My name is Charlie Palakiko, I farm kalo in Kaua'ula valley on my family's kuleana land. We are two valleys over from the proposed Olowalu development.

Since development in our Launiupoko neighborhood began, we've had nothing but a constant battle with the developer to supply us with sufficient water for our lo'i. From our experience, the developers have been negligent of our west side's ecosystem, allowing our native species such as 'o'opu and 'opae die off even after the resuscitation of those species in our streams by letting the river run dry for months at a time. I have attached pictures of our muliwai at Puamana from this past June. It is still dry to this day.

This is the same developer who is proposing the Lihau'ula project, I cannot fathom he's had a change of heart, to maximize profit over all forms of life and what is pono.



My name is Robert Nahooikaika and I am requesting that you please vote no for the proposed Lihau'ula subdivision in Olowalu.

This affordable housing project, whose proposal was revamped to now have homes start at \$500k, is not affordable for working class 'Obama. The truth is that they are only allotting 2 homes at this starting price with about 70% of the housing to range between \$600k - \$1M. In today's economic climate, is this something that Maui people, 70% of which are laid off or furloughed, can afford? Absolutely not. I am an essential worker and can barely afford this project if it started at \$400,000.

In addition to the blatant lie that this is affordable, an environmental assessment must done. Olowalu is an environmentally sensitive area that is culturally rich in Hawaiian history. An environmental assessment cannot be bypassed as it would clearly show the following:

- 1. This project goes against West Maui's community plan and agricultural zoning.
- 2. It goes against the the premise of "smart growth" with already existing infrastructures to prevent sprawling, and fails to protect what is left of agricultural lands and open spaces.
- 3. Olowalu is one of the last, mostly intact constant reef colonies and ecosystems on Maui.
- 4. Sewage from these new 59 dwellings will run off into the precious reef ecosystem which poses a threat to the coastal water and the quality of reef life. This will also increase the sediment and transportation pollution to the shores of Olowalu.

In addition, during the recent Community Plan Advisory Committee process, current landowners who purchased other property in Olowalu from this developer with the intent of farming stated not only is there insufficient water for agriculture, there isn't even enough potable water! My name is Amy Fonarow, I'm a science communicator who used to work as a marine naturalist at Maui Ocean Center, and I am testifying against the Lihau'ula development being proposed at Olowalu.

Corals that spawn there at Maui's "Mother Reef" don't just seed Olowalu, their planula drift and settle throughout Maui's west side, across the Au'au Channel to Lanai, and even all the way to Molokai. Corals in Hawaii grow about a centimeter per year, and parts of Olowalu's reef are estimated to be about 500 years old. Olowalu's reef is a precious resource that needs to be protected and cannot be replaced.

Developing just above this extensive reef system is likely to cause irreversible environmental impacts by adding polluting runoff that will smother the reef. Nearshore reefs need sunlight to live and grow, and sediment blocks that light, killing the reef. I realize that retention basins are planned for Lihau'ula, but storms are coming in stronger and waves are coming in higher, and the pollution mitigation that's currently planned doesn't seem sound enough.

Please consider such archipelago-wide impacts while mulling over this development, and say no to Lihau'ula.

The area of Oluwalu is also a sanctuary for marine life and developing that area could result in irreversible damage to Coral reef environments as a result of large-scale urban runoff.

3. Public safety

The area slated for development is in a well-known fire zone. Large wildfires have already consumed that sector on multiple occasions. Putting development in such an area places anyone living in that development an immediate danger of property destruction serious injury and or death. There is no hospital or emergency services close to the area slated for development. As such anyone living in that area has a higher risk of being in the aforementioned dangers without means of rescue.

4. Lack of economic viability

As we are in the middle of a pandemic there will be fewer individuals with the economic means to purchase any land or properties in the area proposed for development. As such any money invested in such a development would most likely fail to generate any revenue for the county of Maui or the state of Hawaii.

It is with hope that I ask for your consideration in delaying or canceling the development Oluwalu.

I am writing this email in opposition of the proposed Olowalu community. My main reason for writing in opposition is because there is no infrastructure for an Olowalu community.

As a woman born and raised on Maui, I remember childhood beach visits to Olowalu and stories my maternal grandmother told of growing up in Olowalu.

The landscape has changed greatly in the 30+ years since those visits. The environment itself does not and will not be able to support a community outside of that which already exists in Lahaina.

First, I have seen the shoreline erode with each passing year whenever we made the drive through to Lahaina. Low tide makes the reef itself visible. The ocean continually washes over the roads during high tide. The beach area itself is much narrower.

Other beaches have a public rest area with running water, where as Olowalu has never had that ability as there is no direct source of fresh water.

Second, there have also been times the coastal road to and from Central Maui leaves nowhere for travelers to allow emergency vehicles through.

I have been forced to sit in traffic if there are road closures of which prevent travel from Lahaina to Central Maui. I have witnessed emergency vehicles trying to press through and being unable to because of the traffic having little to no shoulder on the road.

I was one of many sitting in traffic during the fire that burned from Maalaea to Lahaina. The fire could not be contained by MFD as there is no water source for them to access between those towns.

Third, there is no hospital in either Lahaina or Olowalu. Any medical emergencies have to be redirected to Central Maui and are impacted if there are road closures.

Do not allow this planned community to reach fruition without an absolutely thorough evaluation of infrastructure. Viable infrastructure must be created and supported before any plans can be made. I have already watched a good majority of Maui fall to the hands of development before infrastructure.

Many homes in existing Maui Lani communities are uninhabited. They are also unaffordable for most of our residents, whether Hawaii born or not. Those homes are proof that there is no affordable housing in Maui County.



Aloha,

I am opposed to the Lihau'ula 201H fast-track affordable housing project. My main concern is that this fast track process will allow for the EA/EIS process to be waived, avoiding important environmental review. No development this close to the coast, within such a unique and important area should be allowed to skip such a review. The only reason a development would ever have to want to waive the review is to avoid compliance with the requirements that would inevitably come from such a review. The lack of accountability to the condition of the land by developers has been a major environmental problem on Maui for too long.

There are so many other concerns with the Lihau'ula 201H project. The environmental impact of the 59 proposed independent wastewater systems will be measurable and adverse. The increased runoff from this area of concentrated urban development will result in increased sediment and other pollutants transported to the nearshore waters of Olowalu. There has been increasing severity and frequency of storm events, which has shown that requiring the increase in runoff from the 50-year 1-hour storm event is not adequate for such a massive change in the drainage characteristics of the land. The highest point of this proposed development is only 25' above sea level and just a few hundred yards from the coastline. Heavy runoff will result in almost direct transport of polluted runoff into the ocean.

On top of the obvious environmental impacts the adverse cultural impacts are numerous. There will be increased shoreline user conflicts and significant increase of the harvest of coastal resources for recreational purposes. It is truly troubling that the application does not acknowledge cultural practice such as fishing; the gathering of 'opihi, pipipi and limu; and the gathering of pu'ohe'ohe and 'uki'uki.

It is important to remember that this landowner was denied approval by the Land Use Commission(LUC) in 2015 trying to change 320 acres of this very same agriculture land to urban/rural and now seeks to circumvent the process by "parceling" project starting with these proposed 59 lots on 27 acres. "The parcelization of the project site also raises questions as to the development plans for the surrounding lands and whether they too will be sized just under the 15-acre statutory threshold in future applications to avoid LUC scrutiny"

There are concerns about the number of exemptions requested, how do these exemptions serve to protect the existing offshore resources? The LUC also requested an assessment of the existing emergency management facilities in the area and wonder how they will demonstrate that the farm dwellings will comply with HRS 205-2 and 205-4.5 stating that agricultural activities associated with farm dwellings must be actively and intensively pursued rather than represent a secondary and passive hobby on the part of the homeowner.

With all these reasons to oppose this project it is difficult to imagine a reason to be supportive of it. The fact that it would be completed under the guise of being "affordable" is the hardest to believe. The majority of recent "affordable" homes prices are not affordable and are out of reach for our residents.
