To promote and protect the well-being of the older person in Maui County......

What is the Office on Aging/ADRC?

- MCOA exists because of Federal Law (the Older Americans Act of 1965), and every county in America has an Area Agency on Aging (AAA) or is directly connected to a State Unit on Aging (SUA).
- MCOA is a Federally designated office.
- MCOA is established in the Hawaii Revised Statutes and in County Charter.
- MCOA is the result of legislators realizing that older Americans who have contributed to community over the course of their lifetimes deserve to live their retirement years with dignity and financial security in the residence of their choosing.

What does MCOA do?

- MCOA is charged by the Older Americans Act to serve as the lead advocate, facilitator, planner, policy developer, and evaluator relative to all aging, disability, and family caregiving issues in the County of Maui.
- MCOA informs the public regarding programs, resources, and services available.
- MCOA allocates federal, state, and county funding to service providers so that home and community needs of Maui County seniors and individuals with disabilities are met.
- MCOA serves as the designated operating entity of the Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) for Maui County.
- Last year, MCOA served almost 12,000 individuals and around 2500 families and informal caregivers throughout Maui County.

Why do the services MCOA provides matter?

What IS the ADRC?

- The highly visible and trusted source where people of all incomes and ages can turn for information on the full range of long-term support options <u>and</u> access to publicly funded long-term support programs and benefits

Area Plan

- 1. Every four years we are required by the Administration on Community Living to work with the State of Hawaii Executive Office on Aging to compile a four-year plan. All four Area Agencies on Aging worked with the State to develop five (5) goals:
- 2. Maximize opportunities for Seniors to Age Well, Remain Active, and Enjoy Quality Lives while Engaging in Their Communities;
- Forge Strategic Partnerships and Alliances that will Give Impetus to Meeting Hawaii's Greatest Challenges for the Aging Population;
- 4. Strengthen the statewide ADRC system for persons with disabilities, older adults, and their families;
- 5. Enable Older Adults to Live in the Community through the Availability of and Access to High-Quality Long-Term Services and Supports, Including Supports for Families and Caregivers; and
- 6. Optimize the Health, Safety, and Independence of Hawaii's Older Adults.
- MCOA is conducting a series of community focus groups in order to gather input regarding the supports and services currently offered, areas of need that are as yet unmet and ways in which MCOA can best support the growing number of seniors in Maui County.
- Input from the focus groups will inform MCOA as to specific objectives, strategies, and outcome measures for each of the five statewide goals. Once the team has gathered information and compiled the report, MCOA will hold a public hearing to gather final input before finalizing the plan and submitting it to the Mayor for signature.
- MCOA anticipates the completion of the Area Plan in June.


