Chair and Members:

Your Governance, Ethics, and Transparency Committee, having met on August 20, 2019, makes reference to County Communication 19-25, from Council Chair Kelly T. King, relating to matters pertaining to Hawaii State Association of Counties ("HSAC").

Your Committee notes each year HSAC may compile a package of proposals and priorities to be presented to the State Legislature, pursuant to Section 13C of the HSAC Bylaws. Only those proposals and priorities approved by all four councils are included in the annual HSAC Legislative Package.

Your Committee received three proposals for inclusion in the 2020 HSAC Legislative Package, including State bills to: 1) increase State funding to support agriculture to promote economic development, food security, environmental protection, and quality of life; 2) authorize remote schools to receive supplemental categorical funding, in addition to the allocation determined under the weighted student formula, based on their remote status, and to appropriate funds; and 3) require the driver of the lead vehicle, on two-lane roadways where passing is unsafe and five or more vehicles are backed up behind the lead vehicle, to use turnouts and permit vehicles following the lead vehicle, to pass safely.

#### Increased Funding for Agriculture

By correspondence dated August 5, 2019, Councilmember Shane Sinenci transmitted a proposed resolution entitled "APPROVING FOR INCLUSION IN THE 2020 HAWAII STATE ASSOCIATION OF COUNTIES LEGISLATIVE PACKAGE A STATE BILL TO INCREASE

FUNDING FOR AGRICULTURE." The purpose of the proposed resolution is to approve for inclusion in the 2020 HSAC Legislative Package a proposed State bill, attached to the proposed resolution as Exhibit "A," entitled "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO AGRICULTURE." The purpose of the proposed State bill is to increase State funding to support agriculture to promote economic development, food security, environmental protection, and quality of life.

Your Committee discussed the need to allocate increased funding to support the agriculture industry. Additional funding could be used to promote small-scale family farming, establish additional important agriculture lands, update the State's agricultural database, and increase key inspector positions at State airports to identify invasive species.

Your Committee further discussed the need to diversify the State's economy beyond the tourism industry.

Your Committee noted 90 percent of the State's food sources are imported into Hawaii, but only 4 percent of the State's budget is allocated towards agriculture.

Your Committee amended the proposed State bill to incorporate revisions to the bill's title and purpose.

Your Committee voted 9-0 to recommend adoption of the revised proposed resolution. Committee Chair Molina, Vice-Chair Rawlins-Fernandez, and members Hokama, Kama, King, Lee, Paltin, Sinenci, and Sugimura voted "aye."

Your Committee is in receipt of a revised proposed resolution, and attached Exhibit "A," incorporating your Committee's recommended revisions.

### Authorization for Supplemental Categorical Funding for Remote Schools

By correspondence dated August 5, 2019, Councilmember Shane Sinenci transmitted a proposed resolution entitled "APPROVING FOR INCLUSION IN THE 2020 HAWAII STATE ASSOCIATION OF COUNTIES LEGISLATIVE PACKAGE A STATE BILL TO AUTHORIZE SUPPLEMENTAL CATEGORICAL FUNDING FOR REMOTE SCHOOLS AND APPROPRIATE FUNDS." The purpose of the proposed resolution is to approve for inclusion in the 2020 HSAC Legislative Package a proposed State bill, attached to the proposed resolution as Exhibit "A," entitled "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO EDUCATION." The purpose of the proposed State bill is to authorize remote schools to receive supplemental categorical funding, in addition to the allocation determined under the weighted student formula, based on their remote status, and to appropriate funds for this purpose.

Your Committee discussed the weighted student formula for determining school funding has placed small, remote schools at a disadvantage. This has resulted in the loss of qualified instructors and the offering of minimum course requirements necessary for graduation.

Your Committee amended the proposed State bill to incorporate revisions to the bill's title and to clarify that the bill was for schools comprising grades kindergarten to 12.

Your Committee voted 9-0 to recommend adoption of the revised proposed resolution. Committee Chair Molina, Vice-Chair Rawlins-Fernandez, and members Hokama, Kama, King, Lee, Paltin, Sinenci, and Sugimura voted "aye."

Your Committee is in receipt of a revised proposed resolution, and attached Exhibit "A," incorporating your Committee's recommended revisions.

### Promotion of Traffic Safety on Two-lane Roadways

The purpose of the proposed resolution is to approve for inclusion in the 2020 HSAC Legislative Package a proposed State bill, attached to the proposed resolution as Exhibit "A," entitled "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO TRAFFIC SAFETY." The purpose of the proposed State bill is to require the driver of the lead vehicle, on two-lane roadways where passing is unsafe and five or more vehicles are backed up behind the lead vehicle, to use turnouts and permit vehicles following the lead vehicle, to pass safely.

Your Committee briefly discussed the matter, but agreed further discussion was necessary.

Your Committee voted 9-0 to recommend referral of the matter relating to the promotion of traffic safety on two-lane roadways to your Multimodal Transportation Committee. Committee Chair Molina, Vice-Chair Rawlins-Fernandez, and members Hokama, Kama, King, Lee, Paltin, Sinenci, and Sugimura voted "aye."

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. RELATING TO FUNDING FOR AGRICULTURE.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that increased funding is 6 needed to support agriculture. Nearly ninety percent of food is 7 imported into the State, but only four percent of the State's 8 budget is allocated for agriculture. With the closure of pineapple 9 and sugar industries statewide, there is a dire need to utilize 10 fallow lands and diversify the State's economy beyond tourism. 11 Increased funding for agriculture can promote more small-scale 12 family farming, identify additional important agricultural lands, 13 update the State's agricultural database, and increase 14 inspector positions at airports to prevent and identify invasive 15 species that affect agricultural crops. 16 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general revenues 17 of the State of Hawaii the sum of or so much thereof as 18

may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-2020 and the same sum or so

much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 to 1 provide funding to support agriculture. 2 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department of 3 4 agriculture for the purposes of this Act. SECTION 3. Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the funds 5 appropriated by this Act may be transferred, with the approval of 6 the governor, to the General Appropriations Act of 2019, for 7 program execution and expenditure. 8 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2020. 9

- 1. That the proposed State bill, attached as Exhibit "A," to authorize supplemental categorical funding for remote schools and appropriate funds, is approved for inclusion in the 2020 Hawaii State Association of Counties Legislative Package; and
- 2. That certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the Hawaii State Association of Counties Executive Committee.

# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION IN REMOTE SCHOOLS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Reinventing
2	Education Act of 2004 (Act 51, Session Laws of Hawaii 2004)
3	established a weighted student formula to allocate moneys to
4	schools according to the different costs of educating students
5	with different needs. Despite the intended equitable
6	distribution of funds, the legislature finds that the weighted
7	student formula has placed small, remote schools at a
8	disadvantage. In the case of Hana high and elementary school,
9	the budgetary shortfall has resulted in the loss of several
10	well-qualified teachers and has threatened the school's ability
11	to offer minimum course requirements for students to earn high
12	school diplomas. If Hana high school is unable to offer its
13	students the requisite courses for graduation, those students
14	will have to endure a nearly forty-mile, two-hour drive away, to
15	the next closest public high school, King Kekaulike high school.
16	The legislature finds that despite the current economic
17	situation remote achoela abould be funded to retain the minimal

- school, as defined in section 302A-101, except charter schools

- 14 (1) Located at least a one-hour drive away from the next
- 15 nearest public high school; or
- 16 (2) Located on the island of Lanai, Molokai, or Niihau;
- 17 provided that if a high school is combined with an elementary,
- 18 middle, intermediate, or other lower level of schooling, that
- 19 entire school shall be deemed a high school for the purpose of
- 20 this section.

(b) Subject to legislative appropriations, a remote school 1 may receive supplemental categorical funding to support 2 additional instructional and support staff. 3 (c) Any supplemental categorical funding provided to a 4 remote school pursuant to this section shall be in addition to 5 the allocation determined under the weighted student formula 6 that is made to the remote school." 7 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general 8 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 9 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 and the 10 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 11 2021-2022 for remote schools categorical funding pursuant to 12 13 this Act. The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 14 of education for the purpose of this Act. 15 SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored. 16 SECTION 5.
