This project could potentially do irreparable harm to Olowalu's pristine reef. As seen in developed areas like Ka'anapali and Lahaina town and Kihei, reef health diminished at a staggering rate leaving behind barren reef incapable of supporting life. My family and I depend on healthy reefs to support and nourish our Ohana, but the continual depletion and degradation of our ocean water quality have lead to a shortage of food and the impoverished reef leave little to no beauty for snorkelers alike. You can ask Kupuna (elders) who were here before development and have seen these areas morph into what it is now and they explain over and over again how fish and wildlife have disappeared. History tends to repeat itself, and in an area like olowalu, it is a history that our Hawaiian people cannot afford to be repeated. Bypassing critical environmental review, in a sensitive area like Olowalu, would be irresponsible and careless action by the maui county. My name is Lipoa Kahaleuahi and I oppose the Lihau'ula 201H Fast-Track Affordable Housing Project. There is very little that is affordable about this project, and rather will cause extremely environmental degradation as well as long term economic issues if passed.

Olowalu is one of the last remaining, mostly intact coastal reef ecosystems left on Maui. Since the pandemic and the decrease in traffic to these areas, there has been a recognizable increase in visibility and natural resource activity to this area. However, sewage from 59 independent waste systems will present a significant threat to the coastal water quality of the area, which remains a place for recreation for locals and visitors alike, as well as a gathering ground of food. Increased runoff from this area of concentrated urban development will also result in increased sediment and other pollutant transport to the nearshore waters of Olowalu. The application blatantly does not address the cultural practices that occur there, which raises more alarm for the necessity of a thorough EIS.

In the long term, these environmental issues will result in impacts to our economy, as continued infrastructure that could have been avoided would be necessary to deal with the waste, the lack of food sources, as well as cultural and traditional impacts made by yet another gathering place being contaminated by the excess already described above.

Despite what we may believe our county needs in the short term to outweigh the economic effects brought on by the coronavirus pandemic, one of the biggest lessons we should be learning is that our solutions should have a more long-term vision and goal. The highest point of this proposed development is only 25' above sea level and just a few hundred yards from the coastline. Aloha Chair Kama:

I write to you in support of affordable housing on Maui. And in this case, affordable housing in Olowalu.

I understand and can relate to the many arguments both for and against housing in Olowalu. Many of the same arguments for and against this project are consistent with developments throughout the larger Maui community. But please allow me to share two simple beliefs that I value, both which support local housing opportunities in Olowalu.

First, local families deserve to live in beautiful areas. We have the technology and capabilities with modern development practices to minimize adverse impacts to the natural environment. Utilizing modern development methods (ie stormwater management, drainage retention, water use conservation, etc.) we can dramatically reduce negative impacts that have historically plagued earlier developments. There is great potential to educate and ingrain in future residents the importance of living in daily balance with the natural environment and protecting the natural resources that surround us. Requiring developers to build responsible, efficient, modern projects will allow local families the opportunity to live and coexist responsibly in our most cherished natural environments.

Second, in this day and age, lack of infrastructure is a terrible reason to vote down proposed developments. Anywhere on this Island. One of the main reasons for voting against projects in Olowalu is proximity to existing infrastructure. Let's take wastewater as an example. The justification is to keep West Maui development centralized to existing facilities like the West Maui Wastewater Treatment Plant, where we have a serious issue with injection wells and an inability to adequately handle excess effluent. Why force projects to connect to an antiquated system when you can require developers to implement modern, self-contained treatment units that are capable of recycling nearly 100% of wastewater? This is a far better option than adding more sewage to an already overburdened system. Lack of infrastructure is not an excuse to vote down a project when newer, more efficient infrastructure systems can be implemented.

My name is Lauren Palakiko, born and raised in Lahaina. I am passionate about the life and health of our land and ocean.

From what I've seen about the proposed Lihau'ula development, nothing is in compliance with the law, and the developer doesn't seem to make any effort to address and correct this.

The developer is exceeding the 50 single family lot maximum. Even if these lots were all the same size, they are still less than half of the required one acre or greater maximum.

What are the wastewater treatment plans? I do not believe there are any in place. If septic drain fields are in the plans, how can they guarantee the leach fields will not affect the river and ocean? Olowalu has been deemed Maui's "crown jewel" and honored as Hawai'i's first "hope spot" as it's 1,000 acre coral reef houses 430 manta rays, the largest known population in the US. Olowalu "sustains an amazing diversity of rare and unique coral species and acts as a nursery to replenish and populate the reefs of Maui, Molokai and Lanai". (https://mission-blue.org/2017/08/olowalu-reef-is-announced-as-the-first-hawaiian-hope-spot/). Honorable Members of the Affordable Housing Committee:

Once again the people of West Maui find ourselves confronting another unwanted 201-H project seeking approval from 5 of 9 members of the Maui County Council in order to bypass the expressed wishes of the

West Maui community, the West Maui Community plan, the recently revised draft West Maui Community Plan and the basic tenants of "smart growth" that the planning department is trying to instill.

We absolutely need "true, affordable housing" in West Maui and lands are available in the Lahaina area, some of which Peter Martin owns, that would meet the criteria of "smart growth." By building next to existing infrastructure, not only do you preserve agriculture land and open space and avoid unnecessary threats to our precious Olowalu reef, but you build a walkable community, where residents have easy access to schools, work and supplies, without the high cost of a car and exacerbating traffic. You also avoid the need for costly private water treatment systems (ATUs), which rapidly turn into septic systems when owners choose to no longer pay the \$400/year maintenance fee or when they shut off the air pump to save electricity costs. Forty new septic systems a few hundred yards uphill of the reef is irresponsible.

Affordable housing is also about affordable living. There is nothing affordable about living in Olowalu and the need to drive everywhere, especially when 70% of the homes proposed will be over \$600K and applicants will need to show income greater than \$100K to qualify. The 201-H format allows for properties to be sold at market value after 10 years, which completely defeats the purpose of getting ahead of our affordable housing needs.

Since the last time an Olowalu high density project was debated and denied, nothing about this project addresses any of the concerns to protect the adjacent reef, access affordable, healthy, local food, limited water, excessive traffic and the cost of living for low income families.

We rely on our elected County Council to honor the wishes of the community, which has been loud and clear, that they do not want high density development in Olowalu. In fact, the new draft plan prepared by the CPAC explicitly restricts 201-H projects in this area. Agriculture is a perfectly acceptable use for lands in urban growth designated areas as expressed by the Maui Planning Department.

I ask that you request the developer resubmit a project that meets the criteria of "smart growth" and strive to meet the criteria of "regenerative growth" to help restore natural habitat, ecosystem functions, add clean energy, net positive water, natural and inexpensive wastewater systems, use of non-toxic materials, landfill diversion of waste, local sourcing of materials, and addressing the health and equity of the residents and surrounding community. A developer should strive to meet all of these criteria for a net positive impact on both the environment and the people. This is being done across the country and across the globe through frameworks like Living Buildings (https://living-future.org/lbc-3 1/basics/) and doing them at the same cost of regular development. The proposed project has made little to no effort to meet any of these criteria.

The days of "minimizing impact" are over. We absolutely need to demand more from landowners and developers to apply the new mindset that is sweeping this country, one that is restorative, with an overall "net-positive" impact. All we need to do is emulate what others are already doing and we need our leadership to incentivize those standards.

Please do the right thing and deny this project and demand that developers do better to meet our affordable housing needs with frameworks that meet "smart growth" and "regenerative growth" principles.

My name is Nikoya Collier and I am requesting that you please vote no for the proposed Lihau'ula subdivision in Olowalu.

I went to the first informal meeting that was held by Peter Mortenson of WEST MAUI LAND, Kyle Ginoza and Lori Sablas. They advised that this subdivision would be for local MAUI residents and would fall into the affordable housing category similar to the homes built in Kahoma. They put an emphasis that they do not want to sell to any one from out of state or from the outter islands because this was going to be a subdivision for local Maui families who have generations on this mokupuni (island). They advertised that housing would start at \$400,000 and they would be selling about 19 quarter acre and full acre lots that ranged between \$250k - \$500K. With this new proposal, they have revamped the homes to now start at \$500k. The truth is that they are only allotting 2 homes at this starting price with about 70% of the housing to range between \$600k - \$1M. In today's economic climate, is this something that Maui people, 70% of which are laid off or furloughed, can afford? The answer is 'a'ole... NO!

In addition to the blatant lie that this is affordable, an environmental assessment must done. Olowalu is an environmentally sensitive area that is culturally rich in Hawaiian history. An environmental assessment cannot be bypassed as it would clearly show the following:

- 1. This project goes against West Maui's community plan and agricultural zoning.
- 2. It goes against the the premise of "smart growth" with already existing infrastructures to prevent sprawling, and fails to protect what is left of agricultural lands and open spaces.
- 3. Olowalu is one of the last, mostly intact constant reef colonies and ecosystems on Maui.
