Went up to LCRS (Aloha House) to detox for 10 days and my case worker told me there Was a bed space open up in Hana at Ohana Makamae so decided to come check it out with a open-mind. This is my first time seeking treatment for my addiction and couldn't imagine a more serve place other than here to do it. I not only think Ohana Makamae makes a postive impact for the community of Hana, but the entire island. This treatment center and the people that run it give residents a oppurtunity to change their life in a positive way with the tools to stay clean once graduate.

- Ohana Makamae- They have continue offer services to help people in a live of sober and drug free live and helps build families back together in a positive way

- Hana Cultural Center- They offer many things that help understand our history and community


Aloha mai kākou,

The following is my testimony to the County of Maui Economic Development and Budget Committee members for their peruse and consideration.

I make a request for the following:

- <u>A quick promise to repair the existing pavilion at Kapueokahi.</u> As you know the roof of the pavilion blew off during a storm in February. The pavilion is fundamental to the tradition of 'ohana gatherings and cultural events that take place at Kapueokahi. Without it, there is no covered facility to protect users from the <u>Koholapehu</u> or the rainy wind from the ocean.
 - The County's own website says " Hana is the garden treasure high atop Maui's Northern coast. No visit on island is complete without a scenic ride on the Road to Hana (Highway 36). Once you've arrived, Maui County Parks provide a variety of options for fun and recreation, and all county parks' locations can be reached by following the road into Central Hana. Each year Hana hosts a number of special events.... Hana is an ideal location for an all-day outing, experiencing the road at sunrise and park-supported events throughout the day."
- As a Director of the non-profit Nā Mamo O Mū'olea I have a real concern about whether or not we will have a venue for our 10th Hana Limu Festival. Last year we postponed what would have been our 10th ANNUAL event because of on-going construction plans in the Kapueokahi area. We have already started the permitting process (which literally takes months to complete) and applied for grants to help fund our event. But Parks & Rec cannot give us a guarantee everything will be repaired and ready for use. And while we understand this, I implore you to please make the repairs a priority! It's so important to maintain traditions: Not just our festival, but regattas, graduation parties, baby luaus, birthdays, Aloha Week etc. etc.

I strongly support of the following, and appeal to you to fund these worthy causes and organizations:

- <u>Ke Ao Hali'i -</u> Please support the Mayor's proposed budget to set aside \$2.25M from the Open Space, Natural Resources, Cultural Resources and Scenic Views Preservation Fund as a grant to Ke Ao Hali'i for land acquisition in Hana.
 - These coastal lands in the Mokae and Maka'alae areas are precious open space, very culturally and historically significant, and used by the community for traditional and customary practices and subsistence gathering, as well as recreation. These lands could soon be sold and developed if we don't act now, forever changing the landscape of Hana. This is a window of opportunity to protect these lands for future generations.
- <u>Nā Mamo O Mū'olea</u> is a 501(c)(3). For more than 10 years our organization of all volunteers have worked tirelessly to promote education and awareness of our ocean and near shore habitat. We have partnered with scientist to educate ourselves and others about the issues of 'opihi, limu, i'a, coral and all the delicacies we enjoy and hope 7 generations following will enjoy. We are sponsors of youth programs and outreach. We are committed, and we work hard. Please continue to support our requests for help with our outreach work in 'aina based and 'ohana based programs. Please continue to help us continue and grow our Hana Limu Festival event that takes place each November, drawing people from throughout Hawai'i Pae'aina. And which supports our Dr. Isabella Kauakea Aiona Abbott scholarship.
- <u>'Ahahui Ka'ahumanu</u> for their dedication and commitment to preserve the history, legacy and mo'olelo of our great Queen who was born here in Hāna.
- <u>Hale Hulu Mamo</u> A part of the Maui Adult Care Centers who provide a safe and stimulating environment for our kūpuna to share and have a sense of well being.
- <u>Hana Youth Center</u> A safe haven for our youth that provides a positive learning environment for after school activities. So important for parents who work, and can feel good that their children are safe, doing homework and learning new and interesting life skills.





I am one of 3 co-chairs of the annual Hāna Limu Festival, which is held every year at Hāna Bay Beach Park. This fun educational event draws hundreds of participants who have a great time learning not only about Limu, but also about all kinds of things related to maintaining healthy shorelines in East Maui. We have games, exhibits, music, hula, films, and educated speakers. This event draws families, local residents and visitors alike and is one of Hāna's most anticipated annual events.

In 2018 we had to cancel the Limu Festival because of uncertainty about the repair schedule for the facilities at Hāna Bay Beach Park. We were very disappointed, as it would have been our 10th Annual Limu Festival. Another venue would not have been suitable, as this is an ocean-oriented event. (in 2017 the Hōkūle'a participated).

Our 10th Limu Festival has been re-scheduled for November 2019, and we have already lined up speakers, entertainers, and participants. Grant funding is in place and permits are in process. This Hāna Community Association would like to extend its enthusiastic support for the proposed donation of a community Bike Trail. The completion of this Bike Trail is critical to pedestrian safety in Hāna and would provide a much-needed venue for physical activities, to promote healthy living in our community.

In the small town of only 1,235 residents (U.S. Census 2010), our roadways see an average of 1,800 to 2,700 vehicles on a daily basis. This heavy flow of traffic is often erratic, since the vast majority of drivers are tourists unfamiliar with the turns and terrain. At the same time, the business center of Hāna has no continuous sidewalk, and most shoulders are on an incline. The only passage for pedestrians in Hāna center, *including for our youth*, are lanes of travel on the Hāna Highway or an equally hazardous one-lane roadway.

More than a two-hour drive from Maui's urban center, Hāna is disconnected from the health and medical facilities on island. With no gym or recreational center where residents of all ages can safely exercise, the creation of an extended trail, protected from the roadways, is essential to the health of our residents. This trail would promote biking, walking, jogging, and the exploration of nature, which is known to reduce stress and improve overall health.

The proposed trajectory of the Bike Trail meets the community's imminent need to connect the northern half of Hāna, where its preK-12th grade school is located, to the small business center of Hāna. The Hāna Community Association eagerly endorses this project, and urges our community leaders to provide the necessary support to see the Bike Trail project through for the well-being of this generation of keiki and in perpetuity for generations to come.

A very brief history:

- * There are more than a hundred cesspools, an injection well and the unlinedtoxic-polluting Hana dump draining into Kapueokahi (Hana Bay). In addition, the entire Hotel Hana-Maui and the County of Maui Hana Community Center are in the Special Management Area (SMA) and are an integral part of the problems that must, by law, be timely resolved.
- * Dr. Jon Mink detected high levels of coliform bacteria in the area below the injection well on the Waikoloa side of the bay around 1988 while conducting base line studies for the Rosewood Sea Ranch Cottages.
- * Medical cases of staph infection from the water in Hana Bay are ongoing.
- * A "low tech" water treatment plan for Kapueokahi (Hana Bay) was discussed and formulated in 1988 between Dr. John Harrison, University of Hawai'i Environmental Center, and the Hana Community Association. This led to the 1994 Hana Community Plan language which has not been implemented in 25 years since 1994. Shameful.
- * The General Plan Advisory Committee (GPAC) discussed the Hana landfill situation. In public hearings, County of Maui officials stated the Hana landfill would be closed soon and become a "satellite" landfill. Meaning; Trash not recycled would be hauled to the Central Maui landfill. Landfill closure has not occurred. Aggregate "cover" material for the Hana landfill is now being hauled to Hana from Central Maui in over the legal weight limit trucks. Please budget and require a forensic audit of the Hana landfill situation, including the previous illegal mining and desecration of Olapawa mountain in Kaeleku for landfill "cover" material. The County of Maui agreed an Environmental Impact Statement should be done as part of remediation of Olapawa mountain. No Environmental Impact Statement has been produced. The county is

potentially liable for millions of dollars of property damage from the intentional neglect and loss of property from flooding caused by the un permitted mining.

* Solving these problems should be the highest budget priority for the District of Hana. I suggest budgeting \$100,000 as a "start up" six year capital improvement project and referring to the County Council Environmental, Agriculture, and Cultural Preservation Committee as an agenda item. The Hawai'i State Department of Health, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the Gates Foundation and others should be included in the committee discussions and solutions. The Queen Ka'ahumanu Society, Hana Canoe Club, Hana Akule Hui, Travaasa Hana Maui and others should be included in the committee discussions and solutions.

#2 BUDGET PRIORITY FOR THE HANA COMMUNITY PLAN DISTRICT.

I strongly support purchase of land in Hāna for conservation, recreation, historical, cultural and other values. Mayor Victorino has wisely included 2.25 million dollars in the proposed budget for that purpose. Mahalo Mayor Victorino!

I have worked for over forty years to help toward the acquisition of important lands for the community. The list includes 'aina located in Kipahulu, Mu'olea Point, Maka'alae, the entire Hotel Hana-Maui and Hana Ranch and approximately 250 acres of culturally important land identified in the 21 "conditions of zoning" in the proposed PK-4 Keola Hana-Maui Golf Course and Country Club.

The story documents the complete failure of the Maui Planning Commission to hear and respond to the people of Hana. The last paragraphs documents Chair Velma Santos frustration with the situation and her move to create the Hana Advisory Committee to the Maui Planning Commission. Mahalo Velma!

I was appointed by Mayor Hannibal Tavares to serve on the first Hana Advisory Committee to the Maui Planning Commission along with John Akana, Bob Carroll, Roland Chang, Harry Hasegawa, Mathew Kalalau and Lidia Laeha, Recently, after nearly ten years of conflict, the Hana Advisory Committee to the Maui Planning Commission wisely made the correct and community supported decision to recommend an Environmental Assessment (EA) process for the County of Maui, not community, proposed Nahiku Community Center. This process was required by both the State Land Board "Set Aside" and Hawaii Revised Statute Chapter 343. The Hana and Nahiku Community broke into loud applause when the recommendation passed at the meeting in Hana.

However, Planning Director Michele McLean and the Maui Planning Commission completely ignored the recommendation of the Hana Advisory Committee to the Maui Planning Commission and recommended approval. Shameful. Unethical. Illegal. I repeat the community based request for a forensic audit of this entire corrupt situation.

POSSIBLE HANA DISTRICT PROJECTS NOT FUNDED IN MAYOR VICTORINO'S BUDGET

The Nahiku Community Center. I support and compliment Mayor Victorino's decision not to fund this development. The lack of legally required public due process, fraud, misrepresentations, lack of transparency, lack of legal jurisdiction and an unresolved lawsuit support his decision. This two million dollar + project is not supported by the community as proposed. More than a quarter million dollars of taxpayer money has already been wasted in this unwanted and destructive ten year long conflict. I strongly support a forensic audit of this proposed development as previously requested by community members. County Council continues to avoid a comprehensive property-tax study

My family and I live in Kuau, one of the most coveted areas of Maui. The property purchased by my late father, Antone F. Tavares, in 1903 has remained in our family's possession for 112 years. Each year we agonize in anticipation of the current property tax amount. This past year we saw an increase of 50 percent with the possibility of another steep increase this fiscal year.

I recently turned 94 and find it increasingly difficult to live under a property tax system that is as unfair, cruel, immoral and absolutely indefensible as Maui County's is. If I were younger you would see my righteous indignation made visible by public resistance to this abominable property tax system.

COMET (Committee for More Equitable Taxation) has proposed since 1988 that the Maui County Council undertake a thorough study of our present property tax system to no avail. This obstinate attitude was recently reaffirmed by the council chairman, who stated the council would not review its gutting of the "circuit breaker" tax credit or study the present system.

An earlier council recognized the need for a comprehensive study. For those who do not remember, COMET worked constructively with the council to enact the "homeowner's exemption" and "circuit breaker" in 1991. Those were implemented as short-term solutions. The "short-term solutions" have been in place for nearly 25 years. Broken promises.

The Maui News headline of April 12, 1991, stated: "Major property tax reform proposed." One of the proposals was "a study of the current property tax system would be completed with recommendations developed for revamping the system at the end of the three-year period for the proposed reform package. Possibilities for changes include doing away with the comparative sales (market value) method of assessing property." Broken trust.

Recently, the County Council authorized the study of a "councilmanager" form of government for a possible Maui County Charter amendment. As presented, this form could save taxpayers 10 percent through efficiency and take some of the destructive politics out of the current system. The council-manager form would not eliminate the position of mayor. The council-manager form of government is not new or untested. This study is a worthwhile exercise in democracy but raises a serious question.

Why does the current council so easily authorize the study and cost of changing our fundamental county government structure but continue to refuse to study the Maui County property tax system?

There is no good excuse for the County Council to continue to avoid a comprehensive property-tax study. It is long overdue and more relevant than ever.

It is an extremely sad situation that citizens of this once great nation are enduring. Our political leaders on all levels of government are so engrossed in their own political and personal welfare that the basic needs of society are ignored. Whales, porpoises, seals, turtles and even the lowly loli (sea cucumber) are given much attention but our basic spiritual and human needs are often ignored.

As far as I am concerned, this situation is comparable to the situation in Flint, Mich., where the personal health of thousands of citizens was placed in deadly jeopardy by an uncaring government. The current Maui property tax system is causing destructive stress and damaging the health and welfare of many of our citizens. Everyone, including our honored kupuna, Native Hawaiians and future generations, deserves better.

As I have asserted many times in the past, anyone who insists that our property tax system is a just, fair and moral system, is an unfortunate victim of invincible ignorance.

HANA — A man whose company has been erecting fences across traditional beach access points and a man who has been cutting the fences took visitors on a tour of the disputed sites yesterday.

The tour was a display of cooperation that some residents say offers hope for a harmonious future for Hana.

• A unique convergence of Hana natives and the transplants who have come to call Hana home may provide the answer to land use and beach access issues that have simmered in the community for years.

Members of these two groups have been meeting as the new Development Steering Committee of the Hana Community Association. Several members of that committee and representatives of Rosewood Hotels Inc. took County Council Planning and Land Use Committee members to look at beach access siles yesterday.

Present were Bob Zimmer, president of the corporation that now owns Hana Ranch and Hotel Hana Maui, hotel vice president Carl Lindquist, and several steering committee members. One of these, Larry Kaikala, has been a leader in the move to regain the traditional use of land some Hana residents claim is sull parily theirs.

Shark attack: Big Isle fishermen tell real-life tale that sounds like 'Jaws'

NAALEHU, Hawaii - Three Big Island fishermen, including a 12-year-old boy, escaped tore at the boat's stern, Gay continued, so Leslie injury Tuesday night when their boat sank after a shark attack about nine miles off South Point.

Ka'u commercial fishermen Walter Gay, 27, d Weston Leslie, 40, and Leslie's son, Newton, were fishing for ahi (yellowfin tuna), using hand lines from a 20-foot trailer boat borrowed from Joe Hauanio of Kalapana, Gay told The Maui News this morning. The boat was borrowed because Leslie's boat is under repair. The trio had chummed the water and hauled in six or seven ahi ranging in size up to 100 pounds when a large shark hit a fish on one of the lines and bit the tuna in half, Gay said. The shark remained near the boat "waiting for us to throw more food in the water," then started "biting on the back of the boat," where a 200horsepower Mercury outboard was mounted. "It was a big shark," Gay said. "I'd say 10 or 12 feet long, 700 or 800 pounds. We think it was a great white, because it was so aggressive. Both of us are very experienced fishermen, and we know the difference between sharks. It was a great white.' said.

The shark was "right on the surface" as it was able to prod it hard enough with a 44-caliber "bang stick" to fire a round into the shark. "We just hit it with the bang stick and it rolled off and sank." Gay said.

Gay and Leslie salvaged a fiberglassed p. wood fish box about six feet long, three fee wide and three feet deep, had Newton climb int the box, and started tugging it toward the light of South Point and Naalehu about nine mile distant. The swimmers tore up Gay's raineo: and tied strips of fabric over their hands and fee to "hide the whites" from sharks, Gay said.

Once the shark was gone, the trio resumed fishing only to discover after pulling in three more ahi that the boat was rapidly filling with water.

"My partner said, 'hey, there's plenty water coming in this boat,' "Gay said. "We started throwing the tunas back in the ocean, but by the time we had grabbed the second or third fish, we knew we were going down. Within a minute or two the boat had completely sunk. We didn't have time to grab the life jackets or make a Mayday (SOS) call.'

Gay said he thinks the shark tore out the boat's drain plug or otherwise pierced the hull, allowing enough sea water to enter so that the boat filled rapidly once three- to four-foot seas started pouring over the damaged stern. The boat capsized and sank almost immediately, Gay

Swimming mostly underwater to avoid splashing, the men pulled Newton and the fish box toward shore for about 12 hours before landing near Honuapo, south of Naalehu, abou 10 a.m. yesterday. Gay said that once the sur was up, they could see white-tipped sharks in the water beneath them, but drove them off by shouting underwater and banging their hands or ine surface.

A fishing boat passed with 200 yards of them shortly after first light, he said, but the swells prevented anyone from spotting them.

The borrowed boat and its equipment, valued at \$20,000, was not recovered.

Gay said he plans to go back out fishing again "in a couple of days."

THE MAI Pipebomb explodes at shopping

The Associated Press HONOLULU — A powerful pipebomb, similiar to one that damaged a Waikiki hotel last week, exploded under a car in a shopping center here yesterday, setting the car on fire and peppering eight other cars with shrapnel, authorities said.

Police officials suspect the two bombings and a series of telephoned bomb threats are related. The motive for the bombings, if known, has not been disclosed.

that occurred in an employees parking area of the Ala Moana Center, according to firefighters who extinguished the fire that heavily damaged a late-model car owned by a bank employee.

Minutes after the explosion, a man telephoned the manager of the Ala Moana Professional Building, located on one side of the shopping center, and said there was a bomb planted on the sixth floor.

Hundreds of office workers were evacuated while the 23-story There were no injuries in the blast building was searched by a police

bomh souad and dogs trained to sniff out explosives, police said. No bomb was found.

A man also telephoned television station KGMB within four or five minutes of the bomb blast and told News Assignment Editor Janelle Sancishi that he had set off the bomb, according to News Director Jim Manke.

The man suggested KGMB evacuate its building, located near the shopping center, but it was not, Manke said.

On Friday, a homemade pipebomb

exploded in a 22nd floor storage area at the Outrigger Prince Kuhio hotel in Waikiki, causing about \$1,000 damage but no injuries.

That blast was followed by a series of iclephone calls to the hotel, warning that other bombs would be going off in the hotel later.

Some 350 hotel guests and employees were evacuated and a search of the hotel nurned up no other devices, according to police. On Tuesday night, another series of telephoned threats to the hotel prompted another evaucation and



Hana apartment plan debated in Hawaii

HANA — Opposition was strong last night to a plan to build 36 apartment units on land in the Wakiu area owned by Parker and Mary Purdy. Residents requested, and the Purdys agreed, to consider downscaling the project to reduce the possible impact on the community.

Nearly 200 persons crowded Helene Hall for a meeting of the Planning and Land Use Committee of the County Council, whose main purpose for meeting in Hana was to consider the Purdy request.

The Purdy family wants to change the state's zoning from rural to urban and wants A-1 Apartment zoning from the county. There is no county zoning, because the county does not zone lands designated as rural by the state,

Speakers who opposed the project last night said they like and respect the Purdy family. However, the project is not in the spirit of the Hana Community Plan, would not provide housing local residents could afford and would add undesirable traffic too close to Hana School, they said.

Critics of the plan suggested the Purdys get together with the recently formed Development Steering Committee of the Hana Community Association and try to come up with a compromise plan.

Mary Purdy, replying to some of the criticism and concerns expressed, said since a Planning Commission meeting on the subject in January, no one had come to her to discuss their worries. She said the project already has been reduced from 42 units to 36, and pointed out the proposed zoning would allow 100 units.

Purdy said the project had been developed by legal procedures, that the community needs housing and that her current rental rates for houses on the family property prove that her future rates would be reasonable.

Asked by Council Member Wayne Nishiki if she would be willing to sit down with the succring committee to consider other possiblities, Purdy agreed to do so. The opposition to the Purdy request was in contrast to the previous Hana meeting on the subject in January, when almost all who spoke to the Planning Commission said they favored the project as a way

to create jobs and housing for Hana,

Last night, some speakers complained that the Planning Commission paid little heed to opposition in the form of a petition signed by nearby neighbors, who feared upzoning might eventually mean higher property values and consequently higher land taxes.

Speaker John Blumer-Buell said it was "an outrage" the way the Planning Commission ignored the petition and approved the Purdy request with no discussion.

Blumer-Buell and others also pointed to the history of the designation of the Purdy land for apartment use by the Hana Community Plan.

Mike Minn, a member of the community advisory council that devised the plan, said Mary Purdy and Alfreda Worst, who owns the Heavenly Hana Inn across from the Purdys, just wanted their operations to be made legal.

At the time, he said, the two were operating visitor rental units illegally. The advisory council's impression was that all they wanted was to be legal and to be allowed to upgrade their facilities, but not to expand.

Minn called for a review of the community plan, which was passed five years ago. Council Planning Committee chair Velma Santos said the final version of the plan called for review within 10 years, and asked the Hana people to wait until the council finishes approving the last two regional plans from the first round before beginning another.

Council Member Tom Morrow said he would support an early review. The Hana plan was the first one done, he said, and provided a learning process for all concerned, including professionals giving advice to the citizens about how to deal with such existing non-conforming uses as the Purdys' and Worsts'.

Santos, replying to criticism of the Planning Commission's handling of the request said she will initiate legislation to create a Hana advisory

symbol of their claim to land parcels also claimed by the company that owns the hotel and ranch.

The fence cutters base their actions on evidence they say they have gathered during years of research that shows they or their relatives still have interests in lands that were leased long ago to the predecessors of Rosewood.

Rosewood claims it has quieted title on these lands, and has the right

to erect fences to keep cattle in and trespassers out. Those who want to use the access points must obtain a key and sign a liability waiver.

Several of these disputes are in the courts. Richard Kekohuhu, a relative of the Kaikala family, bolsters his claim with an eight - page poster containing details of land conveyances and geneaology of his family dating back to 1859.

Recent negotiations have brought

these disputing sides together in an effort to resolve the access problem by allowing traditional use of the shoreline while protecting it from being overrun by the thousands of tourists who flock to Hana each year.

Residents who spoke to County Council members in Hana for a meeting last night expressed confidence in current efforts to find a win-win answer to the access problem.

The residents appeared to be worried that the council had come to inspect beach accesses in order to condemn them for public use. Land Use and Planning Committee chair Velma Santos hastened to explain that the committee was visiting only in response to requests from residents to look into the situation.

Council members agreed to "file" the subject and let the community continue to seek its own solution.

Council panel offers plan to help residents

WAILUKU - Substantial changes in the current property tax. system were approved yesterday by the Mani Courty Council's Piegence Committee, including eliminating taxes on home improvements made after 1987 and repeal of a tax deferral option enacted last year,

Upon final approval, the five-point package passed by the committee would take effect in the last half of the 1991-92 fiscal year,

The reforms would see homeowners who lived on their property in 1987 and qualified for the owner-occupant exemption at that time sent. the same property tax bill they paid for that tax year.

Those who bought homes after 1987 would not be eligible for the provision, but would take advantage of a lower tax rate being considered by the council.

The package would allow for mcreases in the tax hill to be considcred in fiscal years 1993 and 1994. but for now a 3 percent hike contained in last year's reform effort. would be climinated.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE TAX PROPOSAL:

Here are highlights of the Maul County Council's Finance Committee proposal for property tax reform: Homeowners who qualified for the owner-occupant exemption in 1987 would receive the same tax bill they paid for that tax year. Over the three-year life of the plan, the council would have the option of approving annual across the board percentage increases above the 1987 bills.

Improvements made to a property after 1987, such as ohana units, would not be taxed under the plan. That exemption was approved to simplify the process and allow the program to be up and running by December, when tax bills are sent out for the second half of the 1991-92 fiscal year. If property owners are charged too much on their first-half bill, which would be tigured using the current method, retunds could be necessary.

The tax deferral system approved last year that allowed homeowners to delay paying taxes until their property was sold would be repealed. The 447 homeowners who participated in the program in fiscal 1991 would still be responsible for paying the amount they owe upon sale of their property.

A "circuit breaker" system would be enacted to help homeowners over 60. Household income must be \$25,000 or less, based on the property owner and spouse's earnings only. The plan would see those qualified paying 5 percent of their income in taxes, with a maximum benefit of \$1,250. The amount due would be ligured based on the 1987 tax bit for those who Quality.

A study of the current property tax system would be completed, with recommendations developed for revamping the system at the end of the three-year pence for the proposed reform package. Possibilities for changes include doing away with the "comparable sales" method of assessing property.

Dear Council Members,

I would like to request your support for the request for \$475,000 funding (or the largest possible portion thereof) to fund the Infrastructure component of the Restoration of the Kaupo School Classroom and Teachers' Cottage for use as a community resource center and disaster shelter and mitigation facility.

This portion of the project will provide a conforming commercial septic system, an off-grid photovoltaic based energy generation, storage and distribution system; a water storage, filtration, pressurization and distribution system; with distribution piping, concrete pads and related site work sufficient to service the property.

Treated drinking water will be made available onsite at the Kaupo School property. This filtered and UV treated rainwater will be the only source of safe drinking water available to residents and visitors anywhere in Southeast Maui. It will also provide adequate fire-flow protection for the structures and make 30,000 gallons of water available to Maui County and DLNR for fire response to brush fires.

The 1923 Classroom Building and Teachers' Cottage structures are being restored to original condition with funding already provided by State of Hawaii CIP GIA, and Maui County OED, and private foundations and donations along with in-kind volunteer services. Permits and contracts for the building restoration are in final stages of processing, and carpentry work will begin by summer, 2019. All other portions of the project, totaling over \$1,100,000 have been acquired by KCAI and have been released. This request for \$475,000 is 27% of the total project, and is in addition to \$30,000 received from Maui County (1.7%) for design of the septic system and building plans through OED in 2016.

The 2 restored buildings, 2.25 acre property and infrastructure will be utilized by Kaupo Community Association as a Community Resource Center and Disaster Mitigation facility. Residents of Kaupo will be provided a place for community, family, educational, health, cultural and social gatherings and programs and a facility of shelter with water, power and toilet facilities when needed.

Crystal methamphetamine is a medical, legal and social crisis that has now entered its third generation in Hawai'i. The federal government estimates that more than 10,000 people died of meth-related drug overdoses last year, leaving children orphaned and communities destroyed. 'Ohana Makamae Behavioral Health Services & Family Resource Center is at the forefront in the battle to rescue our community from the Ice Epidemic by providing the Matrix Model of Recovery, an evidence-based program designed for stimulant addiction.

Success in addiction treatment can be defined in different ways, by negative urine drug tests, by continued participation in treatment. The National Institute on Drug Addiction (NIDA) Estimates the average success rate for addiction treatment to be 40-60%. The Matrix Model is superior to other treatment modalities in clinical trials, and outcomes are generally higher than 70%.

'Ohana Makamae Behavioral Health Services is *the only treatment facility* in Hawaii utilizing the Matrix Model of Recovery exclusively. A program acknowledged by the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) and the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), as a *successful method* in the fight against stimulant use disorders.

As part of 'Ohana Makamae's intensive outpatient program, an individualized treatment plan is designed to meet the specific needs of each client and their family. Clients attend group sessions three times each week with individual and conjoint sessions provided regularly. A continuing care program (Social Support Groups) meets weekly following the intensive phase of treatment. Also, the Matrix Model encourages clients to attend 12-step meetings as an added recovery source.

Currently, 'Ohana Makamae's clinicians are undergoing training from an educational supervisor certified by the Matrix Institute. Once completed, 'Ohana Makamae will provide services never before available to those we serve. We have an opportunity to save our community, and it cannot happen without funding. We have a chance to save a generation of Hawaiians lost in the darkness of addiction, and we need your financial support to make it happen. We're not talking about statistics... we are talking about human lives in need of help.

The Goal:

April 2019

Ke Ao Hali'i / Save Hāna Coast seeks to Protect Hāna's precious Coastal Pasture Lands from development with the use of the County of Maui's Open Space, Natural Resources, Cultural Resources & Scenic Views Preservation Fund.

The Characteristics of the Land:

Hāna, Maui, considered "the Heart of old Hawai'i"; a small village isolated by its geographical boundaries, rural lifestyle & difficult mountain terrain had become complacent. Our coastal lands have been utilized as sugar plantations or for cattle ranching since 1854. But in 2017, the land owners decided to actively sell for profit, 400 acres from the Hana Highway to the ocean. In March 2018, the most significant Maka'alae lands directly adjacent to Waioka Pond (Venus Pool) were under contract to sell. Realizing that the lands where the iwi kupuna were buried and Hawaiian culture celebrated would soon be developed; the community organized a spirited public meeting of 200+ residents in a show of solidarity. Tears were shed & several lineal decedents spoke eloquently, expressing opposition & concerns in both Hawaiian & English. In a stunning turn of event, the buyer backed out.

The nonprofit, "Ke Ao Hali'i" grew out of the community's desire to protect the lands under threat of development.

Key resources to be protected:

This proposal seeks funds to acquire control of 15 lots (116 acres) within Maka'alae and Mokae Ahupua'a in Hāna, Maui. The land is oceanfront pasture lands defined by the Hāna Highway, Waiohuno Stream, Waiokapia gulch and Haneoo Road. It includes scenic geological coastal area; sites used for Hawaiian cultural practices; access to food sources; burial grounds & other archeological sites; and agricultural cattle grazing, much of which is mentioned as important in the **Hāna Community Plan, section III: Policy**, and **Maui Countywide Island Plan, Section IV, Goals & Policies.** The sale of these parcels to private interests for development potentially places all of these resources at risk.

The Partnership:

Ke Ao Hali'i has been working with Hawaii State Legacy Land Conservation Program and recently was designated a grant of \$2.25M toward the purchase of Mokae parcel TMK(2)1-4-010-004. But this grant requires matching funds to complete the deal. Thus we are seeking to use Maui County OSF for this purpose, which means the county will be acquiring considerable land far below market values and leveraging public funds for the benefit of all.


Community Support:



Aloha and Welcome to the Maui County Council Members who have traveled to Hana. Hopefully you have recovered from the bone-jarring journey if you came via KeoKea.

Here are two questions high in priority for our Councilmen and Councilwomen:

1. The "back road" from Hasegawa General Store to Nu'u is in various stages of disrepair, with some of the stretches, particularly between Kipahulu and Kaupo, very dangerous to all drivers, but especially those of us in East Maui who prefer to use that road to travel to and from Kahului early in the morning to avoid the increasingly heavy traffic, now estimated at approximately 350,000 vehicles annually and nearly 1 million people transiting the Hana highway.

QUESTION:

What are the short-term repair and LONG TERM REPAIR plans for this highway, including the timeline for immediate fixes on the washed-out guard rail at Kalepa and the frequently requested installation of a stoplight system between Kalepa and the top of the hill up the side of the cliffs bordered by the ocean? This is one of the most dangerous stretches of road in Hawaii. It is constantly used by motorists inexperienced in driving such a narrow, dangerous stretch of broken, rutted pavement frequently subject to landslides and washouts. It is only a matter of time before there is another fatal accident on this part of the road. Where is this road ranked on your repair list?

2. When this council was sworn in there were solid promises, especially by freshmen members and the current chairwoman, that the council would pursue a more aggressive policy of identification, enforcement, fines and prosecution of folks illegally operating transit vacation accommodations on Maui. This promise was accompanied by voter approval of a new law carrying an initial fine of \$20,000 and a daily \$10,000 a day fine for violators who were identified and then continued operating these illegal businesses that take away desperately needed housing buy local folks.

QUESTION:

On Dec. 20, AirBnB listed 81 TVAs for Hana; on Jan. 2, there were only the 21 currently permitted in Hana area. What has changed in the past three months in the county's identification and enforcement involving illegal TVAs? Please give specific statistical information on this issue, most particularly for East Maui.
