We are very limited to beach access due to all the resorts that have limited the access of most of the beautiful beaches the locals are not allowed on Maui. Lahaina residents are forced to move to Kahului, Wailuku, upcountry because it has become to expensive to live in Lahaina. There are very limited beaches for all of the community to access and enjoy due to ships, barges, or no beach facilities available.
