PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that in accordance with Section 9-4 of the Revised Charter of the County of Maui (1983), as amended, the public is invited to present comments before the Council of the County of Maui on WEDNESDAY, APRIL 18, 2018, beginning at 6:00 p.m. or soon thereafter, in the Council Chamber, 8th Floor, Kalana O Maui Building, 200 South High Street, Wailuku, Maui, Hawaii, on the PROPOSED OPERATING BUDGET for the Fiscal Year July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019 (FY 2019) and CAPITAL PROGRAM as submitted by the Mayor to the Council of the County of Maui pursuant to Section 9-2 of the Revised Charter of the County of Maui.

The PROPOSED OPERATING BUDGET and CAPITAL PROGRAM may be examined during regular business hours in the Office of the County Clerk, County of Maui, 7th Floor, Kalana O Maui Building, 200 South High Street, Wailuku, Maui, Hawaii; at public and community libraries; and at the Hana, Lanai, and Molokai Council District Offices.

Pursuant to Sections 9-5 and 9-6 of the Revised Charter of the County of Maui, the Council shall adopt an OPERATING BUDGET for FY 2018 and CAPITAL PROGRAM on or before June 10, 2018.

Each testifier shall be allowed to speak for up to three minutes. If approved by the presiding officer and announced prior to any oral testimony being taken, the testifier may be allowed one minute to conclude their testimony. No further oral testimony by the testifier shall be permitted. An individual's request to testify may be deemed withdrawn if the individual does not answer when called to testify.

For remote testimony sites, oral testimony may be received from each of the Council district offices noted above. If the connection between the meeting site in the Council Chamber and any of the remote testimony sites is lost, the public hearing in the Council Chamber will still continue. Members of the public interested in information about offering testimony at the public hearing from a remote testimony site may contact the Office of the County Clerk (808-270-7748) prior to the public hearing. While oral testimony is being received the district offices cannot provide other services. The audio connection will be terminated after all oral testimony has been received.

To ensure its distribution prior to the public hearing, written testimony must be received, emailed (county.clerk@mauicounty.us), or faxed (808-270-7171) to the Office of the County Clerk at least 24 hours prior to the public hearing. If written testimony is submitted at the public hearing, 15 copies are requested.

Public access to the County Building will be available from the first floor entrance. Individuals planning to attend the public hearing are invited to utilize the lower parking lot adjacent to the building.

Individuals who intend to attend the public hearing and who have disabilities requiring special assistance should call the Office of the County Clerk at 270-7748, at least three days in advance.
