BRUCE PEARL, AUBURN

Bruce Pearl has led the Auburn Tigers to 70 wins, a Southeastern Conference Championship, and an appearance in the NCAA Tournament in just four years as head coach. Over the course of 23 seasons as an NCAA head coach, Pearl has earned a winning percentage of .720 and is just one of seven active head coaches who has led his teams to at least 10 NCAA Sweet 16 appearances. The



Tigers are coming off a record-breaking season, setting records for 3-pointers made, free throws made, and total blocks.

STEVE PROHM, IOWA STATE

In seven seasons as a head coach, Steve Prohm owns a win percentage of better than .700. Prohm enters his fourth season as head coach of the Cyclones, leading the team to a 60-41 mark and a pair of NCAA Tournament berths. Over the course of his time at Iowa State, the team has spent 27 weeks ranked in the Associated Press Top 25, rising as high as No. 4. A 2017 Skip Prosser Man



of the Year finalist, Prohm has won 20 or more games in six of his first seven seasons as a Division I head coach.

MIKE KRZYZEWSKI, DUKE

Duke head coach Mike Krzyzewski enters the 2018-2019 season with a 1,100-338 record in 43 years as a head coach, with a 1,027-279 mark with the Blue Devils. Coach K is the all-time Division I men's career wins leader, and was the first Division I men's basketball coach to achieve a four-figure win total. During his time in Durham, Coach K has averaged 25.5 wins per season



and established NCAA records with 33 20-win seasons and 14 30-win campaigns. His five national championship titles are the second most in NCAA history, trailing only the 10 won by John Wooden. In addition to establishing Duke as one of college basketball's most elite programs, Coach K simultaneously worked as one of the architects of the revitalization of USA Basketball, during which time he won three Olympic gold medals and two World Cup golds.

BRIAN DUTCHER, SAN DIEGO STATE

A longtime San Diego State men's basketball assistant coach, Brian Dutcher enters his second season as head coach after a first year in which he led the Aztecs to their 11th conference title and to their first NCAA tournament appearance since 2015. Over the course of his 19 years at San Diego State, Dutcher has helped the team reach the postseason 14 times, including nine trips to the NCAA



tournament, and win a conference-best 11 Mountain West titles and record 13 seasons of at least 20 victories

MARK FEW, GONZAGA

Mark Few has guided Gonzaga for a total of 19 seasons, 10 of which he served as an assistant coach to the program. Over the course of those seasons, the Bulldogs have won or shared 17 regular season league titles and taken home the conference tournament championship 15 times. The team won or shared 11 straight West Coast Conference regular-season titles from 2000-11, which was

the longest current active streak in the nation and the second-best streak all-time. Few led Gonzaga to its first-ever national championship appearance in 2017.

TRAVIS STEELE, XAVIER

After spending the past 10 seasons at Xavier, including nine on the staff of his predecessor Chris Mack, Travis Steele was named head coach of the Musketeers on March 31. Steele has been a part of nine NCAA Tournament teams at Xavier, including five teams that reached the Sweet 16. He has also been named as one of the top two recruiters in the Big East, playing a key role in developing



nationally-ranked recruiting classes, including three straight classes ranked among the top 20 in the country.




















SINCE THE BEGINNING, THERE'S ALWAYS BEEN MAUI MAGIC

The genesis of one of college basketball's greatest early season traditions appeared to be nothing more than a tune up for the nation's top-ranked team. In December 1982, Virginia was on the final leg of a five-game road trip which began on the Atlantic Coast. After traveling nearly 7,000 miles to participate in a pair of neutral site contests in Tokyo, the Cavaliers' final stop was at the Blaisdell Center in Honolulu.

During its first four games, Virginia easily handled perennial powers Duke, Georgetown, Houston and Utah. The final game came against NAIA program Chaminade. After dispatching its first eight opponents of the season with ease, Virginia was the heavy favorite against the Silverswords. After all, All-American Ralph Sampson was a future No. 1 pick and Virginia would advance to the Elite Eight later in the year.

Chaminade, however, was just in its basketball infancy, having started its program during the 1976-77 season. Although the Silverswords had won 28 games during the 1981-82 campaign, the team was considered a longshot to even compete with Virginia, let alone win.

After 40 minutes in Honolulu, on Dec. 23, the

final score rocked the college basketball landscape: Chaminade 77, Virginia 72. The aftermath of what's called the greatest upset in college basketball history sparked one of the most notable traditions on the college basketball calendar, an annual serving of Sun, Surf and Hoops at the Maui Jim Maui Invitational Thanksgiving week.

Two years after that historic upset, Chaminade hosted the inaugural Silversword Invitational, which was held at Konawaena High School in Kona. Then in 1985, the Tournament transitioned to War Memorial Gymnasium in Wailuku, Maui, before relocating to its current, and iconic, home at the Lahaina Civic Center in 1987.

Throughout its 34-year history, more than 100 teams, representing 26 conferences and 40 states, have added to the history of the nation's premier early-season basketball tournament. The Maui Jim Maui Invitational has been a showcase of countless All-Americans, NBA Draft picks, Hall of Fame players and coaches, and produced some of college basketball's most memorable moments.


While the majesty of Maui is a magnet for fans across the country, it is the high-level competition 2017 tournament champions Notre Dame

that regularly draws the nation's best teams each year. Schools that have participated in the Maui Jim Maui Invitational have won 68 of the 80 NCAA Championships, six of which have won the national championship after having competed in Maui earlier in the season.

From an uncommon beginning to an annual celebration of Maui Magic, the Maui Jim Maui Invitational features the best of the Aloha Spirit, on and off the court.

Over the years, the County of Maui has invested more than \$1.6 million in the Lahaina Civic Center to create a quality host venue for the mecca of college basketball including a playing floor, updated rollaway bleachers, new scoreboards, a Hawaiian wall mural, enhanced arena lighting and the addition of permanent air conditioning back in 2003. The LCC is a compactly-sized arena with a seating capacity of 2,400.



During Thanksgiving week, the 46-year old venue morphs from a community center, where just weeks earlier a town meeting took place, young children challenged each other in a game of HORSE or local basketball teams held practice, into a bucket list destination for sports fans around the world that annually features the best college basketball has to offer.

Its 2,400 seats make it one of the most intimate environments for fans, coaches and players. Only 15 rows separate the 'nosebleeds' from the hardwood — there truly is not a bad seat in the house. The compact environment, combined with the fast pace of the nation's best athletes, makes the Lahaina Civic Center one of the most unique venues in all of sports.

Over the years, the County of Maui has invested more than \$1.6 million to make the venue an inviting atmosphere for fans, alumni and locals. Through the years, upgrades to the bleachers, scoreboards, lighting, and the addition of permanent air conditioning in 2003, have enhanced the experience for teams and fans alike. And since hosting its first Maui Jim Maui Invitational in 1987, the Lahaina Civic Center hardwood has showcased many of the game's legendary coaches, such as Mike Krzyzewski, Roy Williams, Lute Olson and Dean Smith, as well as All-American players, like Danny Manning, Glen Rice, Grant Hill, Adam Morrison and Kemba Walker.

The charm of the Lahaina Civic Center has been and will remain an integral part of the mystique that is the Maui Jim Maui Invitational. It is distinctly Maui, and represents the proud tradition and exciting future of this premier early-season college basketball tournament.
