MEMORANDUM

TO: State and Local Legislators, Executives, & Public Finance Departments

RE: April 'Game Plan' for Community QE / Fed Municipal Liquidity Facility

BACKGROUND

On April 9, the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System ('Fed') announced plans to open a new Municipal Liquidity Facility ('MLF,' 'Facility') to assist U.S. States and Localities suffering acute liquidity shortages while working to address the current COVID-19 pandemic.¹ A number of compelling considerations have prompted the move.

Prominent among the mentioned considerations are three mutually reinforcing developments that have intensified in recent weeks. *First*, States and Cities are facing spikes in required expenditure as they take on the role of front-line responders to the pandemic and its consequences. *Second* and simultaneously, States' and Cities' principal sources of revenue – in particular, sales taxes, income taxes, and property taxes – have dramatically contracted as businesses suspend operations and taxpayers 'shelter in place.' Finally *third*, the \$4 trillion municipal bond market, the health of which is critical not only for States and their Subdivisions, but also for other securities markets, has experienced unprecedented volatility since February.

Against the backdrop of these developments, public health officials, State and Local officials, and bond market professionals have called since March for Fed intervention in the markets for State and Municipal securities ('munis') to stabilize prices, restore confidence to muni-investors, and ease the liquidity strains already hampering State and City pandemic response efforts. With passage of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security ('CARES') Act by Congress last month, it became clear that both our federal legislature and our Fed and Treasury would be *heeding* these calls.

What remained unclear till the 9th of this month was what precise form the relief to States and their Subdivisions would take. That *remains* at least *somewhat* unclear, inasmuch as (a) U.S. Governors this morning requested that Congress appropriate more funding for States, and (b) the new Fed Facility has only just been announced and is accordingly only beginning its existence even as a 'work in progress.' But we know much more now than we did before the 9th, and it is all very good news for everyone concerned about the three developments enumerated above.

This Memorandum accordingly first lays out what details we now have, then offers informed predictions as to what more is likely to come, and then recommends a 'Game Plan' for States and Cities to follow in making optimal – and *immediate* – use of the new Fed Facility as it currently stands. In effect, we have entered a world of *Community QE*, which it is critical for States and Cities to master and put to use quickly.

THE MUNICIPAL LIQUIDITY FACILITY

The new Municipal Liquidity Facility will operate under the auspices of Section 13(3) of the Federal Reserve Act ('FRA'), which grants the Federal Reserve emergency lending authority in exigent circumstances. The Fed typically exercises this authority through purchase and hence 'monetization' of short-term debt instruments – a practice known in finance parlance as 'discounting.'

In effect, the Fed temporarily swaps its own dollar liabilities, which are legal tender, for liabilities of its counterparties, which are not legal tender. The counterparty is thereby rendered 'liquid' – possessed of sufficient cash to spend on what ever it must spend to work past whatever difficulties it might be facing – until its debt instruments reach maturity. At that point the instruments are either redeemed in full or 'rolled-over' (when such option is available).

Perhaps needless to say, the Fed made abundant use of the Section 13(3) authority to afford liquidity assistance to many institutions and markets during the financial troubles of 2008-14, and thus has considerable experience with this funding mechanism. It is thus not the use of 13(3) that will be new now, but the use of the facility to aid States and their political Subdivisions in particular. That is unprecedented, and its significance is accordingly apt to be under-appreciated at first.

The new Municipal Liquidity Facility (again, MLF) that the Fed will now open under Section 13(3) will, like its predecessor facilities during the last financial crisis, operate through a newly formed special purpose vehicle (SPV) – in essence, a legal trust able to purchase, hold, and sell financial assets. In this case the assets in question will be State and Municipal paper, presently called 'Eligible Notes' in the MLF Term Sheet, whose salient characteristics I will lay out in a moment.²

The MLF SPV will be initially capitalized with \$35 billion from the U.S. Treasury, Congressionally appropriated for the purpose by the aforementioned CARES Act. On this basis,

the Fed will itself lend \$500 billion, rendering Treasury the equity investor and hence first risk-bearer in the SPV while the Fed serves as leverage-provider.

While the structure just described has, as noted before, been a familiar one since the last financial crisis, the 'substance' of its particular operations is new and noteworthy – indeed unprecedented and 'game-changing' – in ways that are critically important for States and their Subdivisions now faced with pandemic-caused hardship. At least three features bear special mention in this connection.

First, the MLF SPV will purchase securities directly from States or their Subdivisions — they will not have to be sold first on the 'open market' to private sector financial institutions as is the case with Fed purchases under the FRA's Section 14 authority.

Second, the months-to-maturity on the paper in question will, for now at least, be 24 rather than 12 months as originally anticipated.

And *third*, most importantly of all, the Fed will retain discretion (a) to *extend* the mentioned months-to-maturity requirement, (b) to extend the *timeframe* within which it is willing to buy – currently set to expire September 30th – and (c) to *loosen* the qualitative *criteria* that Eligible Notes must meet.

In addition to these three enumerated features, several others are worth bearing in mind at least as background conditions, even though they are subject to change going forward ...

First, where apportionment of funds is concerned, the Fed appears to intend, at least for the time being, to calculate on a per capita basis. States or Cities with large populations would in that sense be eligible for more funding than States or Cities with smaller populations – but only in proportion to those populations themselves. This means that in effect every citizen and legal resident of the U.S. will be eligible for the same benefit as everyone else. Whether departures from pro rata distribution of this kind might be forthcoming if some States or Cities recover quickly from the pandemic while others recover more slowly remains to be determined.

Second, at present Eligible Notes are required, not only to mature within 24 months of issuance, but also, per the Term Sheet, to be 'tax anticipation notes (TANs), tax and revenue anticipation notes (TRANs), bond anticipation notes (BANs), [or] other similar short-term notes issued by Eligible Issuers,' and can only secure lending up to 20% of each relevant issuer's 'general revenue from own sources and utility revenue' for the fiscal year 2017. Crucially, however, 'States may request that the SPV purchase Eligible Notes in excess of the applicable limit in order to assist political subdivisions and instrumentalities that are not eligible for the Facility' (emphasis added).

Third, proceeds of Note sales to the MLF SPV are to be used, again per the Term Sheet, 'to help manage the cash flow impact of income tax deferrals resulting from an extension of an income tax filing deadline; potential reductions of tax and other revenues or increases in expenses related to or resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic; and requirements for the payment of principal and interest on obligations of the relevant State, City, or County.' The Fed is in these words encouraging public perception of the MLF as a tide-over liquidity facility meant to assist counterparties in, as the Term Sheet puts it, 'managing [their] cash flows' – even

as other sections of the Term Sheet leave open the prospect of longer-term 'rollover' of Note debt should the present pandemic and its *sequelae* continue to pinch.

Finally *fourth*, Eligible Issuers will be all U.S. States and the District of Columbia, U.S. Counties with populations exceeding two million, and U.S. Cities with populations exceeding one million. The Term Sheet also stipulates in this connection that only one issuer per State, County, or City is eligible. While this requirement might be read to mean that for each State, only it itself or one of its Subdivisions may access the MLF, the fact that the Term Sheet also permits 'States [to] request that the SPV purchase Eligible Notes in excess of the applicable limit in order to assist political subdivisions and instrumentalities that are not eligible for the Facility' suggests that this restricted reading would not be correct. It suggests that instead as many eligible Counties and Cities as there are in a State may access the MLF in *addition* to, and hence in *parallel* with, the State itself.³

Two further points bear noting before we summarize the upshot of the foregoing.

First, Chairman Powell and the Fed Board of Governors have effectively encouraged, in their public pronouncements of the past several weeks generally and the last several days particularly, a 'flexible' interpretation of all restrictive language found in the MLF's Term Sheet. The Chairman and the Board have also stated that they will continue to monetor the secondary muni markets for signs of resumed volatility, with an eye to possibly intervening further to stabilize them. Combined with the many openings for extension and exception specified in that Sheet itself as described above, these amount to assurances that the MLF is not only a 'work in progress,' as noted above, but also a work whose scope will *expand* should the *need* for it expand. We are, in other words, very much in 'whatever it takes' territory right now, and the Fed is prepared to improvise further as necessary.⁴

Second, bond market and public finance experts in recent weeks have been calling upon the Fed to purchase State and Municipal debt with maturities not only in excess of traditional 6-month and 12-month durations, but also in excess of the new 24-month duration. The Fed for its part has said nothing to discourage such calls. Most commentators, not to mention 'smart money' on the markets, seem now to anticipate upwards of three- to five-year State and Municipal debt to find its way onto the MLF balance sheet. While this cannot be predicted with certainty, of course, States and Cities faced with serious crises will do well to judge maturity lengthening on the part of MLF-eligible paper more likely than not – or perhaps better put, to be no *less* likely than any eventual *need* to issue it.

Hence, for example, in California both the State and the City of Los Angeles would be immediately eligible to borrow under the Facility, while the State would be eligible to petition for additional borrowing on behalf of other cities such as San Diego or San Francisco. New York State and New York City will be similarly enabled. The story will be similar for Texas, save in its case *two* cities – Dallas and Houston – rather than one will be eligible alongside the State to borrow immediately. The author is currently seeking confirmation of this reading.

^{&#}x27;Whatever it takes' has become a catchphrase in central banking parlance since European Central Bank ('ECB') President Mario Draghi's assurance in 2012 that the ECB would do what ever is necessary to stabilize the Eurozone. Use of the phrase in the present context signals a readiness on the part of a monetary authority to interpret terms flexibly or even to rewrite them should the alternative be market collapse.

The Fed is, in short, keen not to repeat the mistakes of the 1930s, but instead to repeat the successes of 2008-14. That is to say it will err, if it errs, not on the side of caution but on the side of its opposite – bold, decisive, and crisis-ending *action*.

Putting all of the above together, reading it against the backdrop of the aforementioned 'whatever it takes'-style public comments made this week by Fed Chairman Powell, and synthesizing it all into a one-paragraph description of the new MLF, it appears then that we have the following:

The Fed will immediately begin directly monetizing 2-year State and Municipal debt, in order to ensure that all States and their Subdivisions are sufficiently financed to continue their current roles as front-line responders to the nation's ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. While in the immediate term it will supply funding up to 20% of what States and their Subdivisions normally take in through traditional revenue sources, it stands ready to lever-up that amount, as well as to lengthen the maturities of eligible paper, should the pandemic and its collateral damage continue to work hardship for longer than now is anticipated. It also stands ready to 'roll over' even 2-year State and Municipal debt, once it has purchased it, should crisis conditions continue past present expectations.

This is effectively *Quantitative Easing for Communities*, or *Community QE*. Our States and their Subdivisions will do well to begin using it at once.

AN APRIL 'GAME PLAN' FOR STATES & THEIR SUBDIVISIONS

In light of the above, it seems to this observer that States and their Subdivisions should begin making use of the new MLF immediately. Because those federal instrumentalities that would normally have taken the lead role in addressing the Coronavirus pandemic have not done so, it has devolved upon our States and Cities to play the role of these federal agencies. What the Fed has effectively just announced is that these *de facto* new federal *instrumentalities* will now receive *de jure* federal *financing*. *Acting* as federal entities, they will now also be *funded* much like federal entities.

There is not a moment to lose in accessing and using these funds. For one thing, every lost day amounts to hundreds or thousands of lost lives. For another thing, harm to State and Local economies is much easier to do than to undo. Best then to employ all means of 'damage control' now, at the earliest possible opportunity, rather than later — when thousands more will have died and much more productive capacity will have been lost.

It should also be noted that, in addition to all of the reasons elaborated above, there is another reason to treat the new MLF as affording us much that is needed right now to address and reverse our pandemic: that is the very fact that the MLF is, as emphasized twice now already, a 'work in progress' ...

The Fed is *improvising* right now. That means that what we do in response to the improvisation will be very important in determining the shape it assumes as it unfolds. We – the States and the Cities – are in other words co-authors of this new authority. It will ultimately be partly what we make of it. That is precisely why this observer is writing this Memorandum.

What, then, to 'make' of the MLF? This author believes all State Governors and Legislatures should be called into emergency session at once, 'virtually' if need be, to begin serious deliberation over how to begin using the MLF immediately. These sessions should also be attended by representatives of the States' largest Counties and Cities, as well as by appropriate personnel from all relevant State and Municipal Public Finance Departments.

Counties and Cities should hold counterpart Mayoral and Council meetings as quickly as possible too. For smaller ones, this will be to determine what aid to seek from their States as the latter tap into the new MLF. For the larger ones, it will be both for that reason and in order to determine what to seek *directly* from the Fed through the MLF.

All States and Cities that go into session as just described should also engage representatives of all *regional Federal Reserve Banks* in whose operational jurisdictions they are located as quickly as possible – ideally requesting their attendance at the sessions themselves. This will be important because the regional Federal Reserve Banks are the primary 'interface' between our federated Federal Reserve System and the nation's various State, Local, and Regional economies.⁵ In virtue of that role it will be easiest for the Federal Reserve System both to learn as quickly as possible what State and Local MLF needs are going to be, and to set into motion all procedures that will be necessary for States and Cities to *access* the Facility, if these regional Fed officials are involved in deliberations – even if only as observers – from the very beginning.

Because the need of funds generally is likely to be recognized and agreed upon even more quickly than the full panoply of specific *uses* of funds, it will probably also be best for State and City officials to 'segment' the deliberations that they commence in the emergency sessions that I am recommending here. First can come deliberation and decision over how much funding to seek and whom to authorize to begin preparations for the new issuances that the States and Cities will sell to the MLF SPV. That will of course involve *preliminary* vetting of specific needs and ongoing crises, if only to ensure everyone is clear on the urgency of the funding need itself. But more detailed decisions as to specific intra-State and intra-City *allocation* of funds then can be deferred to a second deliberative phase commencing immediately after decisions about what funding to seek have been made.

Call the first, *quantitatively* oriented discussion of funding needs and issuance authorization, then, '*Phase One*.' And call the second, more *allocatively* oriented deliberation and decision-making '*Phase Two*.'

If at all possible, this author believes States and Cities should begin holding their *Phase One* sessions immediately following the Easter weekend – that is to say, the week of April 12th – or as soon thereafter as possible. This is, again, both because the public health and economic devastation being wrought by the pandemic is happening quickly, and because the sooner that States and Cities begin weighing-in on how the MLF is implemented, the more influence they

To recur to the examples mentioned in footnote 3, for instance, officials of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York would be in attendance at State sessions in Albany and City sessions in lower Manhattan. Officials of the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas would be in attendance at Texas sessions in Austin and Municipal sessions in Dallas and Houston. And so on.

will have on its ultimate contours and characteristics. Once these Phase One decisions have been reached and the appropriate State and Local personnel have been assigned their issuing and Fedliaising tasks, States and Cities can proceed directly to Phase Two preparations – that is, to gathering information, testimony, advice and all other deliberative 'inputs' necessary to make sensible allocation decisions in respect of the new funding that will be coming from the MLF.

Once Phase Two deliberations end in allocation decisions, States and their Subdivisions might next consider what I'll call '*Phase Three*' deliberations over whether to press the Fed for further liberalization of the terms of the MLF Term Sheet. It might be decided, for example, that authorization to purchase State and Municipal paper of longer maturity than 24 months should be sought, or that a rollover option should be made more explicit. These questions can presumably wait, however, until current uncertainties 'on the ground' are resolved. With any luck, for example, the pandemic might be contained before summer ends. Or the States' Governors might succeed in their current effort to secure more direct funding from Congress.

However that may be, what matters now is that Phase One commence, and that it commence 'with all deliberate speed.' The author of this Memorandum will continue to watch events unfold, and will follow-up with further reporting and recommendations on an 'as [seems to be] needed' basis.

Dear Maui County Council,

I would like to offer my observations and support for having the Maui County Planning Department continue it's funding for the Science and Technical Advisor position, provided through the UH Sea Grant College Program, within the Department.

I hope that the major contributions of Tara Owens and her Sea Grant predecessors in this position is obvious to all.

I first became familiar with Tara Owens when she and colleague, Jim Buika, made their amazing presentations to the Kahana, Maui community regarding their shoreline erosion and beach replenishment issues. Tara and Jim planted the seeds that motivated and organized an entire community to create and fund their shoreline solutions based on science. The experiences of Kahana seemed to set a good model and path for Maalaea. These Kahana presentations, and a meeting with Tara and Jim with Maalaea community members in August of 2017, planted the seeds that evolved into the Maalaea Village Association's Town Hall meeting held only six weeks ago.

The result of this MVA Town Hall is the organization within Maalaea, albeit hampered by the coronavirus, to organize a steering committee on this topic. Goodwill and a sense of cooperation was felt by all in attendance. Conclusions from the meeting dictate that we as a community will do better by organizing and working together for a community wide solution instead of every property for themselves. This approach appeared to be appreciated by both the planners and the Maalaea community.

Tara Owens led off the meeting with the science of what was happening. A simple review of her presentation on this evening starting at minute 18 and ending at minute 33 should solidify any viewers confidence in her grasp of the science. I am certain that her colleagues within this department would agree.

As a second observation, it was painfully obvious to every one in attendance at this MVA Town Hall Meeting that the Maui Planning Department's shoreline planning expertise is woefully overworked and understaffed. This situation is exacerbated by the loss of one shoreline planner to the Mayor's office during this pandemic. The Planning Department cannot adequately serve the citizens of Maui when they are so egregiously understaffed. The backlog of emergency shoreline decisions and the need to triage these requests is tragic. Please consider solving this problem with more shoreline staff planners. This situation is not right for the department staff or for the people of Maui.

Aloha Committee members,

Attached is the oral testimony I intended to give to the EDB committee on Friday, April 10. Since the phone call wasn't answered, I received a kind invitation to send it to you this weekend.

Testimony:

I'm speaking today to encourage you to support funding in the 2021 Maui County budget for MNMRC's Water and Environmental Resource Protection and Conservation Program.

We're grateful for your support of \$225,000 in the 2020 budget, the first year of a multi-year project, which provides jobs for Maui residents, cares for our coastal water quality and coral reefs, and serves as a required match for our federal grants. The federal grant brings federal funding and jobs to Maui, as does the County funding. However the \$225,000 funding from Maui County is not currently in the 2021 proposed budget.

The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) grant, along with the \$225,000 Maui County grant, will support our efforts to continue the following:

- Our oyster bio-remediation project to improve ocean water quality in Ma'alaea Bay;
- Our ongoing work to implement the Pohakea Stormwater Management Plan to suppress wildfires in the Pohakea watershed and thus prevent sediment pollution in our coastal waters;
- Our scientific research to identify resilient corals to help re-build reefs;
- Our Hui O Ka Wai Ola ocean water quality monitoring program at 41 locations in South and West Maui to identify sources of impaired coastal water;
- Our community education programs including our "Know Your Ocean" monthly speaker series.

Maui County funding will help match the two-year grant from NFWF that is helping us put Maui residents to work while supporting our many programs including installation of firebreaks in Pohakea. The match is required by NFWF.

Hale Mahaolu Personal Care Program Testimony

The primary purpose of Hale Mahaolu's Personal Care Program is to help its clients continue to live in familiar surroundings in the comfort of their home and also to maintain independence in a safe environment with dignity and feeling worthy of respect. Hale Mahaolu's Personal Care Program has been in existence since 1985.

"He treats me with the utmost respect and dignity"
"Always, for all 13 years first rate"

The program serves those who may not be eligible for Kupuna Care and/or qualify for Medicaid. Personal care services are available to frail elderly and disabled adults 18 years of age and older who may have a chronic or acute condition(s), including cognitive and/or emotional problems which impairs the person's ability to perform activities of daily living (ADLs) and/or instrumental activities of daily living (IADLs). The individual served by this Program must require personal care services to remain at home as determined by a physician or other qualified medical professional. The Program assists those residing on Maui, Molokai and Lanai.

"Without it my quality of life would not be as good"

The Personal Care Program is unique in that clients receive subsidies (based on a financial sliding fee scale) which are then used to help pay for a personal care attendant (PCA). The subsidy pays for 4 hours per day, 7 days per week which is used to reimburse the client for part or the entire fee charged by the PCA. The cost savings by the community is realized by helping to prevent premature or unnecessary institutionalization.

"Without this program the aging would have a hard lifestyle"

PCAs provide personal care services that include bathing, grooming, personal hygiene, toileting, transfers, meal preparation and feeding, assistance with exercise and/or ambulation, and limited assistance with medications, wound care and/or respiratory care as well as general housekeeping.

"Keeps me healthy and maintains good hygiene...The help I receive is sorely needed."

With the current COVID-19 pandemic situation, this program is especially critical since home health aides are essential workers. They either already live with the client or have an established routine schedule with the client which minimizes exposure and risk. PCAs utilize PPE appropriately. Even after the pandemic has subsided, the Program will continue seamlessly.

It is because of the financial and human dignity considerations that we humbly ask for your continued support of the Hale Mahaolu Personal Care Program. We are asking the County of Maui (Human Concerns Program) for a grant of \$113,000 for FY 2021.

The Ha'iku Community Association appreciates the hundreds of Maui residents who supported our community when we asked the Council to purchase the stunning and historically important Hamakua coastal lands in 2016. In turn, we would like to support the request of the South Maui community for the purchase of the 257-acre Ma'alaea mauka lands in this years budget, through Maui County Open Space Funds.

This is a location where every person on their way to West Maui has marveled at the views of Mauna Kahalawai and the ocean beyond. The Ma'alaea lands are also very historically important. With their deep, rich soils, and numerous stream gulches, they were likely farmed for centuries by residents of the 15th-century Hawaiian village that once covered the adjoining State lands. The Ma'alaea mauka lands were an important destination in far away days, when every person who travelled by foot from West Maui to the central plains emerged from Chief Pi'ilani's old Lahaina Pali Trail onto the Ma'alaea mauka parcel to see the shining expanse of Kealia pond and the sacred crest of Pu'u Hele cinder cone.

We understand that this will be a difficult year to make budget decisions, with Maui's economy disrupted and so many of our residents without places to work. These legacy lands of Ma'alaea are a good investment, not only for their scenic beauty and historical value, but their strategic location, between West Maui and Central Maui would provide our whole community with some very important future planning options.

Community groups are interested in working with the Ma'alaea mauka lands to help manage wildfires and storm erosion. They have acquired funding and are seeking more through Federal programs designed to help protect coastal communities from the impacts of storms, floods, and other natural hazards and enable them to recover more quickly, and enhance habitats for fish and wildlife.

Please support the South Maui community and help preserve these iconic lands.

Today I swam in crystal clear waters at Keawekapu Beach in Kihei. So beautiful. This is why people come to Hawaii. We need to keep our waters clear and coral healthy, which it is not at this time. If no one is making an effort to understand and monitor the conditions that threaten the reefs then they will certainly die off and surrounding waters will degrade. The data helps us pinpoint specific water quality problems such as too much nitrogen from fertilizers or wastewater, too much sediment from runoff, etc. so our community can identify the causes and develop solutions. Most recently James Strickland and Tiara, curious to see what the nutrient levels will be - being that the injection wells and sewage systems are way under their usual load (250,000 less people here a month), will be out taking samples.

Please include the Hui O Ka Wail Ola in the county budget. It is essential sampling.

The Hui O Ka Wai Ola program provides quality assured ocean water quality monitoring at 41 locations in South and West Maui

We also provide enterococcus testing at most of our South Maui locations

We work in close partnership with the State of Hawaii Department of Health Clean Water Branch.

Our data is readily accepted by DOH and EPA, and used by local agencies and nonprofits.

The data helps us pinpoint specific water quality problems such as too much nitrogen from fertilizers or wastewater, too much sediment from runoff, etc. so our community can identify the causes and develop solutions.

Ka Ipu Kukui translates to "crucible of light." It reflects our mission to educate, cultivate and inspire emerging leaders to contribute to a thriving future for Maui Nui. It is our ultimate hope that Fellows will be beacons in our community and serve it guided by our core values.

Today, the Fellows are over 160 strong. They come ready to augment and hone their leadership skills, all in the spirit of making a difference. As we all experience the disruption caused by COVID-19, it is heartening to hear that our Fellows are on the front lines of solutions. They are using what they learned about systems and operations as well as their greatly expanded network acquired through the Halawai to help.

KIK Fellows are among state and county government in elected positions and in administration striving to address the array of public needs. They are in an array of businesses doing their part to progress or at least survive through the chaos. They come from nonprofits seeking and delivering the highest priority strategies in areas such as health care, unemployment, child care, food supply, or economic development. They are stewards of our watersheds and oceans. On a personal level, many are parents creating safe yet productive environments for their immediate and extended families.

In spite of personal and professional responsibilities, Fellowsare initiating food drives, distributing locally produced sanitizers, aggregating island resources in centralized repositories, coordinating childcare for essential workers or spurring community supported agriculture.

Aloha Chair Rawlins-Fernandez and council members, my name is Wes Nohara. I am an Associate Director of the West Maui Soil & Water Conservation District and I would like to submit testimony for continued support of the Maui Soils & Water Conservation District. We appreciate the years of support that Maui County has provided the Soil & Water Conservation Districts (SWCD) in the past. Your continued support has allowed Maui SWCDs to provide tremendous services and technical support to Maui's communities, its people and the environment.

There are about 3,000 SWCDs in the United States, 16 SWCDs in the State of Hawaii, of which 5 are in Maui County. Our SWCD's are a political subdivision of State government assigned under the Department of Land & Natural Resources. We were established and authorized under State Law Chapter 180. Each SWCD is comprised of 5 volunteer Board Members (voting) and any number of Associate Board Members (non-voting). All of our Board Members live or work in the districts they represent (as required by State law) and have a tremendous knowledge base linked to their communities. Although I am not on the Board today, I have served the West Maui SWCD in various capacities for over 34 years. My predecessor and mentor, the late Buddy Nobriga served over 50 years. Many of our Board Members have dedicated decades of their lives to improve Maui's Agriculture, protecting people's lives and property, minimizing soil erosion, and improving water quality.

What makes SWCDs special is the cooperative and collaborative nature of our organization. From the first begin in the 1930s, we were called to action by US Congress to assist the Federal Soil Conservation Service (today known as NRCS) in response to the huge erosion problem of the Mid-Western "Dust Bowl". Our Federal Agency (NRCS) developed good programs and technically capable personnel, but their programs were not working because they didn't have the proper links to the people of the communities. Thus Congress passed The Standard State Soil Conservation Act asking States to create Conservation Districts to work in partnership with the Federal Government. This 90 year old partnership still exists and is the central focus of SWCDs. Today SWCD's partnerships include State of Hawaii, County of Maui, Federal Govt, private companies and the general public.

Through these partnerships our SWCDs have been able to identify local conservation issues and problems, and work with our partners to find effective workable solutions. Our SWCDs are locally lead, tied to our community and focused on the local issues and needs. The West Maui SWCD works on West Maui Issues. Our West Maui SWCD Board and volunteers know our people, we know the history of our community, and we know the West Maui businesses and stakeholders, thus our efforts, projects and solutions are focused on West Maui.

These community based efforts have yielded tremendous results. The West Maui SWCD was organized in 1954. In the early 1960s a huge local flood devastated the Napili area, washing away cars, damaging homes and resorts, dumping tons of sediments and debris into the ocean. The West Maui SWCD held community meetings and the Napili residents and businesses were screaming for help, demanding that something be done. Our West Maui SWCD Board worked with NRCS, the local community and the County of Maui to develop the Honolua Watershed Plan. It took us about 40 years and over \$14 million to complete. Even before the Honolua Watershed Plan was completed, we started public meetings for the Lahaina Watershed Plan in the early 1980s. After nearly 20 years of public meetings and EIS process, actual construction began in 2010. This project is still ongoing as we continue to search for completion funding. To date we have spent over \$16 million and will require another \$22 million to complete. The public hearing EIS process delayed the project and concerned the West Maui SWCD Board enough that we developed and implemented the Temporary Lahaina Flood Control Project. This temporary project was developed to protect Lahaina community from flooding prior to the

completion of the larger Lahaina Watershed Plan. Built in 2002, the West Maui SWCD has inspected and maintained the system for 18 years and we will continue to do so until the main project is completed.

Other West Maui SWCD projects include: West Maui Mountain Watershed Partnerships, State Lands Drainage improvements, Kamehameha Lands drainage improvements, Algae Bloom Task Force, Coral Reefs Initiative Program, EPA 319 projects, State DLNR fire break road drainage improvements, Lahainaluna drainage improvements, Maaleaea Windmills road drainage improvement, Agricultural conservation plans, Maui County grading and grubbing reviews. The list of projects and achievements is quite impressive for an all-volunteer board, but truly our accomplishments are the results of collaborative partnerships of which the County of Maui is a key partner. Thus I ask for your continued support in funding the SWCDs of Maui County.

I serve as the Program Administrator and Curriculum Coordinator for the Ka'ehu Youth Enhancement & Mentoring Program (KYEMP). This is an after school & summer program that provides enrichment opportunities for youth (ages 14-24) at Ka'ehu. Participants are able to learn from mentors who are practitioners in marine biology, water microbiologists, Hawaiian culture, archaeology, and land restoration. Note that many of our KYEMP youth may not have the resources to learn first-hand from specialists in these fields, which makes our youth enhancement and mentoring program special since it is also Ka'ehu-centric.

KYEMP operates at Ka'ehu and affords youth opportunities to learn and practice the skills being taught by KYEMP mentors while onsite. These learning opportunities have had a positive impact on our youth, with a 100% return rate from our winter 2020 cohort returning to participate in our spring 2020 cohort (online). The commitment of the KAEHU and KYEMP staff, coupled with the opportunity to do their part to manage and maintain Ka'ehu, was not thwarted by covid19 as the operation was shifted to an online venue for the benefit of our youth and Ka'ehu. While the venue has shifted in accordance with County and State mandates, the focus has not, as KYEMP youth are still able to learn how to manage and maintain Ka'ehu and Ka'ehu Bay in an online setting.

It is a privilege to serve, enrich, and inspire our youth through KYEMP. However, they are not the only beneficiaries. As this program continues their families, restoration efforts at Ka'ehu, and our communities will benefit from the knowledge acquired by our KYEMP participants. Dear Council Members,

I am sorry that you have been put in the middle of a dispute over the ownership of the FAM program.

In the recent attack by HFUU you were told that none of us at Food Security Hawaii have any farming experience. Mark Sheehan, Jenny Pell, Niyaso Carter and I intend to address that falsehood square on.

As for me, I farmed for nearly 25 years before there was digital coverage but I have a few things in the attached folder:

- News articles
- Bull stud books
- Embryo transfer certificates
- Ads for embryos that sold internationally
- Photos of my Wisconsin farm and cattle

*If you read through these articles please note that the prefix for my registered cattle was <u>MaeWeJoCa</u>

After getting a BS with high honors in Crops and Soils at Michigan State University I worked on a 300 hog farm in Denmark, a 100 sheep and fruit farm in Norway, and on small dairies in both Norway and Austria. From there I hitch hiked through the Middle East to India and visited farmers along the way.

In Wisconsin I owned a 100 acre farm and rented an additional 200 acres where I grew corn, oats, hay, silage and pasture organically. I raised and sold both commercial and registered heifers with my biggest year being almost \$2,000,000 in sales. I also raised small scale broiler and laying chickens and manufactured equipment for handling cattle.

As you will see in the folder below I also did embryo transfer work on high genetic cattle and sold live calves for \$5000 each and frozen embryos for \$1500 each internationally which was quite unusual back in the 90s.

When the Military wanted to use our area as a low level flight training zone my Amish neighbors trusted my partner and I enough to speak out against the US government for the first time in history. That allowed me to lead a civil rights movement that got us national coverage from CNN, NBC, NPR and People magazine and resulted in shutting down Fly Zone.

After moving to Maui I worked in Vietnam and Cambodia with small bamboo farmers trying to get a bamboo plywood factory up and running. Ten years later it is blossoming. During that time I acted as COO and VP of innovations for a

Maui Company Bamboo Living http://BambooLivingHomes.com and was instrumental in getting bamboo UBC certified as an international building material.

More recently I lead the *Aina First* movement to attempt to get control of the Central Valley so that it could be farmed regeneratively. Along with many others I have not given up on that dream!

where we go from here.



Until then this is not a dead issue by any means so please continue your prayers.

La Crosse

Buyers paid \$341,000 for the 72 quality dairy cattle sold August 24, at the Tri-State Super Star Sale at the La Crosse Civic Center.

A 3-year-old Brown Swiss, R-Hart Bab Elle-ET, brought the highest price at the sale. The Mae-WeJoCa syndicate from the Westby area purchased the animal for \$36,000 from R-Hart Watakoneta Farms in Watekoneta, Ohio.

Five unborn Brown Swiss bulls, due in September, brought \$30,000 at the sale. Sired by Mile Away Craftman, their dam is LindaleConvincer Elaine, two-time supreme champion at World Dairy Expo and three-time unanimous allamerican.

Ten direct dams behind Lindale-Convincer Elaine is Jane of Vernon, considered to be the queen mother of the Brown Swiss breed. Born 62 years ago near Viroqua in Vernon County, Jane of Vernon was national champion five times and unbeaten during the 1930s.

The top-selling Holstein, Shey-Land Jesse Rozana-ET, owned by Landis Weaver from Goshen, Indiana, sold for \$12,000. The 3year-old cow was purchased by Genesis, an embryo-transplant company from England.

The second highest Holstein, High-Fights Bubba Lu-Lu-ET was purchased by Jim Feske of Spring Valley, Minnesota for \$11,000 from Patrick Orchard Dairy of Layetteville, Tennessee.

The sale was real consistent in quality and in price, according to Ole Meland, Vice-President of Genetics at Tri-State Breeders. The 56 Holsteins at the sale sold for an average of \$4,740, while the 16 Brown Swiss averaged \$7,456.

Hello Economic Development and Budget Committee,

I am writing to provide my testimony on how the EMER-GEN program presented by MEDB has benefitted my personal and career development. I work as a Systems Engineer for The Boeing Company here on Maui where I have worked for three years now. I was a member of the inaugural EMER-GEN cohort in 2018 and participated again in 2019.

EMER-GEN programming includes a mixture of training, leadership development, career development, mentoring, and networking. Over the past two years of participation, I have had the unique opportunity to interact with mentors who are experts and leaders in the field, including the now Director of Human Space Flight at NASA, Doug Loverro. In these small group mentoring meetings, you have a unique opportunity to ask questions about their research, background, thoughts on current events, or advice for how to move forward with your career. I cannot imagine many opportunities in which participants would have access to meet with such a range of high caliber mentors in a small group setting like what is provided at EMER-GEN. Background:	

Maalaea Village Association (MVA) held its first Town Hall on October, 2018. The subject was the need for wastewater treatment options due to mandates for replacement of several private wastewater treatment plants and the plausibility of a regional Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWTP).

The Panel included a Clean Water Expert, Representatives from the State Department of Health Wastewater Branch, the State Attorney General's Office, and a Wastewater Expert. 56 people attended, 25% (14 people) signed up to be on a wastewater task force.

A Steering Committee was named with individuals from the Hono Kai and Lauloa Condominiums which were both under orders by the DOH to correct their WWTP to a tune of approximately \$1 million each, Maui Ocean Center, and Maui Harbor Shops. MVA was represented on the committee. The Committee met numerous times since October of 2018.

Brown and Caldwell was hired to conduct a study on the feasibility of a modern regional WWTP for the immediate Maalaea Village Community, thereby replacing the 23 injection wells utilized by the ten condominium properties and Maui Harbor Shops.

South Maui County Councilmember Kelly King requested that we add the possibility of building a delivery system for Maalaea sewerage to be pumped to the planned Waikapu Country Town (WCT) WWTP as a part of the study as a more cost effective alternative. This portion of the study was funded by an OED grant to MVA.

Brown and Caldwell completed the feasibility study for concept plans with primary cost estimates on a regional WWTP and on the WCT pump station delivery system. Brown and Caldwell produced specific engineering for building a regional WWTP in Maalaea, provided conclusions for building a regional WWTP in Maalaea (Section 9), the concept of pumping toward the new Waikapu Country Town(WCT)(Section 10), and the comparison of the two methods (Section 11). Pumping to Waikapu proved to be half the cost and more timely.

We have met several times with Waikapu Country Town developer Mike Atherton, who has assured the Steering Committee that he will include Maalaea when he builds his wastewater treatment plant. Maalaea water and effluent will be invaluable in helping him get the development built in the near future. The Maalaea community would pay Public Utility Commission (PUC) defined rates for the treatment services.

The steering committee presented the study to Mayor Mike Victorino, several Maui County Council representatives, Senator Roz Baker, Representative Angus McKelvey, and Senator Gil Keith-Agaran. We have also met with Department of Environmental Management Director Eric Nakagawa and his staff. The goal was to ask for support in funding a public private partnership of state and county government and Maalaea property owners.

In the meantime, the Supreme Court of the United States has heard arguments on Maui County's appeal of Federal court rulings regarding violations of the Clean Water Act. The final ruling could affect the status of injection wells on Maui. We do not know how Maalaea might be affected by this court decision or what the changes might be with the

Supreme Court decision.

Maalaea community has been proactive by looking for positive solutions to improving upon the use of injections wells for our sewer effluent. We feel that whatever the results of the court decision, we will be in a better place by having studied the options. Recent efforts by Maui Nui Marine Resource Council and other entities to restore Maalaea Bay will benefit by eliminating injection wells in Maalaea.

It is a known fact that Maui County must find alternatives to its Kahului WWTP. The Administration's budget includes CIP funding for this new facility to begin making the move.

Although the Mayor has assured us several times that Maalaea could hook up to the new Central Maui facility we are not mentioned in the budget details.

We are unsure how Mr. Atherton's plans for Waikapu Country Town will materialize. At this point we ask that Maalaea be included in the County's long range plans with possible construction by 2025.

Dear Committee Chair Rawlins-Fernandez, Vice Chair King and Economic Development and Budget Committee Members,

As Executive Director of Maui Nui Marine Resource Council, I am presenting my testimony in support of funding to protect Maui County's coral reefs and nearshore ocean water quality in the County 2021 budget.

Before COVID-19, one of the biggest concerns for our island community was the declining state of our coral reefs and impaired ocean water quality. Our community recognized that coral reefs are more than fascinating undersea ecosystems. Without healthy coral reefs, our beaches will be eroded quickly by storms and big waves, our coastal infrastructure will be undermined and homes/buildings will be lost. Looking forward, our coral reefs will play a critical role in rebuilding tourism, the largest employment sector on Maui. Clean ocean water is also an important part of Maui's economic well-being; just think of the revenues associated with surfing and other watersports. Clean ocean water is also essential for the survival of our coral reefs and native fish populations.

During 2020, the County of Maui supported Maui Nui Marine Resource Council's work for healthy coral reefs, clean ocean water and abundant native fish with \$225,000 for our **Water and Environmental Resource Protection and Conservation Program**. As Executive Director of Maui Nui Marine Resource Council, I am presenting my testimony in support of funding to protect Maui County's coral reefs and nearshore ocean water quality in the County 2021 budget.

On behalf of the West Maui Ridge to Reef Initiative, I am writing in support of including funding for the Maui Nui Marine Resource Council (MNMRC) in the proposed budget for FY2021. Ideally, this would be at the past level of \$225,000.

The West Maui Ridge to Reef (R2R) Initiative is an all-encompassing approach across multiple agencies and organizations to address adverse impacts to coral reefs in West Maui. Utilizing established efforts underway and leveraging resources across a number of agencies and community groups, R2R seeks to implement actions to reduce one of the key sources of reef decline—land-based sources of pollution.

One of the partnerships we hold central to our success in making informed management decisions and understanding impact, is the coalition we have with The Nature Conservancy (TNC) and MNMRC that resulted in our creation and ongoing management of Hui O Ka Wai Ola. Hui O Ka Wai Ola is our community based, quality controlled coastal water quality monitoring program, through which, we now have more data points on key parameters than ever before to allow us to understand where we, as a community, have cause for concern, and where action is needed to address pollution.

Each organization in our coalition plays a key role in the Hui, and by acting as the fiscal agent for our program, MNMRC's function is critical. In addition to helping to support MNMRC's other efforts in protecting our marine environment and educating the public, County funding to MNMRC helps to ensure there are no interruptions in our ability to continue water quality sampling through Hui O Ka Wai Ola.

We can only manage what we measure. This is why it is essential that we continue to monitor our coastal waters so that groups like R2R, MNMRC, TNC and our networks of conservation partners can take informed actions to prevent further degradation of coastal waters and the marine ecosystems therein.

Although we met with the Mayor several times, we are not mentioned in the CIP budget detail for a new Central Maui Wastewater Treatment Plant. If the council approves funding for the new Central Plant, we ask that you include Ma'alaea in future plans.

On April 14, 2020 Lauloa Condominiums Board of Directors, on behalf of the owners, signed for a loan, close to one million dollars due to mandates by the department of health to replace our current 13,000 gallon Wastewater Treatment Plant to a new 21,000 gallon Wastewater Treatment Plant Mauka side of Hauoli street. The effluent from this plant will flow into injection wells until a county system is available. We are unsure how Mr. Atherton's plans for Waikapu Country Town will materialize, so we ask that Ma'alaea be included in the County's long range plans with possible construction by 2025.

Funding for KAEHU

Aloha Kākou,

I am the Executive Director of KAEHU, a nonprofit organization managing 64-acres of coastal wetlands in the district of Wailuku. The parcel is owned by the County of Maui and we have the right-of-entry to help manage and maintain the area til February 2024. KAEHU has partnered with public and private schools, community organizations, environmental organizations, businesses, and cultural practitioners to provide classes in natural resource management, marine biology, water microbiology, lauhala weaving, lā'au lapa'au and lomilomi, land restoration, beach clean-ups, and Hawaiian arts and crafts.

The Maui County OED program funded \$108,000 for the Community Environmental Stewardship Program in fiscal year 2020. Over the past year we have worked with public and private schools including Baldwin High, King Kekaulike, Lahaina Intermediate, Kihei Elementary, Pukalani Elementary, Mālama Waldorf, Kamehameha Pre-School Paukukalo, Maui Police Department POI and KALO youth and families programs, and STEM educational programs across the islands. Our partnerships include: Kauahea Inc., Hawaii Wildlife Fund, Hale Hoʻolana, Aloha Missions, KaponoʻĀina, Sustainable Coastlines Hawaii, and more.

From Oct 2018 to Sept 2019, KAEHU has worked with more than 980 volunteers, removed over 12,000 pounds of trash from the beaches, cleared over an acre of overgrowth, helped to clear the rivers and streams, and maintained several taro patches. The area was also used as an "outdoor classroom" to educate Maui students on the Ahupua'a system and traditional wisdom and values related to natural resource management.

On Oct 1, 2019, funded by the Administration for Native Americans (ANA), KAEHU started the Ka'ehu Youth Enhancement & Mentoring Program which provides after-school and summer programs, for Maui youth between the ages of 14-24, that allow students to work alongside marine biologists, water microbiologists, archaeologists, cultural practitioners, and land restoration specialists.

KAEHU is requesting the Maui County Council continue to support our on-going efforts to help manage and maintain the area and provide cultural and educational classes and community services opportunities in land restoration, beach clean ups, and more.

Aloha Committee and Council Chair and Members,

The Ma'alaea Village Association (MVA), with over 150 individual and business members, appreciates this opportunity to support the following items on the FY 2021 budget:

1. County Purchase of Ma'alaea Mauka/Pohakea Lands with Open Space Funds For many years, Ma'alaea Village Association, its predecessor, Ma'alaea Community Association, the Kihei Community Association, Sierra Club, Maui Tomorrow and every county planning director have expressed concerns about development on the 257-acre parcel due to its location at the gateway to West Maui, proximity to Ma'alaea Bay, vast scenic and cultural resources, and wildfires that frequent the site.

We request the parcel be purchased for public ownership and managed as part of the Pohakea Watershed Plan and other public purposes, which include expansion of the Lahaina Pali Trailhead, park/rest/greenspace, and emergency parking during road closures.

MVA has submitted an application for Legacy Land Conservation funds to match possible County open space funds for site purchase. Hawaiian Islands Land Trust (HILT) may be willing to "moderate" for a commitment to the purchase, and participate in future planning.

2. Ma'alaea Coastal Erosion Study

Over 150 people attended the MVA Town Hall on Coastal Erosion held in February, 2020. This Coastal Erosion Study is the next step in addressing the severe erosion facing Ma'alaea. Along with this request, we support continued funding for Tara Owens' Sea Grant position.

3. Maui Nui Marine Resource Council

The Maui Nui Marine Resource Council "Pohakea Watershed Stormwater Management Plan" and other environmental programs are critical to restoring Ma'alaea Bay. County match to their federal grants expands MNMRC outreach and benefits for Maui's future sustainability.

4. Include Ma'alaea in CIP for new Central Maui Wastewater Facility

The Ma'alaea community has proactively pursued alternatives to individual wastewater treatment plants and injection wells. The most cost effective and timely option is pumping to a private facility at Waikapu Country Town. If that is not a reality, we request that Ma'alaea be included in County CIP plans for a new wastewater facility in Central Maui.

Aloha Council and Committee Chairs and Members:

Our organizations and businesses appreciate the EDB Committee's consideration of including funds in the FY 2021 County Budget to purchase the 257 acres of Pohakea watershed commonly known as "Ma'alaea Mauka," and the inclusion of additional funding for a 5 year plan of conservation management to reverse the years of erosion and wildfire hazard in this special place.

The Pohakea/Ma'alaea Mauka lands are part of South Maui's "Conservation Corridor": Kealia National Wildlife Refuge; National Marine Humpback Whale Sanctuary; Ma'alaea Harbor-home of Maui Ocean Center and Pacific Whale Foundation, and the Lahaina Pali Trail, which traditionally and currently has its Central Maui trail head on the 257-acre parcel.

We request funding from the Maui County Open Space, Natural Resources, Cultural Resources, and Scenic Views Preservation Fund to purchase the Pohakea/Ma'alaea Mauka lands. We believe that these lands are a good fit for the intent of this fund, with numerous conservation values that define just the types of land the Fund seeks to protectopen space, natural and cultural resources and scenic views:

- They are rated by the State of Hawaii as Prime Agricultural land and were farmed for generations;
- According to a 2015 flora and fauna survey, the lands provide native wildlife habitat for endangered Nene Geese, Ope'ape'a (endangered native Hoary Bat), and the endangered Blackburn Sphinx Moth, as well as native Wiliwili trees and other native species;
- The Pohakea/ Ma'alaeaMauka lands are culturally and historically important due to the presence of the 500-year-old Lahaina Pali Trail, the traditional Waikapu-Ukumehame Ahupua'a Boundary, and the historically important Pohakea gulch, which drains to Kealia Pond;
- The site has been designated as a future transportation corridor in the Maui Island Plan;
- The Pohakea/Ma'alaeaMauka lands meet the goals of the Maui Island Plan, with outstanding scenic vistas, mauka and makai, and are very popular with local and visiting hikers for recreational use due the presence of the Old Lahaina Trail.

South Maui, and the Ma'alaea area, is an important economic asset to all of Maui County. It has been 20 years since a park or open space parcel of any significant size has been protected in the South Maui District through applying funds from the Maui County Open Space, Natural Resources, Cultural Resources, and Scenic Views Preservation Fund.

As community organizations and businesses providing support and advocacy in Maui County, we strongly feel this is an opportunity to protect these open space lands at the gateway to West Maui, Central Maui and South Maui that will continue to sustain and nourish the residents and visitors of Maui for generations to come.

We, the residents of Maui, in partnership with concerned visitors, request the Maui County Council include funds in the upcoming Maui County budget to purchase the 257-acre Ma'alaea Mauka lands, as part of the Pohakea Watershed, so that it can be managed with the surrounding State Pohakea Watershed lands for the benefit and safety of all. Aloha Chair & Members,

I support the purchase of Ma'alaea Mauka/Pohakea Watershed with Open Space Funds.

I am the General Manager at Maui Ocean Center. When I became the General Manager here at Maui Ocean Center in September 2015 I immediately learned what operating under the NPDES permit under the Clean Water Act of 1972 meant to us. Shortly afterwards I hired an Environmental Water Quality Team (Robin Knox as the Director of Regulatory and Policy Affairs and Aviad Cahana as the Director of Technical Affairs) to help guide us through the complex requirements of the Department of Health NPDES permit and also more importantly how we here at Maui Ocean Center could be part of the better WQ solution to our community.

Early on it became evident that not only does Maui Ocean Center clean the Ma'alaea Harbor water quality but that the real issue is the watershed management, rather lack thereof, as we have measured several rain events in the harbor with nutrients loads outside the scale of the NPDES permit levels for example issued to us. Sedimentation as well continues to be the real threat to our near shore waters as anyone using the near shore water certainly has observed.

I support The County of Maui purchase of Ma'alaea Mauka/Pohakea land for the following reasons

- a) It can help with the ongoing sediment problems going into our bay which are still a huge issue
- b) It will help with the excessive nutrient load reduction entering into our near shore waters
- c) It can be used to keep our island beautiful as a blank space
- d) Needed fire breaks
- e) Safer Pali Trail parking
- f) With all of the housing on the way it can help with future road planning which we will need
- g) It can be used for emergency parking, road closures, turnarounds which are greatly needed during times of emergencies

As a cofounder & a board member of Common Ground Collective, I would like to submit testimony in favor of your support of our community services.

Aside from the hard work we've put in in the last three years, and the harvest data to prove our commitment to our community with the goal of establishing island food security; we also collaborate with other organizations that benefit with our support.

For instance, CGC hosts or participates in volunteer work days to support local farmers or school gardens with extra hands for harvest or clearing of grow beds and fields.

CGC works with nonprofits like Maui Food Bank, Chilis on Wheels, Make Food Not Bombs, Paia Youth and Cultural Center, just to name a few; to receive backyard produce donations from our free harvesting service we offer. This backyard produce would otherwise go unpicked and sadly not make it into the community.

Recently we have been called on by other AG sector organizations looking for advice and assistance. Currently, CGC is part of a larger team that includes Grow Some Good, Beyond Pesticides, and HFUU, to establish food networks and hubs around the island to support our farmers, ranchers, fishermen, and added value product makers get their food, in the form of CSA boxes, to our local community during this crisis.

CGC is also set up to do garden installations. With an additional \$70k in funding from the County, along with the \$30k request for our harvest service; we could increase our efforts in supporting our community.

Common Ground Collective is a local 501c3 nonprofit who is worthy of support, based on the connections we've made, and the 6,000+ lbs of food we've collected and have gotten into the community over the years.

There's always more food to harvest and more bellies to fill; and, I'll say it again, we are committed to feeding our community and establishing island food security.

Please support us so we can continue to support our neighbors, our community connections, and our Island.

Problem Statement

Food security in Hawaii is a very large and worrisome issue. Hawaii is approximately 2,506 miles from the continental United States, and that is where we receive most of our shipments from. According to the Office of Planning Department of Business Economic Development & Tourism, 85-90% of Hawaii's food is imported. This is concerning because it



makes us particularly vulnerable to food shortages, if the shipping process is interrupted by natural disasters and/or global events (Office of Planning, 2012).

- Since the 1980's, agricultural land acreage in Hawaii has declined by 50% and existing production has remained largely for export.
- Hawaii has very high rates of poverty and it is estimated that 12% of adults and 19% of children in Maui County are food insecure.
- Hawaii's dwindling agricultural system paired with the losses in its agricultural labor force, has placed Hawaii and Maui County in grave danger.
- Lack of Agricultural and Market Data create unnecessary economic hardships for local farmers, and benefits imports.

Who is Common Ground Collective?

Common Ground Collective (CGC) is a grassroots 501c3, formed in 2017 by Maui residents, to grow food security and economic opportunities in Maui.

CGC's mission is to transform Maui into a bountiful and productive island that benefits both the environment and the people who live here, for generations to come.



CGC assists food insecure sectors, through the redistribution of harvested food that would otherwise rot. Through actively educating and providing hands-on assistance to the community, CGC is able to promote responsible resource management and environmental stewardship.

CGC is a Solution Driven Organization

Through community outreach, CGC observed that Maui has an abundance of un-harvested fruit trees on privately owned land and that a substantial portion of agricultural-zoned lots on Maui are not actively producing food. Specifically, Upcountry Maui is the largest area of Maui where non-operational agricultural lots exist. This creates a significant opportunity to



provide food (that would otherwise be wasted) to those in need, and to local businesses who are seeking more locally grown produce, as well as increase the amount of agricultural land actively producing food.

According to a study by the Office of Planning in 2012, "The economic impact of food import replacement is significant. Replacing just 10% of the food we currently import would amount to approximately \$313 million. Assuming a 30% farm share, \$94 million would be realized at the farm-gate which would generate an economy-wide impact of an additional \$188 million in sales, \$47 million in earnings, \$6 million in state tax revenues, and more than 2,300 jobs."

CGC's Foster Farming Project

In order to create a more robust, resilient and sustainable local economy, it is crucial to empower the community to produce more of its own food and dependence decrease on imported goods. Through improved farming practices that are both environmentally productive, responsible and community can increase its health by consuming fresher food that is locally



produced and decrease its dependence (and associated carbon footprint) on imported resources.

The Foster Farming Project launched in 2019 and educates landowners about how to create economic opportunity on their non-operational agricultural land by transforming it into operational and productive land.

CGC provides: on-site education, installations, crop harvesting services, crop data collection, distribution of crops to non-profit partners and schools, distribution and marketing of crops to local retail outlets and restaurants, ongoing consultation and administrative support to landowners.

CGC gives landowners the knowledge, incentives and assistance needed to get the unused produce from their land out into the community, continue to do so in the long-term, and expand their operations through our installations services to generate greater positive impact on the regional food system.



Landowner Options for Harvested Produce and Costs

- Harvested Produce for Donation to Community Organizations- Free
- Harvest Produce Donated to help support CGC- Free
- Harvested Produce for Sale- 40% to CGC to help cover our costs and support our mission and 60% back to the landowners.

Foster Farming Harvest Goals

- Perform a minimum of 52 harvest visits
- Harvest a minimum of 10,000lbs of produce (We are on track for this goal and have already harvested 5,049 lbs. since April 6, 2020)
- Host 12 Community Volunteer Workdays to help local farms
- Collect Ag and Market data for every visit
- Perform quarterly in-person community education and outreach events
- Through our community outreach and education in person events we aim to reach at least 1,000 community members each year and enroll roughly 5-10% into some form of Foster Farming service.
- Double our online and social media reach in order to promote education to a broader and more consistent audience.

Foster Farming Installation Project



CGC's Foster Farming Installation Project will launch in 2020, and will provide "ready to go" garden bed installation for neighborhood yards as well as offer larger scale orchard installations for properties up to 4 acres. Homeowners can choose how many beds, what to grow, with guidance, whether or not to continue to maintain themselves or have extended CGC services provided. CGC utilizes regenerative practices to replenish soils and

maintain environmental health.

Our installation services will be provided on a sliding scale that is based on the Federal Poverty guidelines for Hawaii. In addition to committing to providing 30 garden installations to households in need, CGC will also be providing installations on a sliding scale rate. The profits from our full priced installations will help cover the cost for additional donation based services as well as allow our organization to cover our cost long term to keep the project going and not 100% reliant on grant funding.

Our sliding scale ranges from 0 upfront cost in the 150% and below income levels and then gradually increases from 10% upfront cost in the 175% level all the way to 90% at the 325% level. Once income levels reach 400% above the federal poverty guidelines they will be required to pay full price. (Please see sliding scale

attachment for a full breakdown.) We feel that our sliding scale model allows us to help those that can afford it and utilize any profits that would be made in a normal business to be put back into our community to provide installation services for those in need but cannot afford it.

Full price cost for installations are as follows:

\$450 for an installation of an 8ft x 4ft x 1 ft = 32 cubic ft. cedar bed, or in-ground garden bed with organic soil, organic amendments, organic seeds and starts, and on-site education.

\$5,000/ acre for Orchard installation with above ground drip irrigation on a digital timer.



Installation Goals:

- For every 3 full price garden bed installations we will provide 1 free garden bed installation for a household in need.
- For every 5 acres of full price orchards planted we will provide 1 acre of orchard installation service for free to a household in need.
- In addition, we will be providing a minimum of 30 donation based garden bed installations for the community utilizing the County funding by the end of December 2020.
- Provide free onsite education and guidance for every installation to help landowners feel more comfortable and prepared to grow their own food.
- Create an online resource library to help landowners find pertinent information and growing tips.

Our Orchard Pilot Project:

2018-2019 Orchard Installation Pilot Project

• A home purchased in 1981 for approximately \$180,000 was inherited by a local family from their grandmother and is now valued at over \$900,000 without any major renovations.

- The family was a young couple in their 30's with 2 small children under the age of 5, both employed full-time. One a school teacher and one in charge of memberships for an ocean-based local non-profit.
- The total acreage before the installation being taxed at market rate was 2.1 acres, costing the couple almost \$6,000 a year in taxes.
- We planted, drafted and submitted their farm plan changing their tax status for real property tax to agricultural valuation.
- The farm plan took .86 acres out of market rate and put it into wasteland because it is an unfarmable gulch, left .32 acres for home-site and placed the remaining .86 acres into production.
- We planted 62 fruit trees, 125 ti plants and installed drip irrigation. Plants and trees are mulch fed and irrigation is on a timer system to minimize labor and water usage.
- This installation is saving this local family \$2,336.12 a year on their taxes and if they had paid for the installation full-price, which they did not, it was a donation installation, they would have had a full return on investment in 2.5 years just from their RPT savings alone.

Garden Beds for personal use do not count as Agricultural production currently so we are not able to show a ROI for that but we still do encourage raised and in-ground beds along with full installations.

Project Timeline and Breakdown

The Foster Farm project is ongoing and will be implemented using weekly, monthly, quarterly time frames for activities followed by an annual review process as outlined below:

Weekly: Perform weekly community installations & harvests, clean produce, distribution of produce, collect data, provide receipts to customers, advertisement of the foster farming project, and provide community engagement, education, and outreach through social media platforms.

Monthly: Meeting with local actors in the agricultural and nonprofit sectors to expand networks, grant writing, fundraising and organization and execution of CGC's monthly volunteer community work days to support local farms.

Quarterly: Plan and execute a minimum of once quarter community outreach events at local events, such as, La 'Ulu (Breadfruit Day) festival, Ian Walsh's Menehune Mayhem, to promote education about our organization and regional agriculture sector via a speaking engagement or community presentation.

Annually: Prepare a project review and final impact report to share with Maui County agricultural stakeholders, partner organizations and clients. Produce grant reporting and strategic planning to prepare for the following year.



to grow most of our own food here in Hawai'i. She is inspired to grow even more healthy food, native plants and to keep learning with our community.




Founding Executive Director/ Operations Manager Jennifer Karaca

Aloha Chair Rawlins-Fernandez and EDB Committee Members,

Mahalo for all your hard work going over the County budget for 2020-2021. We are disappointed that some very important funding for environmental programs was left out of the current draft of the proposed budget, and strongly support restoring the \$225,000 of funding for Maui Nui Marine Resource Council (MNMRC) to continue its many vital programs on Maui.

Community members often contact the Sierra Club to ask about the water quality at various ocean recreation areas. We refer them to the helpful staff at Maui Nui Marine Resource Council and the MNMRC webpage where they can check out test results

https://www.mauireefs.org/what-we-do/water-quality-testing-program/

for 24 popular beaches in South Maui, and another 24 in West Maui. This testing is possible in large part through a County Grant from the OED. This program has a part-time paid manager and 35 volunteers and has greatly expanded the Department of Health's ability to test ocean water quality at Maui beaches and to provide quality-assured data to County, State and Federal agencies.

Maui's families who use the coastal waters for fishing, gathering and recreation need this testing program to continue. MNMRC has other much needed programs that depend upon County support to match other donors funds. Maui Nui's oyster project, to improve ocean water quality in Ma'alaea Bay, is another well researched, much needed program that is funded through the County Grant and other matching funds. Ma'alaea Bay is one of Maui's major economic draws for fishing, boating, whale watching and commercial pleasure cruises. The state does not have any programs to clean up the impaired Harbor waters, but Maui Nui does.

There is much more to say about the fine work MNMRC does to protect Maui's reefs and marine environment that we all treasure. Maui Nui accomplishes a great deal with the County funds it has been given, and it uses them to attract other funds as well, and undertake more projects.

Please restore the \$225,000 funding for MNMRC.

Testimony on EDB-1 FY21 Maui County Budget Friday, April 17, 2020

Dear Chair Rawlins-Fernandez, Vice-Chair King and Members of the Economic Development and Budget Committee,

Mahalo for the opportunity to provide testimony.

We know some are wondering why funding for the Maui Visitors Bureau (MVB) is needed while we are in a global economic and health crisis and we wanted to help provide rationale for that funding.

Businesses across the board have been devastated by the impacts of COVID-19, even more so for those directly reliant on the industry. Many don't know how long they can survive or if they will survive the time it will take to bring visitors back. We estimate that the trickle-down effect of the visitor industry to Maui businesses is 75%. This quickly illustrates why we have seen so many layoffs from hotels, resorts, restaurants, retail shops, activity businesses, and all nonessential businesses required to shut down.

Unemployment claims made by Maui County residents from March 15 to April 11 totaled 29,560 and there were more this week. Further, Hawaii has gone from one of the lowest unemployment rates per capita in the nation to the highest because of our dependence on the visitor industry. More layoffs are certain and many businesses will not recover from this crisis. If funding is cut for the Maui Visitors Bureau and subsequently our visitor industry significantly suffers, delaying our rebound, where will needed jobs come from? Small businesses are also job generators, but they will be struggling to survive as well. How will we get those on unemployment off unemployment to sustain their families? Additionally, our state unemployment funds are expected to run out in May without federal help. We find ourselves in a time when we are unable to shore up job losses the way we have in the past. Without or economic engine, what is the plan?

Further, there are misconceptions about marketing funding. While significant cuts were made last year to MVB's budget and we had a high number of visitors prior to COVID-19, marketing is meant to be constant and has a hang time (whereby media previously bought is still out there for a period of time and continues to generate traction). As funding cuts move forward and further cuts are made, you will see significant decreases in numbers.

Now is the time for us to invest in rebuilding the visitor industry and creating new models based on many realities caused by COVID-19. When reinventing an industry, more investment is needed to reshape and rebuild and new campaigns and messaging must be developed. This takes investing in a new strategy without arbitrarily making cuts without knowing the impacts they will have. Many economists, bankers and industry experts recognize that further investment is going to be required to frame and rebuild this industry.

Additionally, each county has unique nuances including the level of county support for their local visitors bureau. If one is going to compare one county to another, one must create an apples to apples comparison. For example, Waikiki has a massive cluster of hotels and resorts who all do individual marketing to attract visitors. In comparison, Maui has a controlled number of hotels and resorts, lessening the amount of industry marketing that is done. You also have to look at the individual results generated based on the individual island plans and what they were seeking to achieve.

It is also important to note, from an economic standpoint, that other counties in our state have more diversified engines they can fall back on, such as military installations, university presence and specialized schools, a mature agriculture industry, etc.

Ultimately, our goal is to sustain all residents and give them a wonderful quality of life. As the World Health Organization and International Monetery Fund note, you have to protect people's health and protect people's jobs to sustain families and businesses in the local economy, particularly during COVID-19. As a one industry island until agriculture is rebuilt, the Maui Visitors Bureau is the best shot we have for improving our overall economic health. Taking funding away will equate to industry harm and delaying job creation. During this time, we hope people would put our residents and businesses first and not use a global crisis to bring down our number one and needed economic engine.

Here is Testimony from my General Manager:

Aloha EDB Committee Members,

My name is David Frazier and for the last 20 years I have been the General Manager at the Maui Coast Hotel in Kihei. My wife and I are long term residents and own a home in Kihei. We have both been active community participants and I am a past president of the Kihei Community Association. The Maui Coast Hotel is also active, as a major sponsor of the MACC and a constant contributor to many or most of the charitable organizations on Maui.

I am writing to today to express my concerns regarding the proposed tax increase on hotels and the reduction of funding for the MVB.

First, regarding taxes:

One would think this is obvious, but I cannot imagine of a worse time to propose any tax increases on hotels. In fact, it is hard for me the fathom that anyone would have serious discussions about it. As everyone is aware, the hospitality industry along with most every other business on Maui is in the midst of a cataclysmic downturn the likes of which no one has ever seen. Right now, our primary concern is simply staying in business —and the subject of raising or lowering taxes will become moot if we don't.

Right now, I have over 60 staff members that want to return to work! My primary concern is making that happen. Please don't make that more difficult.

If anything, we need relief until the economy recovers.

Regarding MVB funding:

Once again, the magnitude of the business losses on Maui and in the State are just beginning to be felt. Like it or not—and yes, I am fully aware that some people don't like it—tourism is the "gas" that powers virtually every other business in the State let alone Maui—and will be well into the foreseeable future. Not to be a smart aleck, but defunding MVB because "someone" feels that Maui has "enough" tourism—particularly now—is like saying there is plenty of oxygen in the air, who needs trees.

If anything, we should be increasing funding to MVB! Soon, Maui and the State will be competing for "budget" tourism with the likes of Mexico and every other destination that competes for those dollars. Unless all we want to see here are the affluent, we should be gearing up now to fight for the economy minded traveler. Tourism is not a given here.

Let's have the discussion about decreasing MVB funding when the islands and particularly Maui are back to experiencing high occupancies and spending.

Lastly, after having reviewed some of the highly questionable testimony against MVB funding, I would caution the Committee to strongly consider the bona fides of the testifiers.

MAUI VISITOR BUREAU FUNDING TESTIMONY

Aloha members, I would like to clarify some legislative information I passed on to you yesterday.

There are two legislative issues we are tracking at the Maui County Council, funding for the Maui Visitors Bureau and property tax rates.

RIght now MVB funding is our priority because testimony is due tomorrow. A public hearing on property taxes is set for later this month on April 29th. It has been suggested from the council that we concentrate on testifying for MVB tomorrow and we will begin to coordinate our property taxes response next week.

MVB spends several million dollars annually to market Maui worldwide as a top tourist destination. Those testifying against giving MVB funding last week said they would rather see those funds taken away and redistributed elsewhere – like for sustainable agriculture – because Maui is "already well known" among tourists and that we "don't need to spend any more money on public relations for Maui."

Also, they are trying to say that no one is advertising for Maui right now and we are still getting tourists coming here. The truth is we continue to get up to 5 tourists a week flying in to Maui, and they're not staying at the hotels. They're staying at an Airbnb or a friend's house according to their agricultural forms.

What these testifiers last week also don't understand is that through marketing efforts we can get hotel occupancy back up sooner so that everyone can get back to work more quickly. Also the worldwide tourism market is diverse, and there are always better deals to go to other destinations such as Mexico or the Caribbean.

If you are concerned about MVB funding please contact the council tomorrow and testify as to what your personal story during the COVID-19 crisis is and what you have been going through, and how you need to get back to work as soon as possible. If you have sales or marketing experience and have knowledge about how MVB marketing helps bring guests to your property go ahead and testify to that as well. Same goes for our allied members.

Note that Council members want to hear PERSONAL stories. How will taking away tourism marketing funds will affect your ohana because it delays your return to work. Speak honestly and don't be afraid to express yourself and your own words will be fine.

Today's world is the most uncertain and troubling of my life. Covid 19 has undeniably had the most deviating impact and fare reaching impact on our community.

It is heartbreaking to see such the overwhelming unemployment figures as well as witness residents experiencing stress and anxiety related to health and economic concerns. Personally, I have 370 associates that have been laid off or placed on furloughs. I reach out to them every week with messages including wellness messages, property updates and industry news. I am striving to stay personally connect. My concerns extend to them being able to eat and have shelter and safety. We will continue to find methods of support for as long as we can yet financial independence is so critical to our community health and the well being of our 'Ohana. Resuming operations is dependent on the recovery of tourism. Maui needs to have a presence and be be top of mind for a more speedy recovery. A successful campaign has to be well timed, strategic and fiscally responsible. The deep cuts that have been proposed would slow recovery. We are very isolated and overcoming the idea of long flights will be an opportunity. The competition for the visitor will be immense as US tourism has declined by 78% over the last month. Maui has been the example of smart choices that have lead to great ROI's and opportunities for residents to thrive. There is no other economic engine that can help us support the social services and government infrastructure that we look to provide. I ask for your support to retain funding as it has been present these past few years.

Dear Committee Chair and Committee Members,

My name is Gregg Nelson and I am general manager of the Napili Kai Beach Resort on Maui's westside. Our resort is marking 60 years of operation and we employee approximately 160 staff members. Since the start of this terrible tragedy a few weeks ago, I have had to make the difficult decision to close the resort and lay off approximately 130 staff members. Despite the financial hardships the resort is facing we are continuing to fund 100% the medical insurance premiums for all of our staff members. This costs us about \$100,000/month. AS few weeks ago we volunteered for the Hotels For Heroes program though we have yet to receive any reservations from the central clearing house for the program.

I want to implore all of you to seriously consider supporting the Maui Visitors Bureau funding put forth in the Mayor's budget. I know there are some of you who believe that the funding isn't needed because the tourists will return regardless. That is simply not true. The entire world has been economically impacted by this crisis and when the green light is finally given that travel is okay again, every destination in the world will be competing for the same travelers we are trying to attract. If you truly care about the citizens of Maui and want the economy to return quickly and robustly, we must market our destination more than we ever have in the past. Without this effort, we will be left in dust at the starting line rather than leading the competitors. I am the operator of a small resort but I recognize this fact and plan to increase my modest sales and marketing but of about \$500,000 by at least another \$100,000. I know other resorts will likely do the same with their marketing budgets however to truly achieve success we need Maui Visitors Bureau's participation in marketing the entire County and that can't be achieved without proper funding.

I recognize that this is just the testimony of one person however I do believe I can speak on behalf of at least the 130 of my staff members who are currently unemployed and struggling to make ends meet financially. They are anxious to get their lives back on track by getting back to work. A vote in favour of the Mayor's proposed funding of MVB is a vote in favour of Maui County and the thousands of our citizens who need to get back to work.

Aloha, my name is RJ, I am a senior at Maui High School and a team captain for the robotics club. I want to testify the importance of the support and funding from the county of Maui and mayor to MEDB on my STEM education. When I first joined robotics in my freshman year, the MEDB fund supported the club, and I'm sure they supported before as well. But what this money does for our club is to purchase new materials like metal and screws, help out with some of the fees traveling to the competition. There's also another kind of robotics that we do that is called First Robotics Competition or FRC for short. Vex robotics is like a junior varsity kind of robotics and FRC is the varsity part. In Vex, we separate into groups to build small robots, 18"x 18"x 18", to complete an objective of a game in which a new one comes out every year. Then we compete with other teams in the state, we got to travel to an Oahu competition to compete with schools there. This year we got a new kit called V5 which is an upgrade of the old electronics that we use to move a robot. As for FRC, it's the same concept as Vex but it's one group per high school to build, program, and document one robot. The robots in FRC could go up to be 120 inches total in perimeter, height up to 45 inches and weight up to 125 pounds. We only have 6 weeks to complete one robot and ship to a competition. This year we went to Del Mar in San Diego to compete against 57 teams. However, we weren't able to compete in Oahu cause of the coronavirus. Our club doesn't only build robots, we also do fundraisers, demos, and volunteering. This year we did fundraisers with a poi mochi company and Zippys. For demos, we showcased our 2019 FRC robot at Ke Ala Hele at the Grand Wailea and we were supposed to do a demo at Mcdonalds but we couldn't because of the virus. Then for volunteering, we helped out

My name is Winston Chinn, I am the General Manager of the Mana Kai Maui. I am pleased to have this opportunity to address you today. Thank you. I am expressing my overwhelming support for the proposed FY2021 budget for the Maui Visitors Bureau.

The vacation rental company, Resort Hotel Associates LTD, dba Mana Kai Maui Hotel had 22 full time employees prior to the Covid pandemic outbreak. We have closed down operations for the month of April, and I personally feel we will be lucky to open by July. We have had to furlough 18 of our staff. Many do not have a home computer, and English is their second language so we have been assisting them with trying to get through to the Unemployment services, which you know is slammed!

Many of our furloughed employee's spouses work in the visitor industry, so their families are impacted twice as much. We will continue to pay for their medical benefits during their furloughed time. Since last year, we in the industry have heard that Maui was looking for a way to scale back visitors. Well, that time has come today and how many visitor industry related jobs have been affected? Of course, this sudden halt to visitors coming to Maui is not as drastic as gradual slowdown of arrivals, but almost every business is affected by tourism.

It will take a very long time for tourism to rebound to Maui and this State, supporting the Mayor's proposed Budget of \$3.5 million is a big step in getting the word out to the world that Maui is open for business once again.





In addition, I am the Chairman of the Board of Hawaii Lodging and Tourism Association and work closely with our state and county leaders in tourism. I have lived in Hawaii for 21 years and on Maui for 18. I am writing in support of continued funding of Maui Visitor's Bureau. Please support our Mayor's requested budget for funding.

We are at an unprecedented point in the hospitality and visitor's industry. Tourism is at a standstill. Hotels and resorts are of course suffering, but tourism's reach goes far beyond; businesses large and small all across the island depend on our tourists. The council should worry about the high unemployment rate and focus on how we can get our residents back to work.

We will need funding to jump start tourism. You state that we are a popular destination and popular island. Yes we are, but we are also an expensive and remote destination. Without awareness generated by the MVB, we run a great risk of losing visitors to other destinations such as Mexico or the Caribbean. If we do not partner with the airlines, local community, state tourism authority then no one will be able to get to the islands. Hotels will not be able to afford marketing their own properties because of the high overhead of expenses associated with resorts; therefore we need county assistance. This is our chance to work together with our local community and pave the way for responsible tourism.

If you care about hospitality workers then you will not 'defund " the MVB, but you will provide as much funding as possible to bring back our visitors. They are the key to the financial wellbeing of Maui and many livelihoods are dependent upon them. Please remember past times on Maui when visitor counts were low- following 9/11 and during the 2008 recession. Times were tough for many families on Maui. We need to do all we can to avoid this and rebuild our tourism.

Normally I would have many colleagues providing testimony, but we currently have about 500 out of work and on furlough.

Dear Chair Rawlins-Fernandez and members of the Economic Development & Budget Committee, mahalo for the opportunity to submit testimony on behalf of the Hawai'i Lodging & Tourism Association, the state's largest private sector visitor industry organization.

The Hawai'i Lodging & Tourism Association—nearly 700 members strong, representing more than 50,000 hotel rooms and nearly 40,000 lodging workers — is cognizant of our industry's need to manage tourism efficiently and effectively. We have serious concerns about eliminating the annual appropriation to the Maui Visitors Bureau.

Hawai'i's tourism sector has been brought to a standstill by the outbreak of COVID-19 around our state. We are completely supportive of the need to tell tourists this is not the time to visit Maui now, and for that matter the state of Hawai'i, as we are prioritizing the needs and health and safety of our community over and above everything else.

However, with each passing day, it has grown increasingly apparent that what we are experiencing is global and unprecedented. The U.S. Travel Association recently published an economic forecast which indicated that the losses incurred by the tourism industry will far exceed those of any other economic sector, and the impact will be seven times greater than what was felt after the September 11 terror attacks.

Tourism in Hawai'i will always be our core competence, and for good reason; we rely upon it to help sustain a wide variety of local businesses. Yes, it is important for the thousands of local residents who work in our hotels who play a vital role in the success of the visitor experience. But it is also critical for agriculture, restaurants, and small businesses of all types - all of whom who benefit from the success of the travel industry and the visitors that it brings to our home. While our industry has always been among the most consistent economic drivers in Hawai'i, our recovery from the COVID-19 outbreak will take careful and focused work on all fronts. We cannot rely on the idea that we have recovered in the past, and we will recover this time.

HLTA has long advocated the need for quality tourism rather than quantity tourism. We support responsible tourism that is sustainable, respects our environment and embraces our native Hawaiian culture. The Maui Visitors Bureau has played an important role in positioning Maui as a premier destination for travelers from around the world, and they will play a key role in bringing high quality visitors back to Hawai'i sooner rather than later when the time is right. We urge the Council to continue to provide them the necessary funding to ensure we rebound from this pandemic.

Dear Committee Members;

This letter is to request funding for the Maui Nui Marine Resource Council in the 2021 b budget.

I am a Ph.D. scientist with a background in marine biology currently living on Maui. I am SCUBA diver and have dived in Maui County waters for the past 20 years. During this period, I have seen a decay in the quality of the marine ecosystem off the coast of South Maui. There are fewer fish and significant coral bleaching. Sediment coats the coral and significantly impacts its survival. Additionally, I have worked as a volunteer on a regular basis for the past few years to support the Hui O Ka Wai Ola program to assess the water quality off South Maui locations. My time and automobile have been given freely in this support. With my 30 years as a scientist, I can testify that the procedures used to test our water quality are done correctly, with controls in place to assure readings are accurate.

The Hui O Ka Wai Ola program is critical for the future of Maui as a vacation paradise. When we are out testing, on almost every occasion, people come up to our team and ask us if the water is safe. Residents and visitors alike are informed and concerned about the safety of our beaches and water.

It is imperative that the testing continues for three reasons:

One, testing tells the public that Maui is concerned about the water quality and is doing something productive about it. Second, our data analysis has the ability to pinpoint problems of sediment, nutrient runoff, and temperature changes so vital to the existence of reef ecosystem. Third, the climate is changing and the testing we are doing is being done in real time with these changes so as to identify problems that may benefit with intervention.

Funding will also support:

Our oyster farming project to improve water quality in Ma'alaea Bay. Oysters can filter up to 50 gallons of sea water a day. Water filtration by oysters has shown remarkable success in clarifying bays in other sites.

A monthly lecture series that educates the community on the projects designed to improve Maui inshore waters. Storm water runoff management.

Think of Maui without its healthy in shore waters, vibrant reefs and diverse sea life. Will tourists continue to visit Maui in the numbers we have come to expect if we fail to protect our waters? Please continue to fund the Maui Nui Marine Resource Council in the 2021 budget. The work being done is important for maintaining and improving the health of our inshore waters.

Aloha committee members,

My name is Rod Antone and I am the Executive Director of the Maui Hotel & Lodging Association, having just coming on board last October, and am a paid lobbyist registered with the county and state.

First of all I would like to thank the council for the time and energy that you are all spending to come up with a balanced county budget. It is a grueling process consisting of long hours and we all appreciate your sacrifice.

Today I am here to testify that Mayor Victorino's proposed funds for the Maui Visitors Bureau remain with MVB for a number of reasons.

The main reason is that since the mid March the state Department of Labor and Industrial Relations reports that 29,536 people in Maui County filed new claims for unemployment insurance. Many of those folks work in the visitor industry.

Right now we have skeleton crews working at our hotels and resorts, mostly consisting of security and maintenance workers for example. For example the Hyatt Resort and Spa in Kaanapali had 700 associates working for them. Now they have 30. It's the same at most properties.

So despite what you might have heard from those testifying last week our local residents who work in the tourism industry are NOT going to be "fine" after this. Hotel management estimates when they are able to open up again they are likely looking at 20 to 30 percent occupancy. Lower occupancy means bringing back a smaller workforce. It's as simple as that.

And even when the state says Hawaii is clear of COVID-19 risks and we can open up the market again, we still need to make sure that the visitors coming from whatever state or country they're coming from, we need to make sure they're COVID-19 free as well. It's going to be a long process, especially if we don't have MVB to help us because they are lacking the funding to help us get the word out.

I've heard someone say that why do we need marketing? We've got tourists coming to Maui still and we aren't advertising.

Yes, according to the ag forms the tourists fill out, we about one to five tourists coming to Maui every week, listing that they're either staying at a friends house or an Airbnb.

I don't know about you but if these tourists aren't smart enough to stay home during a global pandemic then they're not the kind of tourists I want on our island.

And that's the second thing I want to bring up, that not only will MVB play a big role in marketing destination Maui again so we can get our workers back on the job faster, but that we also we have a real opportunity here to better manage tourism in Maui County. In fact before this whole pandemic took place that's exactly what we were putting into action about as members of the Mayor's Tourism Task Force.

All the world knows out there is that Maui is No Ka Oi. We're the best island, we've got the best beaches, we're the only island with Komoda's and guri guri,, etc.

Right now, we have a chance right now to set some ground rules, and make sure that the visitors who come to Maui are No Ka Oi as well. Because the easiest time to rebuild something is after it has been torn down, and right now the visitor industry on Maui has been obliterated.

Before all this the task force was already working on a list of tourist rules and guidelines that we had planned either to get into hotel rooms, or on a video at the airport or maybe even as an online document they receive after they book a reservation. The list included rules such as

- Obey traffic laws and not stop in the middle of Hana Highway to take a picture of waterfalls
- Respect local fishermen and divers who are feeding their ohana with their catch
- Know that our beach parks are well used and if trash is piled up then bring a trash bag and take it with you, the hotels can help you dispose of it
- Realize that "KAPU" means "keep out" and "no trespassing" and if you see a sign like that while you are hiking stay out of the area or turn around

Besides respect there are safety issues as well such as:

- Never turn your back on the ocean
- Make sure you have a fully charged cell phone, water and proper clothing while hiking
- Always swim with a buddy
- Know which beaches have lifeguards
- Don't try to drive the back road to Hana and maybe turn around at Kahakuloa as well

There's much more but you get the idea. It's the best time to change our messaging is when we are building the industry back up again and again, we will need MVB to be able to get our new message out, to better manage tourism.

The third thing I want to bring up is sustainable agriculture. We live on an island and we should be self sufficient. But before we take millions of dollars away from an organization is there a plan?

Who are we giving these farming funds to? Is it the farmers who grow the food or their brokers too who sell the food? Who can qualify for the funds? Small farmers? The big operations? Will there be criteria set in some sort of tiered system? Do we make special considerations for folks like Watanabe Farms who are a big operation but they supply the schools with produce so maybe they should get funding too. What about livestock farmers? Do farmers need to prove that 100 percent of their income comes from farming or can part-time farmers qualify as well?

I'm all for a diversified economy and the hotel industry will be the first ones standing in line for locally grown products, and in fact are their best customers right now. Farms are giving produce away because the hotels and restaurants can't buy them anymore. It's happening all over the nation, produce sitting out in the sun and rotting and milk being poured down the drain.

In any case when the ag plan is ready to go the hotels stand ready to be a part of it. But right now I think we need to concentrate on getting workers back to their jobs first.

I've learned a lot about the people in the visitor industry these last couple of months and many of them want to help the community because they are the community. They don't like to brag about it which frustrates me because people should know what they're doing. They give year round to Hale A Ke Ola, Feed My Sheep, the Food Bank, etc, etc. The give hotel rooms away for fundraisers and feed fire fighters battling brush fires, they opened their ballrooms during that really big brushfire in Lahaina several years ago and let displaced residents stay overnight.

This industry has been a friend to this community for decades and even though they're hurting right now they are still giving. They're giving toilet paper and masks and rollaway beds to the hospital and the Department of Health, they're giving away thousands of dollars of produce, truckloads of towels, sheets, blankets, pillows and other linen supplies as requested.

The whole industry is based upon hospitality, not to just guests but their workers and community. All they asking right now is that you allow MVB to help them get their people working again.

Mahalo for your consideration of input from the community during these very uncertain times regarding the Maui County Budget. I have been employed by the visitor's industry since my wife and I moved to Maui in 2003. I have worked for Kaanapali Beach Hotel and various activity providers over those years. I have been blessed to serve on past marketing committees for MVCB, HTA Oceania, HTA Canada and HTA Europe. Through my experiences, I have been able to see how tenuous the visitor industry can be over the years, the fierce world wide competition and the importance of working together.

On August 8, 2008, I was laid off from Kapalua Resort at the peak of the Financial crisis and it was the same day my wife and I signed our mortgage on our first home. Fortunately, I was able to secure a \$10/hr retail position at Ulupalakua Ranch Store. The visitor industry really wasn't hiring and the overall economy was very sluggish. It was one of the scariest times in my life (pre-COVID-19). Then the industry became healthier and I was able to secure a salaried position. This experience still haunts my memory and I don't wish this on any of my fellow residents.

Will the visitor industry come back without Maui County financial support of MVCB? It depends on your definition of 'come back' and your strategic metrics. The goal of sustainable tourism is very important to us all and making sure we are attracting the right visitor to our home. It is important to know that MVCB isn't just an advertising agency for Maui County. They work hard to find the right customer, educate them on how to treat/respect our aina and culture and also ensure the visitor experience is a positive one. We need to make sure Maui County remains the place we love and that includes strategically supporting our number one industry especially during this time of need.

The amount of direct jobs and secondary jobs supported by this vital industry is very significant. The tax revenue provided by our industry is also significant. Taking money away from reviving the primary economic driver of our island is difficult to comprehend. Once we get the visitor industry off life support and walking again it will pump necessary economic activity throughout the County.

Please help me bring back my furloughed co-workers at KBH and allow them and many others to return to work with the confidence that Maui County has their back.

Aloha Chair Alice Lee, Maui County Council Members, and the Economic Development and Budget Committee,

My name is Sam Spurrier, I am a resident of Kihei, a husband, a father of 4, and I enjoy volunteering within my church, community, and mentoring students. I was born and raised on the Island of Oahu and have been in the hospitality industry for the last 14 years, with 9 of them here in Maui. Currently, I am the Director of Sales at the Wailea Beach Resort and it is a privilege to share testimony on behalf of the Resort and the tourism industry as it relates to the proposed decrease in MVB funding.

Maui is fortunate to have a best in brand position. Although, we have learned that we are not immune to travel perceptions. Just in 2018, we experienced the impact to our islands from the volcano, Hurricane Lane, and Tropical Storm Olivia.

It wasn't many years ago in 2008 when the visitor industry suffered a significant hit which took years to recover. I particularly remember this time as I was finishing college and seeking a career in hospitality. There weren't many opportunities due to the hiring freezes. Today, we find ourselves in unique and interesting times which I believe all will agree are and have the potential to become much more of a challenging and longer recovery than 2008 and even 9-11. As we are experiencing now, majority and almost all of the Hotels are closed or have temporarily suspended operations and were forced to furlough or temporarily lay-off many employees. In addition, the restaurant business who were also forced to close and lay-off their workers. The tourism industry has halted here in Maui. We need to think about RECOVERY and be very cognizant of where and how funds are allocated.

I oppose the proposal to cut and/or reduce any funding for the Maui Visitors Bureau Marketing. I strongly support MVB funding at the 2019 level. Personally, I feel that there are a lot of areas, sectors, etc. that could benefit from the funds. However, we have a responsibility to our people and our residents who make Maui home and many of whom work in the hospitality industry. This is not only about marketing Maui worldwide as a top tourist destination. Rather, this is about employing our residents so that they can support their families and in turn infuse the local economy.

Visitors are yearning to hear the word Maui and Aloha. It is our people, our residents that work in the Hospitality industry, their friends and families, and all of our Maui residents that make this place so special as they represent the Aloha Spirit. Most importantly, it is the ability to employ all of these residents in the Tourism industry!

The Hawaii Visitors and Convention Bureau produced this beautiful video that represents "A message from the people of Hawaii." I feel it very important to include it as a part of this written testimony as the decision to cut and/or reduce MVB funding will have a direct and adverse impact on our residents and especially those and their families that work and rely on the hospitality industry. It will affect each individual and their 'Ohanas as it will delay their return to work and have many other adverse impacts above and beyond just financially.



There are many elements to recovery, but it will be vitally important to have marketing in place and funding once government restrictions have lifted and airline flights to the island resume.

Our hotel occupancy has remained flat for the past 6 years with our number of full-time employees growing by nearly 100 or 20%. This growth came after ownership made a significant multimillion-dollar investment in the resort. Now, we are working through these times in partnership with Marriott International and our Ownership Group to resume operations at the Resort as soon as possible and get our associates back to work. In order to get them back to work, there needs to be demand generation and more than before during this time. MVB marketing is effective and has proven successful over the years as they market our people, our culture, and the place of Maui to each and every visitor.

As we all know, the visitor industry supports many ancillary businesses from construction jobs to restaurants and more. 80% of the dollars made through hotels stays within the island to support businesses, home purchases, and other taxes.

For all the reasons mentioned today, we ask that you carefully consider your recommended cut and/or reductions to the Maui Visitors Bureau so that our industry continues to sustain a thriving community. Mahalo for your time and consideration!

Aloha kākou,

Please allow me to expressly offer my sincere and earnest support of the MVB and, more particularly, the funding necessary to maintain their essential and critical function in our community. I have been a Hospitality Professional working domestically and internationally for over 30 years. During these past 9 years, it has been a blessing to plant strong roots and call Maui (and Fairmont Kea Lani) my home. I only mentioned this tenure as relative to my overall experience with regards to hospitality (and destination) marketing, as well as my personal ties to this particular island community.

A Visitors Bureau, in any community, is essential to promoting a healthy tourism economy. It's no wonder that Cvent, a leading SAAS service for meeting planners, lists over 400 bureaus in the United States alone. And as far as competition for business into Hawaii, as an example, there are another 84 bureaus listed in the Caribbean and nearly 1400 in Europe! Every bureau is tasked with similar mandates: Promote tourism through marketing strategies; Provide Convention and Conference Meeting planning and support; Provide visitors with information (including such things as Responsible Tourism). These are essential and necessary activities to keep our own economy (whose "primary source of income is the visitor sector", as noted by the DBEDT) both strong and vibrant.

As such, we must ensure that our island stays relevant and highly visible in the global marketplace. It is both shortsighted and arrogant to believe having done such a great job so far — as exemplified by outstanding hotel occupancies and strong visitor arrival stats — that we no longer need to continue with a proven-successful marketing momentum. That would be like telling a competitive racecar driver to strive to get to top speed and then just take their foot off the gas. If we were to let up now, *especially now*, we will lose our momentum and simply coast while getting passed by other destinations who most certainly are doing the opposite (by investing in their futures).

I can completely appreciate the desire to provide enhanced financial support to any number of various worthwhile industries, including Sustainable Agriculture. But doing so at the expense of an industry that provides over \$2B to the State in tax revenue (over \$20M generated from Maui Nui TAT), as well as tens of thousands of local jobs (16% of which are Native Hawaiian, as stated in an April 2017 DBEDT report) is irresponsible. Prior to COVID-19, Hawaii proudly boasted one of the lowest unemployment rates in the country (2.6%)—now, with Tourism shut-down, we are amongst the highest (projected to soar to 25%). You to do the math. When safe and able, we need to get everyone back to work and that means ensuring a strong Tourism industry...supported by the vital efforts of our Visitor Bureau.

From a purely personal perspective, I rely 100% on tourism to sustain my life here on Maui. This is where I proudly own a home; where I adopted Maka (my furry friend); where I serve on the Board of a local Canoe Club; where I give back as a volunteer in the community. Please, do not take away the very thing that allows me to continue to be a productive member of this island 'ohana.



Aloha Council members:

My name is Brian DiMartino and I am president of 21st Century Group - a 25-year old, Maui based hotel site selection company. I am motivated to provide testimony because today I had to furlough (for the first time) an employee who had been with us since the beginning.

What our company does is assist various organizations confirm accommodations for meetings, conventions and corporate travel incentives. The lead time for these events is generally one -two years although bigger groups may plan five or more years into the future.

We had been working with one such group since 2014. They were scheduled to arrive in Wailea for their annual conference on Saturday, March 14 this year with 2800 people in attendance utilizing six properties in the Wailea area. Unfortunately, a national emergency regarding the corona virus was declared on March 13 and the organizers decided they had no choice but to cancel the convention — which they did — the day before all of these people were scheduled to arrive. The unfortunate result of this one cancellation (and there were many more) was approximately \$10 million in revenue to Maui's hotels, restaurants, shops, activities, rental car companies and the like. In addition, the taxes that would go to various state and county entities were lost.

The group mentioned has been coming to Maui every five years since the early 90's. The reason they continue to come is because of the perceived value the Maui brand delivers to visitors. They don't mind paying the highest rates in the country because they have always gotten a quality experience in terms of product and services. These rates allow hotels to collectively lower staff/guest ratios to a point unseen in most destinations. For example, instead of 1/5 ratio Maui hotels might offer a 1/3 ratio thus providing a more pleasing experience to the guests, more jobs to our community and more tax dollars to our government agencies.

I bring this up because of the ongoing discussions about MVB funding. Frankly, I am surprised that a discussion like this would be taking place at such a critical time to our primary industry. Our economic driver is completely shut down and the majority of events that have been cancelled will not be re-scheduled. They may or may not re-book when

times permit. However, that lead time still remains. Groups will soon start looking towards 2022 and 2023. The group mentioned above is now considering a return in 2026 and the dollars lost from this year's convention are simply gone.

What all of this means is that when tourism resumes the leisure traveler is going to be more important than ever and it is safe bet that it will likely be a slow return. The high spending leisure traveler in particular is going to be sought after. The competition from other destinations will be tough. Consequently, it remains critical that our brand remains top of mind. While it is true that we can assume various hotels, airlines and tour companies will come up with all kinds of offers to get people to return to our island, they will only be promoting "offers" and not the Maui brand. Only MVB can do it and they have done it exceedingly well for a very long time. HVCB has different objectives and while Maui benefits from some of them, they are no substitute for MVB efforts and they shouldn't be construed as such. Plus, we have no idea what HVCB or HTA funding is going to look like in the next budget year with all of the issues the state is currently facing.

I have personally been involved in Maui's tourism industry for over 30 years. I was the opening director of sales and marketing at Grand Wailea (when it was a Hyatt) and years later I served in the same capacity at Honua Kai in Kaanapali. I am familiar with all aspects of our tourism industry and the issues that come with it. I have lived on Maui for the entire 30 years and have experienced first- hand the growth that troubles so many of our residents. I share many of the same concerns and believe that once this crisis abates some of the pressure points ultimately will be relieved — particularly as it relates to housing. The regulations coming to the nitely vacation rental market will turn many of those rentals back into long term rentals and they should become more affordable for the local market.

I am writing to support, at a minimum the budget request of \$30,000 for Common Ground Collective to continue to do their "foster farm" program This program harvests fruit from Maui orchards and gardens that are not being actively farmed but that are still producing food that falls and rots. They pick this up and take it to Maui's food banks.

However, I would encourage you to go beyond this and provide them with an additional \$100,000 to bring back the **home garden installation program** that they piloted in 2017 but were not able to get funding for. Now that we are more aware of how fragile our food supply is, we are beyond time to move on a more extreem form of diversification and self-reliance.

Low Cost and Complimentary Ironically this is a much lower cost approach than many others that are being employed in the state while being complimentary to other low-cost strategies such as the new Maui Food Hub & CSA programs that receive and distribute food food from both back yard and larger operations using underutiled resources. Helping people grow food where they are is a historic and proven strategy that many of our parents and grand parents know well. Today with a days worth of help at the start and connection to the networks of resources supporting home gardens this is much more viable than it was in recent years.

Three Years Track Record - Common Ground Collective is a young team that has been working on their approach towards food security for over three years. I have been impressed with the quality of their work and their ability to track performance metrics — which has been lacking with other efforts that I have seen.

My own background is as a small business consultant who has worked with a wide range of small businesses including farms, value added-producers, technology developers and non-profit community service providers. We have a small back-yard garden that our late son developed while he was working as an apprenctice for a small garden installation service here on Maui eight years ago. This service struggled to make it as a business. A non-profit approach would work today and there are many who will support it – especially if an entity like the County shows its support.

Aloha Council Chair and Directors,

Aloha and mahalo to the Council for giving me the opportunity to provide personal testimony regarding the Maui Visitors Bureau budget.

As a 25+ years Hawaii visitor/hospitality industry veteran, I have had the opportunity to work in resorts, destination management, airport, transportation, the visitors bureau, my own small business, and attractions such as my current employer, Maui Ocean Center. Maui Ocean Center's market thrives on over approximately 90% visitors who turn to us for not just an activity, but to connect with our endemic underwater marine life in our care and for more in depth Hawaiian cultural experiences. Visitor revenue helps fund our Maui marine and environmental research, caring for our marine life, and provide community education both on site and through various outreach programs. All of this in support of our own islands future generations. Due to COVID-19, we have had to furlough or lay off the majority of our employees, many of them who live paycheck to paycheck and are struggling like many others to survive during this crisis.

If there is one thing that I have learnt over the years regarding marketing - it is not the journey to the #1 destination position that is the most challenging, but maintaining that position. That means being proactive and a step ahead of your competition. You have to work even harder and smarter, be ahead of the game, more creative and collaborative, and apply new campaign initiatives that truly touch the values and post COVID-19 sentiment of our Maui nui demographic. Never have we experienced such a crisis and we should not reduce marketing dollars when we are experiencing the biggest negative economic impact in history.

Visitor-related organizations are trying to keep on top of mind with visitors during this crisis, and it will take a village, including the County of Maui, to bring them back. Post crisis, the destination competition will increase dramatically as other island destinations will be on our coattails for that desired top travel destination position to maximize visitation revenue. In order to be in one of the premier destinations, it takes marketing dollars. I have heard many people share that little to no marketing Maui nui dollars are needed. If the marketing budget is cut, we will all need to be ready to feel those repercussions, and potentially the negative impact on our economy. We can't find monies after the fact. It then becomes the topic for the following annual budget and by that time, even more money will be needed to bring us out of a difficult position.

State dollars support Hawai'l as a destination with individual island allowances (as far as I am aware). We don't only compete as a State destination, but between our own islands. Certainly digital and traditional advertising is imperative, however Maui nui has made face to face impressions with our major market areas and feeder cities, where they have extended aloha spirit and had opportunity to tip destination selection our way.

What we have is authenticity – our innate care of people through the spirit of aloha, and our unique cultural and natural environment. We must strive to balance our Maui nui visitor marketing and island agriculture budget allocations for our Maui nui's sustainable future.

I am a four-year documenter of the FIRST Robotics Competition team 2443, also known as Blue Thunder. Throughout the years, MEDB has supported this team financially. During our FRC season, MEDB's funding has allowed us to pay for competition and robot shipping fees, travel, transportation, and lodging. Because of this, our team can attend one regional competition in California and our home regional on Oahu annually. We were ever so fortunate enough last year to also participate in the Houston World Championships. These competitions are an essential part of the FRC experience. At regionals, members can interact with peers from all over the world who have the same love and passion for STEM.

Using our FRC successes, Blue Thunder can appeal to potential new members at our feeder schools. By showing them all the new things we do in robotics, they can decide if they would like to stay with STEM. Skills they learn include but are not limited to, learning the coding language JAVA, how to wire a robot, how to use basic machinery, public speaking, and graphic design. Whether they follow through to the STEM field or take on a different path, our members are set with life skills to excel in any occupation.

MEDB provides a separate grant specifically for VEX. 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Aloha and good morning.

Yesterday I learned that you are considering a decrease and potential removal of funding for the Maui Visitors Bureau. While I understand the reasons listed for this action, I would encourage you to not only consider keeping the full amount, but also thoroughly evaluate increasing their funds as Maui needs the support now more than ever.

While the data reviewed in the Commission's report may have been relevant at the time, we must take into account how much the world has shifted since then and that we are now embarking into the unknown. There is no blueprint to follow for tourism's recovery from this global pandemic and now is not the time to cut funding for an entity whose sole purpose is to promote our island destination and drive tourism to our island — and thus getting our hospitality industry back to work. We must be diligent in our approach and focus on the long-term future to ensure do not risk the livelihood of our hospitality workers and thus the health of our economy.

While it is true that Maui is a "well-known" destination, this is due in large part to the success of MVB's marketing and public relations efforts, and now more than ever, it will be imperative that these campaigns continue. As recovery begins our island will be competing with global destinations all fighting for the same tourism dollars to infuse back into their economy. MVB will need to be aggressive in marketing to differentiate from other destinations like Mexico and the Caribbean that are closer to the mainland and typically much less expensive than Maui.

To lessen or completely deplete these marketing efforts now will put Maui at a severe disadvantage when tourism demand returns. It is important now to remain consistent and top of mind in our messaging while people have the time to consume it and daydream of where they will spend their next vacation. If MVB marketing efforts go dark now, this will allow other destinations to be in a position to take that valuable marketshare from us, putting Maui severely behind the recovery curve. By maintaining our strong branding and messaging, we will be much better positioned to recover once demand returns – thus getting all of us back to work more quickly.

In fact, now is the perfect time to build on the momentum from our Kuleana campaign so that when visitors do return, they are more educated and aware. We can benefit from these campaigns and show how Maui will be waiting to welcome travelers back with the spirit of aloha for which we are known. As I'm sure you've seen many big brands are pivoting their advertising messages to those of support and hope for the future. Through MVB, we can do the same and encourage travelers to dream now and visit later.

As we are all aware, there is no drive market for our destination. If not marketed or managed properly, this can put Maui at a severe disadvantage as states and counties begin reopening and non-essential travel resumes. Travelers may still be hesitant to jump on a plane when they have destination locations within driving range as an alternative in the short-term. As we look ahead ad plan for the future, we must be realistic in our understanding that travelers may be wary of flying until a vaccine or treatment for COVID-19 is discovered. And with Cruise ship operations ceasing, our local businesses will need to recoup that lost revenue through visitors that are willing to fly to visit our island before a vaccine or treatment is widely available.

It is important to remember that MVB is also vital to the signature events hosted island-wide. Kapalua and Wailea are home to six of those signature events that would not be possible without MVBs support.

These events not only provide millions of dollars in revenue and global visibility for our island, but they also generate significant financial support to many of Maui's non-profit organizations.

As the owner representative for our two hotels on the island of Maui and the largest private employer on the island, I have the responsibility to get our team members back to work as soon as possible for their families and our community. It could take 18 months for a vaccine or treatment to be developed for COVID-19 to make people feel safe to fly again. We cannot wait that long to get back to work so I feel it is imperative to keep if not increase MVB's funding so that we are in a better position to recover quickly. I appreciate your time to consider my testimony and please remember that your support will not only help us get our doors back open again but will get our employees back to work and contributing to our local economy to the benefit of us all.

I hope that we can count on your support to make the right decision to keep the tourism industry strong on our great island and to fund the MVB at the 3.5m level.
