Paid Parking and Time Limits

- Single-space and pay stations
- Credit card only
- No re-parking ordinance
- Maui resident incentives

Lahaina Town


- 10:00am-10:00pm
- \$4 per hour rate on-street, 2 or 3-hour time limit
- \$2 per hour off-street
- School shared parking
- Employee permits (with low-income option)
- Estimated cumulative gross income of \$3.4 million in 3 years



Paid Parking and Time Limits continued

Wailuku Town


- \$0.50 per hour on-street initially, then
 \$0.75
- 9:00am 5:00pm
- \$82,000 per year from on-street parking
- Immediately implement employee permit parking in Municipal Lot and portion of Vineyard Street Lot
 - \$35 per month
 - Interim location during construction
- \$0.25 per hour in Civic Hub
 - \$40 per month
 - \$10 low-income rate



Parking Benefit Districts

- Self-sustaining program
- Revenue reinvested into the towns
- Special parking funds, Parking Advisory Committees
- Consider distinguishing between County-wide and town-specific revenue allocations







State vs. Local Citation Revenue Management

- State retains all County parking citation revenue
- County would retain all paid parking revenue
 - Compliance based parking enforcement method

• Average of 14 citations issued per day (Jan '15 – June '17)

 Average of 5 citations issued per day (Jan '15 – June '17)

Enforcement Staffing

Ideally, police officers should be focused on public safety matters, not parking enforcement.

Lahaina Town

- 3 Parking Ambassadors
- 10am-10pm, 7 days/week

Wailuku Town

- 2 Parking Ambassadors
- 9am-5pm on weekdays only



Enforcement Technology

- Thin Blue Line e-ticket program
- Parking vendor solution will offer more efficiencies and automations
 - Automated permit management
 - Collection rates above 90%
 - Handheld citation issuance devices
 - Real-time integrations







Parking Citation Typical Collections¹²Timeline

Maintenance and Revenue Collections





 Minimize or eliminate coin and cash to reduce collection frequency, minimize maintenance, and reduce theft

Loading Zones

- Restrict commercial loading to before
 a specific time
- Opportunity to charge for hourly parking during non-loading zone hours
 - Yellow meter heads
- Designated rideshare drop-off/pick-up zones



Parking Minimums and Phantom Parking

- Maui County Code Chapter 19.36A establishes parking ratios (parking minimums)
- County allows property owners to satisfy the requirements through off-site parking agreements: Off-Site Permit (OSP)
 - Revenue goes to private lot owners

OD OD

Does not create revenue stream for County to manage potential impact

REVIEW

OPMENT

- Need to improve regulation and assess impact
- Assess parking ratio requirements
- Establish in lieu of fees

FRED Shuttle Program

- The Free Ride
- Operating costs and staffing funded by advertisements
- Electric shuttles
 - 5 passengers
- Mobile application
- Consider fixed route vs demand-based routes

- Consistent signage and parking brand
- Educate and inform
- Online map/Application
- Vehicle counting systems
 - Parking guidance

Kamehameha Day Parade

Wailuku Civic Hub Garage

- Install a Parking Access Revenue Control System (PARCS)
- Allocate approximately 65% of spaces to permit parking
 - Unassigned and on upper floors
- Security
- Wayfinding



Prison Street Lot Improvements

- Improve the condition of the lot
 - Paved
 - Spaces marked
 - ADA accessible stalls
 - Lighting
- Remove 2 of 6 bus parking stalls
 - Dual-purpose for parking queuing during elementary school pick-up
- Eventually consider building a parking deck



Kamehameha III Elementary School

- Shared parking agreement for designated school parking spaces on-street
 - County maintains and enforces
 - Portion of revenue allocated towards safety programs
- Special events plan
 - Prison Street Lot

- Install a second gate
 - Encourages parents to pull further forward
 - Improve traffic flow



Initial Steps

- Ordinance updates
 - "Future proofing" to prepare for ongoing policy and technology adjustments
- Budget and staffing plans
- Enterprise fund & defining parking revenue distribution
- Vendor demonstrations
- Ongoing stakeholder engagement
