I had know Dr. and Mrs. Janikowski since around the time they arrived on Lana'i. I went to a healthy life style class Valerie started here and Dr. John treated me for diabetes.

So I have known and been treated by each of them for some time. There are a lot of words I can use to describe both of them that can also be used to describe the people they have brought together to organize Lana'i Kina'ole to do the work they are trying to do. Which is Home Care and Home Health Care for our island residents and also visitors.

If someone were to look at a list the individuals who make up the advisers, board, partners and staff and then watch them work for a while they would see the words, the qualities the Janikowskis seek out in others, have in themselves, and by example instill, and inspire, those around them.

Aloha. Mahalo for giving us this opportunity to testify and for the support provided to all of our services.

**KAUNOA SERVICES:** As a senior I participate daily at the Senior Center in exercise provided by the Lana'i Community Health Center, availability of exercise equipment, daily lunch and social activities. I appreciate availability of the computers for personal business and news. The Nutrition Lunch Program is critical to those who cannot travel to the center. I would recommend

 Converting the part-time <u>Program Nutrition Aide</u> position to a <u>full-time</u> for delivery of meals and support to existing staff who provide organized activities along with support of the meal program.

**MEO SERVICES:** The MEO Programs are a strong support to children to seniors. The transportation service is important to those needing dialysis, to transportation to various necessary activities from daily shopping, transportation to medical appointments, for shopping and to airport and ferry. I recognize the acquisition of a new bus/van, however I recommend

- A bus with a full handicap lift and space for walkers and chairs.
- Support staff of one FTE additional driver
- Support staff one FTE for administration and management of the program. The transportation program often has requests beyond regular working hours due to airline and ferry schedules and late appointments.

SHARED COMMUNITY KITCHEN: PARKS AND RECREATION: Residents are excited about the renovation of the Community Center kitchen creating an opportunity for those who are seeking to prepare foods for sale or personal activities. The funding of the design has been crucial to move the project forward. I believe the plans are being reviewed by the County and a public notice of a bid is expected shortly.

- Please expedite the project through to completion.
- Please provide additional funds to ensure the project is completed as designed.
- Please provide Parks and Recreation with the staff and funding support to administer the program.
- The kitchen will provide an opportunity for a vendor to provide nutritional meals through the nutrition program. Currently meals are provided by Lana'i High and Elementary School Food Services Program. Our senior participants have a wide variety of

- nutritional needs due to health and dietary requirements. A vendor may be able to adjust to these needs at a reasonable price.
- Local farmers and produce vendors should be able to provide farm to table products or meals locally at a fair market price.
- Some are looking forward to producing value-added products from Lana'i.

### **PUBLIC WORKS:**

- State Veterans Cemetery: Lana'i Veterans Cemetery is administered under the State Office of Veterans Services Honolulu. In 2018 the U. S. Veterans Administration provided approximately \$700,000 to upgrade the cemetery with fencing to protect from our local deer, a new gate, flag poles, water tank and solar panels to light the flags.
  - # County <u>Public Works is providing valuable support</u> to the maintenance of the cemetery by lawn maintenance, flag lowering and raising, maintenance to the building facility.
  - # Note that the cemetery has <u>no water line</u> and all water must be trucked to the cemetery. In addition the cemetery has <u>no electrical power line</u> to the facility.
  - # Public Works may be required to open and close the cemetery at times required by regulations for the cemetery.
  - # Public Works has provided placement of flags, preparation of burial graves and cremations and many additional accommodations. Public Works has been critical to creating an environment for families of veterans have access and feel the respect the veterans deserve.
- County Roads and Highways: With the renovation to the Ko'ele Lodge and construction of the Adventure Park large, heavy vehicles have used streets and roads to move heavy equipment and loads through Lanai City. Residents have expressed concern. The request is requisition of funds in anticipation of that need. Safety for the drivers and operators is paramount. The wet unpaved pineapple roads are not safe for operating heavy loads. Until those private roads are upgraded the safest operations are through the city.

**HOUSING AND HUMAN CONCERNS:** Affordable housing remains and will continue to be problematic for residents working and residing on Lana'i.

- According to 2017 American Fact Finder estimates Lana'i Census Designated Place population is 3185 with 1496 housing units of which 260 are vacant units.
- The Homeowner vacancy rate is 3.8% and rental vacancy rate is 7.6%.
- With increased demand currently and with the opening of the Ko'ele Wellness Center higher demand is anticipated with concurrent rise in prices.

**KINA'OLE LANA'I:** The program provides excellent Hone Health services to Lana'i residents. I have personally observed families taking advantage of the service to care for elderly parents at home.

**EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS FOR LANA'I:** The coordination of service in advance of a weather or other emergency has been excellent. I believe Lana'i needs a plan to pre-stage equipment and supplies before such an event our harbor and airport may be impacted for a month or more. Pre-staging will ensure sufficient resources are on-island until facilities are available.

## Maui County Budget Hearing Lanai Senior Center Monday, April 1, 2019

Kumpang Lana'i, DBA: Coalition for Drug Free Lana'i Testimony: Joelle MLA Aoki, Executive Director

I am the Executive Director for the Coalition for Drug Free Lana'i (CDFL), which is the only prevention based agency on Lana'i that serves the general community. The commitment and partnership of the County of Maui for the CDFL has helped to secure federal monies every year for the past 19 years. We thank you for your support and greatly appreciate the line item allocation of \$50,000.00. Funding provided was utilized tenfold as matching funds by leveraging monies with other funders, partners, and specifically with Federal Funding through the Substance Abuse Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), Office of the President and the State of Hawaii, Drug and Alcohol Abuse Division. This funding would not be possible without the commitment of the County of Maui. Federal mandate requires our Drug Free Coalition to have a partnership with our local government providing matching funds in order to receive funds through SAMHSA and other Federal agencies.

This coming bi-annual year our efforts continue to make a tremendous difference in our community such as the Annual Student Drug and Alcohol Use Survey which is a tool utilized to collect data. This is an important resource for all organizations on Lana'i needing data specific to our island. Another effort is one of our prevention education curriculums offered in partnership with Lanai High & Elementary School, this health curriculum is facilitated in the classroom called Botvin Lifeskills. This is a Science Based curriculum which coincides with benchmark standards in the Middle and High School grades. We have certified two teachers and plan to have two additional teachers complete the certification this year.

We continue emphasis on environmental strategies relating to tobacco, drug use, underage drinking and alcohol abuse at our only public beach park as well public facilities within our community and continued support of compliance checks at all licensed alcohol point of sale.

This past year the CDFL applied once again for services through the US Pentagon, Armed Forces, Innovative Readiness Training Program (IRT); for medical services in the County of Maui. The mission was held this past August 8 – 22, 2018. This event was a huge success in partnership with the County of Maui, Department of Health, Maui Economic Opportunity, Pulama Lana'i and many others.

We ask for your continued support of our partners the Lanai Youth Center, Keiki O Lana'i Preschool, Maui Economic Opportunity and Women Helping Women.

In closing, we humbly request for continued funding for the bi-annual 2020-2021 Fiscal Year to \$50,000.00, this will help to meet the federal match requirement from our local government and the overall match needed for the CDFL. Thank you Joelle Aoki; Executive Director.

Good Evening Maui County Council Members,

Thank you for taking the time to come to the Island of Lana'i to listen to the needs of our small community.

My name is Kris Kahihikolo and I am the Program Manager for Kauna'oa Senior Services at the Lana'i Senior Center.

I come to you today for the main purpose of asking for your continued support of the Lana'i Senior Center.

Currently we have close to \_25-30\_ seniors who come on a **daily** basis Monday through Friday to participate in activities and receive a meal. We are also currently delivering 50 meals a day to our homebound seniors and caregivers who are unable to attend do to health related issues.

Lana'i is an extremely unique place in so many ways. As on all the islands, our Kupuna are respected, loved, and cherished. I feel that it is important to remind ourselves that that due to our geographical remoteness and the availability of services, we often have a disadvantage compared to the other islands.

This Lana'l Senior center provides a place for a variety of activities daily such as; special events, educational presentations, exercise classes, leisure trips, a hot meal, arts and crafts, and daily social stimulation to 80 registered seniors. We are committed to our senior participants by inspiring them to learn new ideas, master new skills, and live healthy, active, productive lives.

As the **only** full-time employee of the Lana'i Senior Center, I am the only one overseeing and or executing 4 different Programs within the Lana'i Senior Center. Now, with the expansion of programs and services to our seniors in the next fiscal year 2020, and potentially adding Assisted Transportation, there will be a great need for another half time position added to our current staffing. Even our current half time Program Nutrition Aid position could potentially be taken away at any time due to the fact that it is grant funded. Given the information stated above, we request making our Program Nutrition Aid position a full time county funded position.

We are also requesting the purchase of a truck. When Lana'l Trucking a local freight delivery company left Lana'i, there was no way to get our freight from Kaumalapau Harbor. (Please reference the formal impact statement enclosed.)

I come to you today not only from the standpoint of the Seniors who I represent, but from the other members of this community who have invested so much of their time and energy to better the overall quality of life and productivity of the people who live here.

I thank you for your past, and present support of the Lana'i Senior Center to make these retirement years the "best years" of their lives

I would ask that you would consider the need of this community for a certified kitchen.

Please continue to support our Lana'i Youth Center and CDFL.

Finally, I would ask for continued support for MEO and their request for a parttime driver position.

# Formal Impact Statement for Lana'i Senior Center

Issue: Loss of Services from Lana'i Trucking

The Lana'i Senior Center was notified on August 9<sup>th</sup> 2018 that Lana'i Trucking would no longer be providing transport services of freight or otherwise to business' and residence of the island of Lana'i. Due to the above circumstances, the Lana'i Senior Center would have no way of hauling freight to the Center that would come via Young Brothers therefore, making it hard to operate without adequate supplies for daily operations. This would make a great impact on the Lana'i Senior Center's service delivery both for the Congregate Nutrition Program and Meals on Wheels.

Other considerations in honoring our request for a truck would be that there is often large amounts of green waste accumulated from the trees, yard debris etc. Having a truck to take the waste to the green waste disposal area would not only be better environmentally but it would save the space in our current dumpster that is also utilized by Office on Aging.

Because the Senior Center is the managing office for the other offices within the building, a truck is often requested to move something that is large enough that it requires a truck. Some of these items include but not limited to a long ladders, pressure washers, furniture, and disposing of an accumulation of old materials downstairs that need to go to the dump etc.

Due to the lack of truck transport services on Lana'i is the main justification for requesting a budget amendment to accommodate the increasing need for a truck. As we continue to increase in the numbers of seniors served, the need for a secondary vehicle for the Senior Center will also increase to also accommodate Kaunoa support staff coming over to Lana'i to cover when regular staff is either gone due to vacation or illness.

# Aloha Maui County Council,

Thank you for coming to Lāna'i!

Last year you approved our program budget request of \$202,817.00; with that budget we were able to, for the first time, fund a full time Program Coordinator position. Having a full time program coordinator has been awesome, it has enhanced the quality, delivery and reach of our program, with someone purely focused on program development and community outreach our services as of today has reached 200 youth served. We anticipate reaching our goal of 230 a year by the end of this fiscal year. Through efforts from our coordinator, collaborations with community organizations like the Lanai Community Health Center were made possible. LCHC's team visits with youth to discuss various behavioral health topics and provides extra drug prevention education sessions for our youth.

With your ongoing support our program yearly is able to provide:

- -279 Educational activities and Homework assistance sessions.
- -244 Health & Wellness sessions, that include cooking & nutrition classes, behavioral health education and fitness activities.
- -58 Prevention sessions that address potential at risk behaviors.
- -79 Character building and value development sessions.
- -304 Alternative Activities sessions that are fun and innovative.
- -52 Culture appreciation and awareness sessions
- -263 Outdoor recreation, team building and sports sessions and

Lāna'i Kina'ole - Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) Home Health Services

Purpose Statement: Lāna'i Kina'ole, is a community group and a nonprofit incorporated agency formed to focus on health care service advocacy to include kupuna care, with an initial focus on supporting the continuation of licensed Home Health Services. The purpose of this initiative and the activity related to such is to provide HCBS, Home Care and Home Health services, including ancillary services, to the community members of Lāna'i, focusing on the homebound kupuna who desire to remain in their own homes/enable these kupuna to "age in place" for as long as it is feasibly possible, with the appropriate services.

As the proposed HCBS and Home Health services will be a continuation of ongoing services in partnership with Arcadia through licensure, collaborating with the new business Lāna'i Kina'ole, Inc. Services will be available to all community members, with focus attention on kupuna and the Native Hawaiian population, on island. The Home Health and Home Care is intended for homebound clients in need of services. However, the HCBS portion is to lend support for caregivers, interested community members who would desire education or health monitoring, and support for healthcare conditions. Note - Lāna'i Kina'ole, Inc. has applied for HI state licensure for Home Care and Home Health which must be evaluated by, processed through and approved by the Department of Health (DOH) Office of Healthcare Assurance (OHCA). Timing undefined at present.

Year One (1) July 1, 2019-June 30, 2020: Requesting \$75,000.00 of Maui County funds allocation. As a new agency, support is required to establish supplies and equipment to start-up the new business and implement services through Lāna'i Kina'ole. **See the attached** details for necessary items to procure for original supply and equipment for the critical services, to the community of Lāna'i.

Year Two (2) July 1, 2020-June 30, 2021: Requesting \$50,000.00 of Maui County funds allocation. Project team anticipates that services will be delivered to clients as referred and as staffing availability dictates. We anticipate some clients to continue with services needs but there will be clients revolve on and off services and expect 10-12% duplication of services but a potential 15% increase in new clients. During year two (2) supplies to deliver services will continue to be required. Ealuation of utilization, of supplies, and equipment will be ongoing. Additionally, staff will be working with clients and caregivers to evaluate services delivered through focus groups and surveys. Budget specifics to be submitted January 2020, based on utilization analysis and determined support requirements.

**Program Sustainability** - Efforts will be made to secure contracts with individual private insurance companies and agencies for reimbursement for services. Potentially initiate process for Medicare Certification Readiness Analysis through consultants. Fee for services expected.


Year Three (3) July 1, 2021-June 30, 2022: Requesting \$35,000.00 of Maui County funds allocation Ongoing service provision with projected increase services options and collaboration with other agencies with goal to support the community with Behavior Health services and propose innovative working model for RN/CNA care in tandem to improve client services and the client experience. Again, these steps are to be evaluated through focus groups and surveys. Budget specifics to be submitted January 2021, based on utilization analysis and determined support requirements.

**Program Sustainability** - Efforts will be made to pursue Medicare Certification for the Home Care and Home Health Services to allow for reimbursement for services.

Among other medical concerns I have recurring diabetic foot ulcers that need care from the Lana'i Kina'ole RN every day. Previously, I received this care from the same nurses who originally worked at KOHOL. I also require regular monitoring on the status of my other medical conditions.

I know I am one of many who required professional care and supportive services on Lana'i. This is a small island and yet, especially with our older population, this type of nursing care is a must. For me I was forced to spend an extra 4 days in the hospital because there were questions about the care being in jeopardy, on Lana'i. My conditions are so many and so serious that I would need to live on another island, to receive the care required if professional services are not available. I want to remain on Lana'i, living in my home as long as I can, and Lana'i Kina'ole will allow this to happen.
