A BILL FOR AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR OF THE COUNTY OF MAUI TO ENTER INTO AN INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT WITH THE CITY AND COUNTY OF HONOLULU, HONOLULU BOARD OF WATER SUPPLY, THE COUNTY OF HAWAII, DEPARTMENT OF WATER SUPPLY, AND THE COUNTY OF KAUAI, DEPARTMENT OF WATER SUPPLY FOR MUTUAL AID AND ASSISTANCE DURING EMERGENCIES (HAWAII WATER AGENCY RESPONSE NETWORK (HIWARN) INTRASTATE PROGRAM FOR MUTUAL AID AND ASSISTANCE)

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE COUNTY OF MAUI:

SECTION 1. <u>Purpose</u>. The County of Maui, Department of Water Supply ("DWS") desires to participate in the Hawaii Water Agency Response Network (HIWARN) Intrastate Program for Mutual Aid and Assistance (the "Program") and to enter into a Hawaii Water Agency Response Network (HIWARN) Mutual Aid and Assistance Agreement (the "Agreement") with the City and County of Honolulu, Honolulu Board of Water Supply, the County of Hawaii, Department of Water Supply, and the County of Kauai, Department of Water Supply (collectively, including DWS, the "Hawaii Water Utility Members").

The Hawaii Water Utility Members recognize that emergencies may require aid or assistance in the form of personnel, equipment, and supplies from outside the area of impact. Through the Program, the Hawaii Water Utility Members would coordinate response activities and share resources during emergencies. The Agreement is attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit "1" and has the potential to place a financial obligation on the County.

Section 2.20.020, Maui County Code, provides that, unless authorized by ordinance, the Mayor shall not enter into any intergovernmental agreement or any amendment thereto which places a financial obligation upon the County or any department or agency thereof.

SECTION 2. <u>Authorization</u>. The Council of the County of Maui hereby authorizes the Mayor or his authorized representative to execute the Agreement, all other necessary documents relating to the Agreement, and any amendments thereto.

SECTION 3. <u>Effective date</u>. This ordinance shall take effect upon its approval.

 occur and provided to the HIWARN Steering Committee.
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In the event of an Emergency, a Member's Authorized Official may request mutual aid and assistance from a participating Member. Requests for assistance can be made orally or in writing. When made orally, the request for personnel, equipment, and supplies shall be prepared in writing as soon as practicable. Requests for assistance shall be directed to the Authorized Official of the participating Member or Associate Member. Specific protocols for requesting aid shall be provided in the required procedures (Article IV).

- 12 B. Response to a Request for Assistance – Members of this Agreement are not obligated to respond to a request. After a Member receives a request for assistance, the Authorized 13 Official evaluates whether or not to respond, whether resources are available to respond, or 14 if other circumstances would hinder response. Following the evaluation, the Authorized 15 Official shall inform, as soon as possible, the Requesting Member whether it will respond. If 16 the Member is willing and able to provide assistance, the Member shall inform the 17 Requesting Member about the type of available resources and the approximate arrival time 18 of such assistance. 19
- C. Discretion of Responding Member's Authorized Official Execution of this Agreement does
 not create any duty to respond to a request for assistance. When a Member receives a
 request for assistance, the Authorized Official shall have sole and absolute discretion as to
 whether or not to respond, or the availability of resources to be used in such response. An
 Authorized Official's decisions on the availability of resources shall be final.

ARTICLE VI. RESPONDING MEMBER PERSONNEL

- A. National Incident Management System When providing assistance under this Agreement,
 the Requesting Member and Responding Member shall be organized and shall function under
 the National Incident Management System (NIMS).
- 34 B. Control – During the Period of Assistance the Responding Member's personnel remain 35 under the supervision of the Responding Member, the Responding Member's employees come under the direction and control of the Requesting Member, consistent with the NIMS 36 Incident Command System to address the needs identified by the Requesting Member. The 37 Requesting Member's Authorized Official shall coordinate response activities with the 38 39 designated supervisor(s) of the Responding Member(s). The Authorized Official of the 40 Responding Member shall designate supervisor(s) who must keep accurate records of work performed by personnel during the specified Period of Assistance. 41

- 43 C. Food and Shelter - Whenever practical, Responding Member personnel must be selfsufficient for up to 72 hours. When possible, the Requesting Member shall supply 44 reasonable food and shelter for Responding Member personnel. If the Requesting Member 45 46 is unable to provide food and shelter for Responding personnel, the Responding Member's designated supervisor is authorized to secure the resources necessary to meet the needs of 47 its personnel. Except as provided below, the cost for such resources must not exceed the 48 49 State per diem rates for that area. To the extent food and shelter costs exceed the State per diem rates for the area; the Responding Member must demonstrate that the additional 50 51 costs were reasonable and necessary under the circumstances. Unless otherwise agreed

- to in writing, the Requesting Member remains responsible for reimbursing the Responding
 Member for all reasonable and necessary costs associated with providing food and shelter,
 if such resources are not provided.
- D. Communication The Requesting Member shall provide Responding Member personnel with
 radio equipment as available, or radio frequency information to program existing radio, in order
 to facilitate communications with local responders and utility personnel.
- 9 E. Status Unless otherwise provided by law, the Responding Member's officers and
 10 employees retain the same privileges, immunities, rights, duties and benefits as provided in
 11 their respective jurisdictions.
- F. Licenses and Permits To the extent permitted by law, Responding Member personnel that
 hold licenses, certificates, or permits evidencing professional, mechanical, or other skills
 shall be allowed to carry out activities and tasks relevant and related to their respective
 credentials during the specified Period of Assistance.
- G. Right to Withdraw The Responding Member's Authorized Official retains the right to
 withdraw some or all of the Responding Member's resources at any time for any reason in
 the Responding Member's Authorized Official's sole and absolute discretion. Notice of
 intention to withdraw must be communicated to the Requesting Member's Authorized Official
 as soon as soon as is practicable under the circumstances.

ARTICLE VII. COST-REIMBURSEMENT

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The Requesting Member shall reimburse the Responding Member for each of the following categories of costs incurred during the specified Period of Assistance as agreed in whole or in part by both parties; provided, that any Responding Member may assume in whole or in part such loss, damage, expense, or other cost, or may loan such equipment or donate such services to the Requesting Member without charge or cost. This Article shall survive termination or withdrawal.

34 A. Personnel – The Responding Member shall be reimbursed by the Requesting Member for 35 personnel costs incurred for work performed during the specified Period of Assistance. Responding Member personnel costs shall be calculated according to the terms provided in 36 37 their employment contracts or other conditions of employment. The Responding Member's 38 designated supervisor(s) must keep accurate records of work performed by personnel 39 during the specified Period of Assistance. Requesting Member reimbursement to the Responding Member should consider all personnel costs, including salaries or hourly 40 41 wages, costs for fringe benefits, and indirect costs. The Requesting Member and the 42 Responding Member shall remain responsible for the worker's compensation coverage of their respective personnel. 43

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B. Equipment - The Requesting Member shall reimburse the Responding Member for the use 1 of equipment during the specified Period of Assistance, including, but not limited to, 2 reasonable rental rates, all fuel, lubrication, maintenance, transportation, and 3 loading/unloading of loaned equipment. All equipment shall be returned to the Responding 4 Member in good working order as soon as is practicable and reasonable under the 5 circumstances. At a minimum, rates for equipment use must be based on the Federal 6 7 Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Schedule of Equipment Rates. If a Responding Member uses rates different from those in the FEMA Schedule of Equipment Rates, the 8 Responding Member must provide such rates orally or in writing to the Requesting Member 9 prior to supplying the equipment. Mutual agreement on which rates are used must be 10 reached in writing prior to dispatch of the equipment. Reimbursement for equipment not 11 referenced on the FEMA Schedule of Equipment Rates must be developed based on actual 12 recovery of costs. If Responding Member must lease or rent a piece of equipment while its 13 equipment is being repaired, Requesting Member shall reimburse Responding Member for 14 such lease or rental costs. 15

- C. Materials and Supplies The Requesting Member must reimburse the Responding Member
 in kind or at actual replacement cost, plus handling charges, for use of expendable or non returnable materials and supplies. The Responding Member must not charge direct fees or
 rental charges to the Requesting Member for other supplies and reusable items that are
 returned to the Responding Member in a clean, damage-free condition. Reusable supplies
 that are returned to the Responding Member with damage must be treated as expendable
 supplies and the Requesting Member will be responsible for the cost of reimbursement.
- 25 D. Payment Period – The Responding Member must provide an itemized bill to the Requesting Member for all expenses incurred by the Responding Member while providing assistance 26 under this Agreement. The Responding Member must send the itemized bill not later than 27 ninety (90) calendar days following the end of the Period of Assistance. The Responding 28 Member may request reasonable additional periods of time within which to submit the 29 30 itemized bill, and Requesting Member shall not unreasonably withhold consent to such request. The Requesting Member must pay the bill in full on or before the forty-fifth (45th) 31 calendar day following the billing date. The Requesting Member may request additional 32 33 periods of time within which to pay the itemized bill, and Responding Member shall not unreasonably withhold consent to such request, provided, however, that all payment shall 34 35 occur not later than twelve (12) months after the date a final itemized bill is submitted to the 36 Requesting Member.
