The goal of the Maui Police Department will be to reduce alcohol related fatal and near-fatal injury motor vehicle crashes. This will be achieved through the department's participation in the 52/12 alcohol enforcement program by conducting DUI checkpoints once a week and additional checkpoints during holiday periods. Underage alcohol consumption will be addressed by enforcing alcohol laws specifically involving persons under 21 years of age. Purchase light towers, Intoxilyzer 9000's and preliminary breath testing instruments.

PROBLEM STATEMENT

Identify the traffic safety related problem or deficiency that the proposed grant is intended to correct. Identify and gather appropriate data relevant to the problem. Impaired driving is of the highest highway safety concerns for communities here in Maui County and across the nation. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, 37,461 people died in traffic crashes in 2016 in the United States (latest figures available), including an estimated 10,497 people who were killed in drunk driving crashes involving a driver with an illegal BAC (.08 or greater), or 28%. Among the people killed in these drunk driving crashes, 67% (7,052) were in crashes in which at least one driver in the crash had a BAC of .15 or higher.

In Hawaii (2016), there were 120 fatalities resulting from motor vehicle traffic crashes, with 34 of those fatalities died in alcohol-related traffic crashes. Also, *57 or 47.5% of the fatalities were alcohol and or drug related.* Fatal traffic crashes involving at least one driver (includes motorcyclist), pedestrian, or pedal-cyclist who "had been drinking." GRANT GOALS

The goal for Maui County is listed below:

1. Maui Police Department will make at least 1,100 OUI arrests during FFY 2019, compared to 727 in CY 2017;
2. Additionally, MPD will make 50 or more OUI arrests at Grant funded intoxication checkpoints in the FFY 2019, MPD made 70 OUI arrests in FFY 2017;
3. MPD will make every effort to conduct ten (10) or more Drug Recognition Expert evaluations; conducted by certified DRE's during FFY 2019.
4. Purchase seven (7) new Intoxilyzer 9000's to include training; this would provide the Maui Police Department with the most current equipment;
5. Develop a secure and accurate method to transfer e-search warrants for impaired driving/crash investigation(s) to the Judiciary/Prosecutors and police; and
6. MPD will conduct four events in an effort to deter youthful impaired driving fatalities by addressing problematic events.

GRANT OBJECTIVES

Objectives are tasks or activities conducted in order to accomplish the grant goal(s) (e.g., develop permanent fitting stations for child restraints, enforcement activities, educational activities, etc.). 1. To conduct at least 52 sobriety checkpoints-one each week during the grant period-in locations that have high alcohol related fatal and injury causing collisions;
2. To conduct an additional 48 sobriety checkpoints during holiday, high school prom, spring break and graduation periods as well as during all national mobilization efforts;
3. To conduct saturations patrols during high volume events that promote drinking; during holidays, concerts and spring break;
4. To patrol areas known for underage drinking during the weekends and holidays to deter unlawful underage drinking (Youth Deterrence) at one per quarter;
5. Send one (1) officer to attend the Intoxilyzer User's Group conference in 2019;
6. Send two (2) representatives to attend the 25th Annual IACP/ DRE Section annual conference in August 2019;
7. Send three (3) officers to attend Statewide Traffic Commander's Quarterly meetings on Oahu;
8. Send two (2) officers to attend the annual Lifesavers Conference in 2019;
9. Send two (2) officers to DRE School in 2019 with follow-up evaluations;
10. MPD will be hosting Intoxilyzer 9000 Instructor/Operators training here on Maui; up to sixteen (16) officers will attend;

11. Send two (2) officers to attend DRE Instructor School/Teach back/Certification Nights in 2019;
12. Send two (2) MPD DRE instructors to Oahu to conduct recertification evaluations with HPD DRE instructor;
13. Send two (2) MPD DRE instructors to Oahu to assist with HPD's DRE School and Certification Nights;
14. Send ten (10) officers to DRE Recertification/In-Service Training in 2019;
15. Send one (1) MPD representative to attend monthly Hawaii Impaired Driving Task Force (IDTF) meetings, and one (1) representative to attend quarterly, if applicable, in FFY 2019;
16. MPD will conduct ten (10) or more DRE evaluations conducted by certified DREs in FFY 2019;
17. Conduct one earned media event each quarter;
18. Participate in NHTSA's "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" Impaired Driving Campaigns (December's Holiday Enforcement and August's National Enforcement Crackdown);
19. Per diem to send one officer to attend quarterly Strategic Highway Safety Plan meetings in 2019;
20. Purchase seven (7) Intoxilyzer 9000's, with external printers; this would provide the Maui Police Department with the most current equipment;
21. Purchase two (2) inflatable light towers to better support our efforts while at our sobriety checkpoints; to include a new portable generator;
22. Purchase one (1) diesel powered/trailer type light tower to better support our efforts while at our sobriety checkpoints; and
23. Purchase ten (10) new portable breath testing instruments.
24. Work with consultant/contractor to develop an e-search warrant program to be used on a desktop computer, laptops and/or mobile devices (smart phones, tablets, etc.).

METHOD OF EVALUATION

Using data gathered throughout the grant period, the grant manager will evaluate (1) how well the stated grant goals and objectives were accomplished, and (2) was the grant cost effective? The Maui Police Department will evaluate the progress of grant activities by including in each quarterly report the status of the number of sobriety checkpoints conducted, the number of DUI arrests made and the number of vehicles checked at sobriety checkpoints, the number of citations issued and any other arrests made at these checkpoints. It will also be reported on the results of the special enforcements conducted with other agencies. The Maui Police Department will provide evidence of media coverage earned in these quarterly reports to the Highway Safety Office.

The Maui Police Department will make at least 1,100 OUI arrests in FFY 2019. Additionally, MPD will make at least 50 OUI arrests at grant funded intoxication checkpoints. MPD will track results from intoxication checkpoints and total number of OUI arrests county wide. MPD will also conduct (10) DRE evaluations by certified DREs.

Personnel Costs

Maui Police Department will conduct a total of 92 DUI checkpoints through the grant period (52/12 plus 48 holiday/prom checkpoints), and 10 saturation patrols. Overtime rate was based on the average supervisor and officers staffing the checkpoints and saturation patrols. Checkpoints- one supervisor and four officers max.; exceptions are new supervisors training or staffing challenges. The saturation patrols will use unmarked police cars and police motorcycles-one supervisor and two officers minimum. An additional 56 hours of special enforcement for underage drinking (Youth Deterrence) will be conducted, one per quarterly. Costs were based on an average supervisor (PO 11/L3) overtime rate of \$131.74 per hour, and the average officer (PO 9/L3) overtime rate is \$120.67 per hour. The overtime pay includes the fringe rate of: 81.76%.

Travel Expenses

Travel expenses will be used to send personnel to attend: CMI Intoxilyzer Users Group conference (Location TBD), 25th Annual IACP DRE Conference (Anaheim, CA), 2019 Lifesavers Conference (Louisville, KY); DRE Training School (Oahu); DRE Recertification/In-Service Training (Oahu); DRE Instructor training School/Teachback/Certification (Oahu); DRE Recertification; Hawaii Impaired Driving Task Force (Oahu); SHSP Core Committee Meetings (Oahu); and DRE Instructor assistance with HPD Training (Oahu).

In addition, travel expenses will be used to send three officers to the Statewide Traffic Commander's Meetings (Oahu). The Traffic Commander will fly over and stay for the two-day meeting. One officer will fly over for the day, for the Traffic Commander's meeting, and one DRE officer will fly over for the day, for the DRE meeting. There is a cost savings as there will be no excess lodging for a 2nd officer to stay overnight, and no hotel parking costs will be incurred as an officer will be driving back each day to the airport.

Program funds will pay for travel; registration; per diem & excess per diem for lodging; ground transportation; baggage fees; and airport and hotel parking. SHOPO contract allows for excess per diem for lodging for any amount over \$50 per day for intra-state travel, \$85 per day for out-of-state travel. Ground transportation is for shuttle/taxi to/from airport/host hotel.

Contractual/Consultant Services

Intoxilyzer 9000 certified training conducted on Maui; up to sixteen officers. Travel and training fees.

MPD will work with a consultant/contractor to develop an electronic search warrant program to be used on a desktop, computer, laptops and/or mobile devices (smart phones, tablets, etc.).

Equipment

Purchase seven (7) Intoxilyzer 9000's with external printers and one diesel, trailer-type light tower.

Other Direct Costs

MPD will purchase ten (10) preliminary breath testing instruments and two (2) 16' inflatable light towers with 2000 watt generator. The light towers will be used at sobriety checkpoints.

Certifications and Assurances for Fiscal Year 2019 Hawaii Highway Safety Grants (23 U.S.C. Chapter 4; Sec. 1906, Pub. L. 109-59, As Amended)

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into by and between the STATE OF HAWAII by and through its Director of Transportation, hereinafter referred to as "State," and the Governmental Unit named in this application, hereinafter referred to as "Applicant."

WHEREAS, the National Highway Safety Act of 1966 (Public Law 89-564) provides Federal funds to the STATE for approved highway safety projects, and

WHEREAS, STATE may make said funds available to various state, county or municipal agencies or governments or political subdivisions upon application and approval by STATE and the UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION, and

WHEREAS, STATE is obligated to reimburse the UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION out of its funds for any ineligible or unauthorized expenditures for which Federal funds have been claimed and payment received, and

WHEREAS, the above name APPLICANT has submitted an application for Federal funds for highway safety projects.

NOW, THEREFORE, IN CONSIDERATION OF MUTUAL PROMISES AND OTHER GOOD AND VALUABLE CONSIDERATION, THE PARTIES AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

The APPLICANT will comply with applicable statutes and regulations, including but not limited to:

- 23 U.S.C. Chapter 4 – Highway Safety Act of 1966, as amended
- Sec. 1906, Pub. L. 109-59, as amended by Sec. 4011, Pub. L. 114-94
- 23 CFR part 1300 – Uniform Procedures for State Highway Safety Grant Programs
- 2 CFR part 200 – Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards
- 2 CFR part 1201 – Department of Transportation, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards

NONDISCRIMINATION

The APPLICANT will comply with all Federal statutes and implementing regulations relating to nondiscrimination ("Federal Nondiscrimination Authorities"). These include but are not limited to:

- **Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964** (42 U.S.C. 2000d *et seq.*, 78 stat. 252), (prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin) and 49 CFR part 21;

- **The Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970**, (42 U.S.C. 4601), (prohibits unfair treatment of persons displaced or whose property has been acquired because of Federal or Federal-aid programs and projects);
- **Federal-Aid Highway Act of 1973**, (23 U.S.C. 324 *et seq.*), and **Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972**, as amended (20 U.S.C. 1681-1683 and 1685-1686) (prohibit discrimination on the basis of sex);
- **Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973**, (29 U.S.C. 794 *et seq.*), as amended, (prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability) and 49 CFR part 27;
- **The Age Discrimination Act of 1975**, as amended, (42 U.S.C. 6101 *et seq.*), (prohibits discrimination on the basis of age);
- **The Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987**, (Pub. L. 100-209), (broadens scope, coverage and applicability of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, The Age Discrimination Act of 1975 and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, by expanding the definition of the terms "programs or activities" to include all of the programs or activities of the Federal aid recipients, subrecipients and contractors, whether such programs or activities are Federally-funded or not);
- **Titles II and III of the Americans with Disabilities Act** (42 U.S.C. 12131-12189) (prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability in the operation of public entities, public and private transportation systems, places of public accommodation, and certain testing) and 49 CFR parts 37 and 38;
- **Executive Order 12898, Federal Actions to Address Environmental Justice in Minority Populations and Low-Income Populations** (prevents discrimination against minority populations by discouraging programs, policies, and activities with disproportionately high and adverse human health or environmental effects on minority and low-income populations); and
- **Executive Order 13166, Improving Access to Services for Persons with Limited English Proficiency** (guards against Title VI national origin discrimination/discrimination because of limited English proficiency (LEP) by ensuring that funding recipients take reasonable steps to ensure that LEP persons have meaningful access to programs (70 FR 74087-74100).

The State highway safety agency—

- Will take all measures necessary to ensure that no person in the United States shall, on the grounds of race, color, national origin, disability, sex, age, limited English proficiency, or membership in any other class protected by Federal Nondiscrimination Authorities, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any of its programs or activities, so long as any portion of the program is Federally-assisted;
- Will administer the program in a manner that reasonably ensures that any of its subrecipients, contractors, subcontractors, and consultants receiving Federal financial assistance under this program will comply with all requirements of the Non-Discrimination Authorities identified in this Assurance;

- Agrees to comply (and require its subrecipients, contractors, subcontractors, and consultants to comply) with all applicable provisions of law or regulation governing US DOT's or NHTSA's access to records, accounts, documents, information, facilities, and staff, and to cooperate and comply with any program or compliance reviews, and/or complaint investigations conducted by US DOT or NHTSA under any Federal Nondiscrimination Authority;
- Acknowledges that the United States has a right to seek judicial enforcement with regard to any matter arising under these Non-Discrimination Authorities and this Assurance;
- Agrees to insert in all contracts and funding agreements with other State or private entities the following clause:
 "During the performance of this contract/funding agreement, the contractor/funding recipient agrees—
 - a. To comply with all Federal nondiscrimination laws and regulations, as may be amended from time to time;
 - b. Not to participate directly or indirectly in the discrimination prohibited by any Federal non-discrimination law or regulation, as set forth in appendix B of 49 CFR part 21 and herein;
 - c. To permit access to its books, records, accounts, other sources of information, and its facilities as required by the State highway safety office, US DOT or NHTSA;
 - d. That, in event a contractor/funding recipient fails to comply with any nondiscrimination provisions in this contract/funding agreement, the State highway safety agency will have the right to impose such contract/agreement sanctions as it or NHTSA determine are appropriate, including but not limited to withholding payments to the contractor/funding recipient under the contract/agreement until the contractor/funding recipient complies; and/or cancelling, terminating, or suspending a contract or funding agreement, in whole or in part; and
 - e. To insert this clause, including paragraphs (a) through (e), in every subcontract and subagreement and in every solicitation for a subcontract or sub-agreement, that receives Federal funds under this program.

POLITICAL ACTIVITY (HATCH ACT)

The APPLICANT will comply with provisions of the Hatch Act (5 U.S.C. 1501-1508), which limits the political activities of employees whose principal employment activities are funded in whole or in part with Federal funds.

CERTIFICATION REGARDING FEDERAL LOBBYING

Certification for Contracts, Grants, Loans, and Cooperative Agreements. The undersigned certifies, to the best of his or her knowledge and belief, that:

1. No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of the undersigned, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of

Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any Federal contract, the making of any Federal grant, the making of any Federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement;

2. If any funds other than Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement, the undersigned shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions;
3. The undersigned shall require that the language of this certification be included in the award documents for all sub-award at all tiers (including subcontracts, subgrants, and contracts under grant, loans, and cooperative agreements) and that all subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.

This certification is a material representation of fact upon which reliance was placed when this transaction was made or entered into. Submission of this certification is a prerequisite for making or entering into this transaction imposed by section 1352, title 31, U.S. Code. Any person who fails to file the required certification shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$10,000 and not more than \$100,000 for each such failure.

RESTRICTION ON STATE LOBBYING

None of the funds under this program will be used for any activity specifically designed to urge or influence a State or local legislator to favor or oppose the adoption of any specific legislative proposal pending before any State or local legislative body. Such activities include both direct and indirect (e.g., "grassroots") lobbying activities, with one exception. This does not preclude a State official whose salary is supported with NHTSA funds from engaging in direct communications with State or local legislative officials, in accordance with customary State practice, even if such communications urge legislative officials to favor or oppose the adoption of a specific pending legislative proposal.

5. The prospective lower tier participant agrees by submitting this proposal that, should the proposed covered transaction be entered into, it shall not knowingly enter into any lower tier covered transaction with a person who is proposed for debarment under 48 CFR part 9, subpart 9.4, debarred, suspended, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in this covered transaction, unless authorized by the department or agency with which this transaction originated.
6. 7. A participant in a covered transaction may rely upon a certification of a prospective participant in a lower tier covered transaction that it is not proposed for debarment under 48 CFR part 9, subpart 9.4, debarred, suspended, ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from the covered transaction, unless it knows that the certification is erroneous. A participant is responsible for ensuring that its principals are not suspended, debarred, or otherwise ineligible to participate in covered transactions. Except for transactions authorized under paragraph 5 of these instructions, if a participant in a covered transaction knowingly enters into a lower tier covered transaction with a person who is proposed for debarment under 48 CFR part 9, subpart 9.4, suspended, debarred, ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in this transaction, in addition to other remedies available to the Federal government, the department or agency with which this transaction originated may pursue available remedies, including suspension or debarment.

***Certification Regarding Debarment, Suspension, Ineligibility and Voluntary Exclusion –
Lower Tier Covered Transactions:***

1.
