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SUBJECT: AMENDMENTS TO THE FISCAL YEAR 2016 BUDGET (BF-38)

On behalf of the Department of Housing and Human Concerns, transmitted herewith are the following proposed bills:

1. "A BILL FOR AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE FISCAL YEAR 2016 BUDGET FOR THE COUNTY OF MAUI AS IT PERTAINS TO ESTIMATED REVENUES; DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND HUMAN CONCERNS, HUMAN CONCERNS PROGRAM, (MAUI FAMILY LIFE CENTER, KA HALE A KE OLA); TOTAL OPERATING APPROPRIATIONS; AND TOTAL APPROPRIATIONS (OPERATING AND CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS)".

The purpose of the proposed bill is to add a new grant to Maui Family Life Center in the amount of \$378,000 and Ka Hale A Ke Ola in the amount of \$756,000 for site preparation, operation, and animal sheltering services related to a proposed capital improvement project involving the acquisition of 12 Spacemax shelter units to be used as temporary shelters for homeless individuals in Central and West Maui.

2. "A BILL FOR AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE FISCAL YEAR 2016 BUDGET FOR THE COUNTY OF MAUI AS IT PERTAINS TO ESTIMATED REVENUES; DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND HUMAN CONCERNS, HUMAN CONCERNS PROGRAM; TOTAL OPERATING APPROPRIATIONS; AND TOTAL APPROPRIATIONS (OPERATING AND CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS)".

The purpose of the proposed bill is to increase the appropriation for the Department of Housing and Human Concerns, Human Concerns Program by \$121,582 and equivalent personnel count by 3.0 for the purpose of establishing a Homeless Programs Division to facilitate the development, administration and coordination of the county's homeless programs. Attached for your information is a narrative provided by the department

describing the Homeless Program Division and responsibilities of the additional equivalent personnel.

The intent is to utilize the suspension of the provisions of Chapters 89 and 89C, Hawaii Revised Statutes, as provided for in Governor David Ige's Proclamation dated October 16, 2015, pertaining to the homeless emergency in the State of Hawaii, and if necessary, to also utilize any other powers afforded under Chapter 127A, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

The aforementioned increases will be funded by increasing Carryover/Savings General Fund in the amount of \$1,255,582, and increasing Estimated Revenues in the amount of \$1,255,582. Attached for your information is a Certification of Additional Revenues for Fiscal Year 2016 to certify the availability of General Fund Carryover/Savings in the amount of \$1,255,582.

3. "A BILL FOR AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE FISCAL YEAR 2016 BUDGET FOR THE COUNTY OF MAUI AS IT PERTAINS TO ESTIMATED REVENUES; COUNTYWIDE, OTHER PROJECTS, ACQUISITION OF SPACEMAX SHELTERS; TOTAL CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECT APPROPRIATIONS; AND TOTAL APPROPRIATIONS (OPERATING AND CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS)".

The purpose of the proposed bill is to add a \$660,000 appropriation in the FY 2016 Budget, Countywide, for a capital improvement project involving the acquisition of 12 Spacemax shelter units to be used as temporary shelters for homeless individuals. The shelters will be utilized by non-profit agencies, Maui Family Life Center and Ka Hale A Ke Ola, at its homeless shelter locations in Central and West Maui.

The intent is to utilize the suspension of the provisions of Section 103D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, as provided for in Governor David Ige's Proclamation dated October 16, 2015, pertaining to the homeless emergency in the State of Hawaii, and if necessary, to also utilize any other powers afforded under Chapter 127A, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

4. "A BILL FOR AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 4228, BILL NO. 35 (2015) RELATING TO THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS OF THE COUNTY OF MAUI (ACQUISITION OF SPACEMAX SHELTERS)"

The purpose of the proposed bill is to amend the Authorization of General Obligation Bonds in an aggregate amount not to exceed \$25,442,372, to pay all or part of the cost of appropriations for the public improvements of and for the County of Maui.

The Department of Housing and Human Concerns is requesting that the proposed bills be considered as soon as possible. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE COUNTY OF MAUI:

SECTION 1. Ordinance No. 4228, Bill No. 35 (2015), is amended by

amending Section 1 to read as follows:

"SECTION 1. <u>Authorization of General Obligation Bonds</u>. Pursuant to Chapter 47, Hawaii Revised Statutes, as amended, and particularly Part I thereof, there are hereby authorized to be issued and sold from time to time general obligation bonds of the County of Maui, State of Hawaii (the "County") in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed [\$24,782,372] <u>\$25,442,372</u> (the "Bonds"), the proceeds derived from the sale of which shall be used to pay all or part of the cost of appropriations for the public improvements of the County described in Section 2 hereof."

SECTION 2. Ordinance No. 4228, Bill No. 35 (2015), is amended by

amending Section 2 to read as follows:

"SECTION 2. Disposition of Bond Proceeds. All or any portion of the proceeds derived from the sale of the Bonds or any notes issued in anticipation of the Bonds shall be used to pay all or part of the cost of any of the public improvements listed below in accordance with appropriations contained in the Fiscal Year 2016 Budget, including amendments and supplements thereto, duly approved by the Council of the County (the "Council") for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2016 (the "Fiscal Year 2016 Budget"); provided, however, that pursuant to Section 47-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the part of such proceeds which are in excess of the amounts required for the purposes for which the Bonds are initially issued from time to time, or which may not be applied to such purposes, or which the Council deems should not be applied to such purposes, may be applied to finance such other public improvements of the County as the Council shall, by ordinance approved by an affirmative vote of two-thirds of all of its members, determine; and provided further that the actual use and application of the proceeds of Bonds issued pursuant to this ordinance shall not in any way affect the validity or legality of such Bonds. No proceeds of the Bonds shall be applied to any public improvement listed in this section unless and until there shall be a valid appropriation of general obligation bond proceeds in effect for such public improvement. # MAUI COUNTY HOMELESS PROGRAM Department of Housing & Human Concerns

# INTRODUCTION

The Maui County Homeless Program is responsible to develop, fund and implement innovative sheltering programs for the growing homeless issue in Maui County. These sheltering programs will be focused on the development of temporary, transitional and permanent housing for the homeless population, in conjunction with the continuum of care model utilizing necessary social services. The goal is to provide for the safety and health of Maui County's homeless and de-facto resident populations utilizing the Housing First initiative.

The Homeless Program is responsible for the development, administration and coordination of the County's homeless programs, optimal utilization of State and Federal homeless funds to enhance the operations of homeless facilities and supportive social service programs for shelters, outreach and grants.

The establishment of the Homeless Program includes the creation of a Homeless Program Division under the Department of Housing & Human Concerns to report directly to the Director in order to facilitate & implement a Homeless program development. Three positions are requested, a Coordinator, Specialist and Office Assistant to develop and implement a Homeless Program in Maui County.

## Homeless Program Division

A new division under the Department of Housing & Human Concerns, Human Concerns Program to report to the Director.

# **Class Specification:**
