BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

2 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawai`i's minimum wage should be increased to meet workers' basic needs. According to 3 the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism, a 4 5 single adult required an income of \$35,143 to achieve selfsufficiency in Hawai`i in 2018, while a single parent with one 6 child required \$59,428. Yet at the current statewide minimum wage 7 8 rate of \$10.10 per hour, a full-time employee earns only \$21,008 annually. Moreover, the National Low Income Housing Coalition's 9 Out of Reach 2018 report estimates that a minimum wage worker would 10 have to work 109 hours per week to afford a one-bedroom rental 11 home at local fair market rent. 12

The legislature further finds that increasing the State's 13 minimum wage will help Hawai`i's economy by giving low wage workers 14 greater purchasing power in Hawai`i's marketplace. Additionally, 15 16 according to the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, in 17 2018 and the following four consecutive years of minimum wage increases, the State's unemployment level reached an all-time low 18

The adjusted hourly minimum wage rate shall be calculated to the 15 nearest five cents using the most recent Self-Sufficiency Income 16 Standard for One Adult in the State of Hawai`i as determined by 17 the Hawai`i Department of Business, Economic Development and 18 Tourism in accordance with Section 201-3(5); provided that if in 19 any year the adjustment based on the Self-Sufficiency Income 20 Standard for One Adult in the State of Hawai`i would result in a 21 22 lower hourly minimum wage rate, the adjusted hourly minimum wage 23 rate shall remain the same as the hourly minimum wage rate in

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effect for the year in which it is calculated. Each adjusted 1 hourly minimum wage rate calculated under this subsection shall 2 take effect on July 1 of the calendar year in which the adjusted 3 hourly minimum wage rate is calculated; provided that if an 4 increase in the adjusted hourly minimum wage rate exceeds ten per 5 cent of the hourly minimum wage rate in effect for the year in 6 which it is calculated, the adjusted hourly minimum wage rate shall 7 be increased by ten per cent of the hourly minimum wage rate in 8 effect for the year in which it is calculated." 9

SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

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[The hourly wage of a tipped employee may be deemed 1 (b) 2 to be increased on account of tips if the employee is paid not 3 less than: 4 5 ------(2) 50 cents per hour beginning-January 1, 2015; and (3) 75 cents per hour-beginning-January-1, 2016, 6 7 below the applicable minimum wage by the employee's employer 8 and the combined amount the employee receives from the employee's employer and in tips is at least 50 cents more than the applicable 9 10 minimum wage; provided that beginning January 1, 2015, the combined amount the employee receives from the employee's employer and in 11 12 tips is at least \$7.00 more than the applicable minimum wage.] 13 Beginning on January 1, 2026, and each January 1 thereafter, the State shall establish an adjusted hourly minimum wage rate. 14 The adjusted hourly minimum wage rate shall be calculated to the 15 16 nearest five cents using the most recent Self-Sufficiency Income Standard for One Adult in the State of Hawai`i as determined by 17 18 the Hawai`i Department of Business, Economic Development and 19 Tourism in accordance with Section 201-3(5); provided that if in 20 any year the adjustment based on the Self-Sufficiency Income 21 Standard for One Adult in the State of Hawai`i would result in a 22 lower hourly minimum wage rate, the adjusted hourly minimum wage 23 rate shall remain the same as the hourly minimum wage rate in

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effect for the year in which it is calculated. Each adjusted 1 hourly minimum wage rate calculated under this subsection shall 2 3 take effect on July 1 of the calendar year in which the adjusted hourly minimum wage rate is calculated; provided that if an 4 increase in the adjusted hourly minimum wage rate exceeds ten per 5 cent of the hourly minimum wage rate in effect for the year in 6 which it is calculated, the adjusted hourly minimum wage rate shall 7 be increased by ten per cent of the hourly minimum wage rate in 8 effect for the year in which it is calculated." 9
