A BILL FOR AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE FISCAL YEAR 2018 BUDGET FOR THE COUNTY OF MAUI AS IT PERTAINS TO APPENDIX A, PART I, GRANT REVENUE -SCHEDULE OF GRANTS BY DEPARTMENTS AND PROGRAMS, DEPARTMENT OF POLICE (DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION HIGHWAY SAFETY GRANTS)

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE COUNTY OF MAUI:

SECTION 1. PROBLEM STATEMENT

Identify the traffic safety related problem or deficiency that the proposed grant is intended to correct. Identify and gather appropriate data relevant to the problem. Impaired driving is of the highest highway safety concerns for communities here in Maui County and across the nation. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, 35,092 people died in traffic crashes in 2015 in the United States (latest figures available), including an estimated 10,265 people who were killed in drunk driving crashes involving a driver with an illegal BAC (.08 or greater). Among the people killed in these drunk driving crashes, 67% (6,865) were in crashes in which at least one driver in the crash had a BAC of .15 or higher.

In Hawaii, there were 95 fatalities resulting from motor vehicle traffic crashes, with 32 of those fatalities involving a driver with a BAC of .08 or higher. Also, *52 or 54.7% of the fatalities were alcohol and or drug related.* Fatal traffic crashes involving at least one driver (includes motorcyclist), pedestrian, or pedal-cyclist who "had been drinking." (*source: State of Hawaii 2014, USDOT, NHTSA National Center for Statistics and Analysis*)

- 2. Additionally, MPD will make every effort to exceed our FFY 2017 OUI arrests at our grant funded intoxication checkpoints during FFY 2018. MPD made 90 OUI arrests in FFY 2016; and
- 3. MPD will make every effort to conduct ten or more DRE evaluations; conducted by certified DREs in FFY 2018.

GRANT OBJECTIVES

Objectives are tasks or activities conducted in order to accomplish the grant goal(s) (e.g., develop permanent fitting stations for child restraints, enforcement activities, educational activities, etc.). - 4. To patrol areas known for underage drinking during the weekends and holidays to deter unlawful underage drinking (Youth Deterrence) at one per quarter;
- 5. Send one officer to attend the Intoxilyzer User's Group conference in 2018;
- 6. Send two (2) officers to attend the 24th Annual IACP DRE Section annual conference in August 2018;
- 7. Send three (3) officers to attend Statewide Traffic Commander's Quarterly meetings on Oahu;

- 8. Send two officers to attend the annual Lifesavers Conference in 2018;
- 9. Send two officers to DRE School in 2018 with follow-up evaluations;
- 10. Send two (2) officers to attend DRE Instructor School/Teachback/Certification Nights in 2018;
- 11. Send eleven (11) officers to DRE Recertification/In-Service Training in 2018;
- 12. Send one (1) MPD representative to attend monthly Hawaii Impaired Driving Task Force (IDTF) meetings, and one (1) representative to attend quarterly, if applicable, in FFY 2018;
- 13. MPD will conduct ten or more DRE evaluations conducted by certified DRE's in FFY 2018.
- 14. Conduct one earned media event each quarter; and
- 15. Participate in NHTSA's "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" Impaired Driving Campaigns (December's Holiday Enforcement and August's National Enforcement Crackdown).
- 16. Purchase a police motor vehicle (SUV) to solely support our sobriety check points, to include emergency lights, operational safety equipment and communications equipment.
- 17. Per diem to send one officer to attend quarterly Strategic Highway Safety Plan meetings in 2018.

METHOD OF EVALUATION

Using data gathered throughout the grant period, the grant manager will evaluate (1) how well the stated grant goals and objectives were accomplished, and (2) was the grant cost effective? The Maui Police Department will evaluate the progress of grant activities by including in each quarterly report the status of the number of sobriety checkpoints conducted, the number of DUI arrests made and the number of vehicles checked at sobriety checkpoints, the number of citations issued and any other arrests made at these checkpoints. The Maui Police Department will provide evidence of media coverage earned in these quarterly reports to the Highway Safety Office.

The Maui Police Department will make at least 1,100 OUI arrests in FFY 2018. Additionally, MPD will make at least 90 OUI arrests at grant funded intoxication checkpoints. MPD will track results from intoxication checkpoints and total number of OUI arrests county wide. MPD will also conduct (10) DRE evaluations by certified DREs.

Personnel Costs

Maui Police Department will conduct a total of 100 DUI checkpoints through the grant period (52/12 plus 48 holiday/prom checkpoints), and 11 saturation patrols. Overtime rate was based on the average Supervisor and Officers staffing the checkpoints and saturation patrols. The saturation patrols will use unmarked police cars and police motorcycles. An additional 16 hours of special enforcement for underage drinking (Youth Deterrence) will be conducted. Costs were based on an average supervisor (PO 11/L4) overtime rate \$119.55 per hr and average officer (PO 9/L3) overtime rate \$105.24 per hr. The overtime pay includes the fringe rate of: 68.22%.

Travel Expenses

Travel expenses will be used to send personnel to attend: CMI Intoxilyzer Users Group conference (Location TBD), 24th Annual IACP DRE Conference (Location-TBD), 2018 Lifesavers Conference (San Antonio TX.); DRE Training School (Oahu); DRE Recertification/In-Service Training (Oahu); DRE Instructor training School/Teachback/Certification (Oahu); Hawaii Impaired Driving Task Force (Oahu) and SHSP (Oahu). DRE Instructor assistance with HPD Training (Oahu).

In addition, travel expenses will be used to send three officers to the Statewide Traffic Commander's Meetings (Oahu). The Traffic Commander will fly over and stay for the two-day meeting. One officer will fly over for the day, for the Traffic Comannder's meeting, and one DRE officer will fly over for the day, for the DRE meeting. There is a cost savings as there will be no excess lodging for a 2nd officer to stay overnight, and no hotel parking costs will be incurred as an officer will be driving back each day to the airport.

Program funds will pay for travel; registration; per diem & excess per diem for lodging; ground transportation; baggage fees; and airport and hotel parking. SHOPO contract allows for excess per diem for lodging for any amount over \$50 per day for intra-state travel, \$85 per day for out-of-state travel. Ground transportation is for shuttle/taxi to/from airport/host hotel.

AGREEMENT OF UNDERSTANDING & COMPLIANCE

Grant No: <u>AL18-02 (01-M-03)</u>

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into by and between the STATE OF HAWAII by and through its Director of Transportation, hereinafter referred to as "State," and the Governmental Unit named in this application, hereinafter referred to as "Applicant."

WHEREAS, the National Highway Safety Act of 1966 (Public Law 89-564) provides Federal funds to the STATE for approved highway safety projects, and

WHEREAS, STATE may make said funds available to various state, county or municipal agencies or governments or political subdivisions upon application and approval by STATE and the UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION, and

WHEREAS, STATE is obligated to reimburse the UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION out of its funds for any ineligible or unauthorized expenditures for which Federal funds have been claimed and payment received, and

WHEREAS, the above name APPLICANT has submitted an application for Federal funds for highway safety projects.

NOW, THEREFORE, IN CONSIDERATION OF MUTUAL PROMISES AND OTHER GOOD AND VALUABLE CONSIDERATION, THE PARTIES AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

REIMBURSEMENT OF ELIGIBLE EXPENDITURES

It is mutually agreed and promised that upon written application by APPLICANT and approval by STATE and the UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION, STATE shall obligate said Federal funds to APPLICANT'S account for reimbursement of eligible expenditures as set forth in the application.

It is mutually agreed and promised that APPLICANT shall reimburse STATE for any ineligible or unauthorized expenditures for which Federal funds have been claimed and payment received as determined by a State or Federal audit. Costs are not allowable for construction, rehabilitation, remodeling, or for office furnishings and fixtures - for State, local or private buildings or structures. The following are examples of items considered as furnishings or fixtures, for which reimbursement is not eligible:

It is further agreed and promised that where reimbursement is made to APPLICANT in installments, STATE shall have the right to withhold any installments to make up reimbursement received for any ineligible or unauthorized expenditures until such time as the ineligible claim is made up or corrected by APPLICANT.

PROPERTY AGREEMENT

It is mutually agreed and promised that the APPLICANT shall immediately notify the STATE if any equipment purchased under this project ceases to be used in the manner as set forth by the project agreement. In such event, APPLICANT further agrees to either give credit to the project cost or to another active Highway Safety project for the residual value of such equipment in an amount to be determined by the STATE, or to transfer or otherwise dispose of such equipment as directed by STATE.

It is mutually agreed and promised by the APPLICANT that no purchased equipment under this project will be conveyed, sold, salvaged, transferred, etc. without the express written approval of the STATE.

It is mutually agreed and promised that the APPLICANT shall maintain or cause to be maintained for its useful life, any equipment purchased under this project.

EQUAL OPPORTUNITY

It is mutually agreed and promised that pursuant to the requirements of Section 22 (a) of the Federal-Aid Highway Act of 1968, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. 794), and the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, the APPLICANT, as a condition to receiving approval of this application submitted under the Highway Safety Act of 1966, hereby gives its assurance that employment in connection with the subject Highway Safety Program project will be provided without regard to race, color, creed, sex, handicap, age, or national origin. The APPLICANT further agrees that, as a condition to receiving approval of this application, it will be subject to, and will comply with, Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 78 Stat. 252, 42 U.S.C. 2000d to 2000d-4 (hereinafter referred to as the Act), and all applicable requirements pursuant to the Regulations of the Department of Commerce (Title 15, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 8, which have been adopted by the Department of Transportation, and hereinafter referred to as the Regulations), to the end that, in accordance with the Act and the Regulations, no person in the United States shall on the ground of race, color, creed, sex, handicap, age, or national origin be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under the subject Highway Safety Program or project.

It is mutually agreed and promised that if the APPLICANT fails or refuses to comply with its undertaking as set forth in these provisions, the STATE of the UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION may take any or all of these following actions.

(1) Cancel, terminate, or suspend in whole or in part the agreement, contract, or other arrangement with respect to which the failure or refusal occurred; and

(2) Refrain from extending any further Federal financial assistance to the applicant agency under the program with respect to which the failure or refusal occurred until satisfactory assurance of future compliance has been received from the applicant agency.

NON-DUPLICATION OF GRANT FUND EXPENDITURES

It is mutually agreed and promised that the APPLICANT has no ongoing or completed projects under agreement with any other Federal fund source which duplicate or overlap any work contemplated or described in this project.

It is mutually agreed and promised that the APPLICANT will either revise this project or revise any pending or proposed request for other Federal grant funds which would duplicate or overlap work under this project to exclude any such duplication of grant fund expenditures.

It is further mutually agreed and understood that the APPLICANT shall reimburse the STATE OF HAWAII for any such duplicate expenditures for which Federal grant funds have been claimed and payment received as determined by State or Federal audit.

PROJECT INCOME AND APPLICABLE CREDITS

It is mutually agreed and understood that the APPLICANT shall apply all proceeds or credits generated under the project, such as but not restricted to: The sale of real or personal property royalties received from copyrights and patents, sale of publications or from personal or incidental services, to the project in accordance with OMB Circular A-87 (FMC 74-7) or A-21, as applicable and NHTSA/FHWA Order 460-4/7510.1.

COPYRIGHTS AND PATENTS

It is mutually agreed that any copyrightable materials produced in the course of a project may be the property of the State or applicant agency; however, provisions should be made to obtain for the United States Government, the State Governments and their political subdivisions a royaltyfree nonexclusive, and irrevocable license to use in any manner such copyrightable material.

It is mutually agreed that the ownership of all rights accruing from any patentable discoveries or inventions resulting from a project should be covered in the agreement. An irrevocable, nonexclusive, nontransferable, and royalty-free license to practice each discovery or invention in the manufacture, use and disposition, according to law, of any article or material, and in the use of any method developed as part of the work under the agreement should be obtained for the United States Government, the State Governments and their political subdivisions.

MINORITY BUSINESS ENTERPRISE REQUIREMENTS

It is the policy of the Department of Transportation that minority business enterprises, as defined in 49 CFR Part 23, shall have the maximum opportunity to participate in the performance of contracts financed in whole or in part with Federal funds under this agreement. Consequently, the MBE requirements of 49 CFR Part 23 apply to this agreement.

The recipient or its contractor agrees to ensure that minority business enterprises as defined in 49 CFR Part 23 have the maximum opportunity to participate in the performance of contracts and subcontracts financed in whole or in part with Federal funds provided under this agreement. In this regard, all recipients or contractors shall take all necessary and reasonable steps in accordance with 49 CFR Part 23 to ensure that minority business enterprises have the maximum opportunity to compete for and perform contracts. Recipients and their contractors shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, or sex in the award and performance of DOT-assisted contracts.

REQUIREMENTS

It is mutually agreed and promised that the applicant shall follow the State and Federal requirements and guidelines set forth in the State of Hawaii Project Procedures Manual as amended. All project expenditure records are to be retained for at least three years after the date of the final expenditure report.

AUTHORIZATION TO PROCEED

It is mutually agreed between the STATE and the APPLICANT that this AGREEMENT OF UNDERSTANDING AND COMPLIANCE shall become effective upon the STATE'S agreement and authorization to proceed as set forth in PART II (2) of this application.

The following is taken from Appendix A to Part 1200 – Certification and Assurances for Highway Safety Grants (23 U.S.C. Chapter 4):

NONDISCRIMINATION

(applies to subrecipients as well as States)

The State highway safety agency will comply with all Federal statutes and implementing regulations relating to nondiscrimination. These include but are not limited to: (a) Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (Pub. L. 101-336), as amended (42 U.S.C. 12101, et seq.), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disabilities (and 49 CFR Part 27); (d) the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, as amended (42 U.S.C. 6101-6107), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of age; (e) the Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987 (Pub. L. 100-259), which requires Federal-aid recipients and all subrecipients to prevent discrimination and ensure nondiscrimination in all of their programs and activities; (f) the Drug Abuse Office and Treatment Act of 1972 (Pub. L. 92-255), as amended, relating to nondiscrimination on the basis of drug abuse; (g) the comprehensive Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism Prevention, Treatment and Rehabilitation Act of 1970 (Pub. L. 91-616), as amended, relating to nondiscrimination on the basis of alcohol abuse or alcoholism; (h) Sections 523 and 527 of the Public Health Service Act

of 1912, as amended (42 U.S.C. 290dd-3 and 290ee-3), relating to confidentiality of alcohol and drug abuse patient records; (i) Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968, as amended (42 U.S.C. 3601, *et seq.*), relating to nondiscrimination in the sale, rental or financing of housing; (j) any other nondiscrimination provisions in the specific statute(s) under which application for Federal assistance is being made; and (k) the requirements of any other nondiscrimination statute(s) which may apply to the application.

THE DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE ACT OF 1988 (41 U.S.C. 8103)

The State will provide a drug-free workplace by:

- Publishing a statement notifying employees that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession or use of a controlled substance is prohibited in the grantee's workplace and specifying the actions that will be taken against employees for violation of such prohibition;
- Establishing a drug-free awareness program to inform employees about:
 - The dangers of drug abuse in the workplace.
 - The grantee's policy of maintaining a drug-free workplace.
 - Any available drug counseling, rehabilitation, and employee assistance programs.
 - The penalties that may be imposed upon employees for drug violations occurring in the workplace.
 - Making it a requirement that each employee engaged in the performance of the grant be given a copy of the statement required by paragraph (a).
- Notifying the employee in the statement required by paragraph (a) that, as a condition of employment under the grant, the employee will—

- Notifying the agency within ten days after receiving notice under subparagraph (d)(2) from an employee or otherwise receiving actual notice of such conviction.
- Taking one of the following actions, within 30 days of receiving notice under subparagraph (d)(2), with respect to any employee who is so convicted—
 - Taking appropriate personnel action against such an employee, up to and including termination.
 - Requiring such employee to participate satisfactorily in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program approved for such purposes by a Federal, State, or local health, law enforcement, or other appropriate agency.
- Making a good faith effort to continue to maintain a drug-free workplace through implementation of all of the paragraphs above.

BUY AMERICA ACT

(applies to subrecipients as well as States)

The State will comply with the provisions of the Buy America Act (49 U.S.C. 5323(j)), which contains the following requirements:

Only steel, iron and manufactured products produced in the United States may be purchased with Federal funds unless the Secretary of Transportation determines that such domestic purchases would be inconsistent with the public interest, that such materials are not reasonably available and of a satisfactory quality, or that inclusion of domestic materials will increase the cost of the overall project contract by more than 25 percent. Clear justification for the purchase of non-domestic items must be in the form of a waiver request submitted to and approved by the Secretary of Transportation.

<u>POLITICAL ACTIVITY (HATCH ACT)</u> (applies to subrecipients as well as States)

The State will comply with provisions of the Hatch Act (5 U.S.C. 1501-1508) which limits the political activities of employees whose principal employment activities are funded in whole or in part with Federal funds.

CERTIFICATION REGARDING FEDERAL LOBBYING

(applies to subrecipients as well as States)

Certification for Contracts, Grants, Loans, and Cooperative Agreements

The undersigned certifies, to the best of his or her knowledge and belief, that:

- 1. No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of the undersigned, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any Federal contract, the making of any Federal grant, the making of any Federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement.
- 2. If any funds other than Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement, the undersigned shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions.
- 3. The undersigned shall require that the language of this certification be included in the award documents for all sub-award at all tiers (including subcontracts, subgrants, and contracts under grant, loans, and cooperative agreements) and that all subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.

This certification is a material representation of fact upon which reliance was placed when this transaction was made or entered into. Submission of this certification is a prerequisite for making or entering into this transaction imposed by section 1352, title 31, U.S. Code. Any person who fails to file the required certification shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$10,000 and not more than \$100,000 for each such failure.

RESTRICTION ON STATE LOBBYING (applies to subrecipients as well as States)

None of the funds under this program will be used for any activity specifically designed to urge or influence a State or local legislator to favor or oppose the adoption of any specific legislative proposal pending before any State or local legislative body. Such activities include both direct and indirect (e.g., "grassroots") lobbying activities, with one exception.
