My husband and I (Edward Williams and Marlene Noble) live Upcountry, on Lumahai Place, just off Olinda Road. We attended the Council meeting last night because we were concerned with two aspects dealing with the maintenance of Olinda Road.

1. The Eucalyptus trees lining the upper section of Olinda road (mostly at or above the mile 10 road marker) are a dangerous hazard. There are several that have come down on the curve just above mile 10 in the last 4-6 months. Each time they come down they take out the electricity and cable. They also block the road, so there is no convenient way for people that live here to access their property. Residents must drive up past the "end county road" signs, over a very potholed/tree rooted section of Olinda road to Piiholo road (also in bad shape) to get out. The fallen trees can also take out buildings adjacent to the road (see enclosed photo) and any car unlucky enough to be driving on the road.

We realize that it will be costly to remove these trees, but due to the beetle infestations one presenter spoke about last night, they are coming down sooner or later anyhow, making them an expensive liability to the county. Removing them piecemeal after they fall in an uncontrolled fashion has to cost more than removing them in systematically. An arborist could prioritize them for removal according to their health. But the trees are a clear and present danger. Some months ago, both Marlene and Ed were blocked coming up the road when trees fell across the road at the corner of Lumahai and Olinda. Later, George, who was staying here, was blocked by another tree that fell. He had to rent a room in Kahului until Olinda and Piiholo roads were cleared. Recently two of our own Eucalyptus trees crashed down on our neighbor's property. Our house shook so hard we thought it was an earthquake! We pre-emptively removed about ten more trees to mitigate future risk. The county needs to be equally pro-active.

2. Some portions of Olinda road above Seabury are presently being resurfaced due to the many potholes and cracks in the road. However, the road-resurfacing crews have only done part of the road, preferring to just fill some of the other potholes. Many of these "filled" potholes have subsided, creating a new pothole. Other potholes were not filled, so cars still need to drive around them, creating more hazards on this windy road as they must drive on the other side of the road. In particular, the resurfacing stopped just above mile 9. Just below mile 9 (about 100 ft or so) is a very damaged section of Olinda that should have been fixed. It gets regularly patched, but the repairs only last a few months. Marlene has spoken with the Makawao

road group and they explained that 1) there was no funding authorized for this section of Olinda and 2) this work was contracted out, so it seems no one will hold the contractors responsible for fixing the missed and sunken potholes. We much appreciate that some of Olinda road has been fixed. We are now safer driving on it, but leaving parts unfixed is not really acceptable.

We would like to take the time to thank you for funding the Mental Health America of Hawaii formerly known as Mental Health Association of Maui Youth Suicide and Bullying Prevention Training. We were fortunate enough to have Danielle Bergan and her staff present this important topic to our students in Feb 2019 during their Health class. Our students at Lahaina Intermediate were very engaged in the presentation and gained valuable information on the different types of bullying behavior. They learned what they can do if it happens to themselves or others. The information they were given on suicide prevention was helpful because we have had students with suicide ideation and students who have had a friend with suicide ideation they were concerned about but weren't sure how to respond. Now they know they can talk to school counseling staff or a trusted adult and also have all the important contacts and numbers for the Suicide Crisis Line. With Hawaii statistics listed below, I feel it is more important than ever to support mental health programs.

### The Hawaii Youth Risk behaviors survey results for Maui County 2017 show: (listed

under Mental Health and Suicide and Injuries and Violence)

\*27.3% of students felt sad or hopeless almost everyday for two or more weeks in a row \*23.6% seriosly thought about killing themselves

\*16.5% made a plan

\*12% tried to kill themselves

\*58.7% Stongly agreed or agreed that harassment and bullying by other students is a problem at their school

\*22.9% were electronically bullied

\*18% were in a physical fight in past 12 months

\*8.7% did not go to school because they felt unsafe at school or on their way to or from school

We are grateful for this program and believe they are truly helping to save lives. We ask that you continue to provide funding in order to provide the Youth Suicide and Bullying Prevention Training next school year as well.

Crystal methamphetamine is a medical, legal and social crisis that has now entered its third generation in Hawai'i. The federal government estimates that more than 10,000 people died of meth-related drug overdoses last year, leaving children orphaned and communities destroyed. 'Ohana Makamae Behavioral Health Services & Family Resource Center is at the forefront in the battle to rescue our community from the Ice Epidemic by providing the Matrix Model of Recovery, an evidence-based program designed for stimulant addiction.

Success in addiction treatment can be defined in different ways, by negative urine drug tests, by continued participation in treatment. The National Institute on Drug Addiction (NIDA) Estimates the average success rate for addiction treatment to be 40-60%. The Matrix Model is superior to other treatment modalities in clinical trials, and outcomes are generally higher than 70%.

'Ohana Makamae Behavioral Health Services is *the only treatment facility* in Hawaii utilizing the Matrix Model of Recovery exclusively. A program acknowledged by the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) and the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), as a *successful method* in the fight against stimulant use disorders.

As part of 'Ohana Makamae's intensive outpatient program, an individualized treatment plan is designed to meet the specific needs of each client and their family. Clients attend group sessions three times each week with individual and conjoint sessions provided regularly. A continuing care program (Social Support Groups) meets weekly following the intensive phase of treatment. Also, the Matrix Model encourages clients to attend 12-step meetings as an added recovery source.

Currently, 'Ohana Makamae's clinicians are undergoing training from an educational supervisor certified by the Matrix Institute. Once completed, 'Ohana Makamae will provide services never before available to those we serve. We have an opportunity to save our community, and it cannot happen without funding. We have a chance to save a generation of Hawaiians lost in the darkness of addiction, and we need your financial support to make it happen. We're not talking about statistics... we are talking about human lives in need of help.

I am a client within one of the Soil & Water Conservation Districts on Maui and received conservation planning assistance for my Ranch in Halehaku, Haiku, Maui, Hawaii.

Please consider continued funding of, not just a great program, but a necessary one. I have been a participant of this program since 2016. I ranch on a lease, formerly from A&B but now from from Mahi Pono, 1,000 Acres in the Ko'olau Forest Reserve applying and adhering to their conservation practices and in return they help to plan and fund a complicated infrastructure. Some specific examples how this programs assists us cooperators:

- Fencing requirements that protect the endangered Hawaiian bats
- Keep my ungulated animals out of the State's water resources via fence funding
- Access Roads to shore up against erosion issues

They are also heavy into their outreach at many events like the County Fair and Ag festivals held around Maui. They are all professionals and always make time for their clientele whether it's holding our hands completing paperwork or with heavy amounts of questions on our projects big or small.

To end, I would like to clarify I'm only 1 guy who is literally starting from the bottom of the mountain of this 1,000 Acre monster project after receiving the pasture from my Grandfather and Dad who let a lot of things go. I have a regular day job and have 2 young children so time is scarce, but I still try to make it happen. There is no profit yet but for the last 2 years I have been playing this like a real life chess game and skillfully reinvesting any extra monies into this ranch which would have been 100% impossible without just the fencing assistance from the SWCD alone. But the results are profound and can be measured. The land is clear and cows can be found. The cows are contained and now can be sold. With no shame, this is only possible because of the help I received.
